30 *evening at 5:45. We went over a few policies for review and once we get*
31 *all the information, we will provide it to the rest of the Board.*
32

33 B. **New Business:** *Scott Campbell said the Greenwich Township Board of*
34 *Education has received the 2021-2022 Safety Elite Award from GCSSD*
35 *JIF (Gloucester, Camden, Salem School District Joint Insurance Fund) for*
36 *a maintenance loss ratio below 50% for the year. We were awarded a*
37 *check for \$2,500.00!!*

39 C. **New Business:** *Roseanne Lombardo said that the Paulsboro Board of*
40 *Education has a lot of new people coming onto the Board.*

42 D. **New Business:** *Scott Campbell said the Reorganization Meeting and*
43 *Board of Education meeting schedule was updated to show the date*
44 *changes for submitting the budget to the County for review and the Public*
45 *Hearing. The Public Hearing will remain the same but the submission to*

1 the County was changed from March 14 to March 21, 2023. We will
2 submit the changes for approval at the reorganization meeting next month;
3 January 3, 2023.

9 **11. PUBLIC - AGENDA/NON-AGENDA ITEMS**

10
11 This is the time when anyone from the public who wishes to speak to the Board
12 may do so. Please state your name, address and phone number. The Board will
13 hear your concerns. The Board may or may not take action this evening.
14 In accordance with Board policy and procedures, speakers are not permitted to
15 publicly speak of personal issues involving school personnel, or against any
16 person connected to the school system. Any such concern should be presented
17 to the school or district-level administration so that a proper response may be
18 given.
19

20 **Lori Titus**, 117 Jackson Avenue, Gibbstown, NJ said she has taught special
21 education for the past 25 years. She explained that she has a daughter who has
22 an I.E.P. and two sons with a 504 plan. She has concerns that she wanted to
23 bring up to the Board of Education about the lack of services provided here at
24 Greenwich Township Schools. She went on to explain that in 1947, the I.D.E.A.
25 act was signed into law. That act stated that all children are guaranteed excess
26 to a free and appropriate public education in the least restricted environment to
27 every child with a disability. The term "least restricted environment" does not
28 mean all children belong in a general education classroom but rather they should
29 be placed in a classroom that best meets their individual needs. Gibbstown only
30 has one classroom placement for 3rd grade students with disabilities and that is
31 a classroom resource. Some students are pulled out of the classroom to work
32 with a special education teacher while other students with disabilities, like her
33 daughter, are left in the mainstream classroom without a special education
34 teacher present. She is asking the Board of Education and administration to take
35 a look at the services being done specifically in third grade. She is hoping that
36 they take her suggestions into consideration because all children deserve an
37 appropriate education in a healthy learning environment. **Susan Vernacchio**
38 asked if she followed the chain of command to which **Mrs. Titus** said she has
39 done that. **Mrs. Vernacchio** said as a Board, they will look into this and speak
40 with the administration because she does need to hear their side of the situation,
41 but she thanked **Mrs. Titus** for bringing this to the Board's attention.
42

43 **Jason Ray**, 65 Chester Avenue, Gibbstown, NJ, said his first question is if
44 someone wanted to donate whether it was monetary or wanted to pay for
45 playground equipment at the Broad Street School, what is the process? How

1 can that be accomplished? **Dr. Jennifer Foley-Hindman** responded that the
2 Board had just met with the architect to talk about the possibility of some work
3 and we met as a budget committee to talk about some playground upgrades to
4 the Broad Street School but depending on who might want to donate, now would
5 be a great time to sit down and talk about what they might be able to do and how
6 we can incorporate it into our plans. **Mr. Ray** asked if **Dr. Foley-Hindman** would
7 be able to speak on **Mr. John Batista's** behalf about getting his staff to cut the
8 grass around the playground? **Dr. Foley-Hindman** said typically with some of
9 the playground equipment, it must go through a health and safety check, and
10 they will give us guidelines on the mulch and how the mulch is displayed around
11 the equipment. There are specifications but if you have an idea of what is looking
12 to be donated, we can include them in the rules of what the health and safety
13 check look at. **Dr. Foley-Hindman** said she is not in a position to speak for **Mr.**
14 **Batista** but we can certainly include him in the discussions and also also make
15 sure the architect and the health and safety inspection guidelines are met. We
16 also need to know what you are talking about and what is being donated before
17 we can even look into this. **Mr. Ray** said there is a backstory to this. He said it
18 seems like there was a "big hassle" when someone wanted to donate playground
19 equipment. **Scott Campbell** asked, "where was the hassle"? **Mr. Ray** said he
20 didn't know; only that the excuse was that it was too much of a hassle and too
21 much trouble to cut the grass around it. **Mr. Campbell** then asked, "Who did they
22 talk to?" **Mr. Ray** said it was probably the person that runs the Broad Street
23 School. **Mr. Campbell** said, "They didn't talk to me, and they didn't talk to Jen".
24 **Dr. Foley-Hindman** said she would set up an appointment to talk about that and
25 get some details. **Mr. Ray** said he would let the people know who wants to make
26 this donation. **Susan Vernacchio** said it would be wonderful if we could do this.
27 **Mr. Campbell** said the Board must accept the donation but doesn't necessarily
28 have to accept it. "To be honest, if organized crime wanted to give us money, I
29 don't think we are accepting it." **Mr. Campbell** said he was saying this
30 hypothetically. **Mr. Ray** then asked if you would be calling it a hassle to which
31 **Mr. Campbell** said he wouldn't be calling it anything. **Dr. Foley-Hindman** said
32 there are always challenges to the health and safety check and the legalities but
33 that doesn't mean it is insurmountable. **Mr. Ray** then said he wanted to follow up
34 on what Mrs. Titus was saying and also said he has to "proceed cautiously". He
35 has a son in 3rd grade and a daughter in 5th grade. All he can say, and he
36 doesn't know how else to describe it, but it is a "shit-show" over there. He said
37 he has been sending e-mails upon e-mails of the behavior issues in 5th grade
38 where his daughter is. His biggest concern is 5th grade as his daughter is
39 getting bullied. **Mrs. Vernacchio** asked if his emails were acknowledged, to
40 which **Mr. Ray** said they were but there has been no progress. Like he said to
41 **Dr. Foley-Hindman** in previous meetings, the demographics of this town have
42 changed. The people who are raising kids in this town do not raise them like
43 they used to and kids aren't being raised properly. They do not know how to act.
44 The teachers and staff over at Broad Street are outnumbered by these kids and
45 can't handle them. He is being told that the person over there is in constant

1 communication with you (meaning **Dr. Foley-Hindman**) but he doesn't know if
2 you are getting all the right information. **Dr. Foley-Hindman** said she too is
3 limited as to what she can say in public, but she is aware of an e-mail she
4 received within the last 24 hours. **Mr. Ray** said he finds it sad that there are
5 messages and issues that we can bring here to you but plenty of parents have a
6 lot to say on the street and on Facebook. All he can do is recruit and you can
7 see how far it is getting us. He would like our message to be stronger, but he
8 can't get anyone here to the board meetings. **Mrs. Vernacchio** said they
9 shouldn't have to come here; they should be getting support from the teachers,
10 then the principals, then from the Superintendent and then you come here to the
11 Board. She wants to know if these parents are going through the proper
12 procedures or are they putting it on Facebook and standing behind Facebook?
13 **Mr. Ray** thinks the parents are just too lazy to even send an e-mail. **Mrs. Titus**
14 said her daughter loved Art class and **Mrs. Ridinger** loved her daughter. She
15 said it breaks her heart to know that her daughter no longer likes going to Art
16 class because all **Mrs. Ridinger** does is yell at the boys. **Mr. Ray** then said that
17 it has been brought up before about the number of classes per grade; for a long
18 time, it was three (3) classes per grade and has now been reduced to two (2)
19 classes per grade. He feels that having 20+ kids in a classroom is too
20 overwhelming and too distracting. He feels that the balance is off with the
21 percentage of kids with behavioral problems, and he doesn't feel there is the
22 support in the classroom to handle these class sizes. He asked if there is any
23 chance of going back to three (3) classes per grade? **Dr. Foley-Hindman** said it
24 would depend on the grade and what our staffing ability is. Those are real and
25 genuine concerns. **Mr. Ray** said that would alleviate some of our concerns.
26 **Mrs. Vernacchio** asked how many students in a class we are talking about. **Mr.**
27 **Ray** said 22 in a class. **Mrs. Vernacchio** said in the State of New Jersey, 22 in a
28 class is a really good number. **Roseanne Lombardo** agreed with **Mrs.**
29 **Vernacchio** and said she has had up to 28 in her classroom. **Mr. Ray** is saying
30 that 25% of that number of students have behavioral issues. **Mrs. Titus** said that
31 is her concern. She said if the school can get behaviors under control and out of
32 the general education population, then 22 students is not a problem. But when
33 you have four or five of them "climbing the walls" so to speak, and disruptive, it is
34 a problem. It takes away from all the kids learning. **Dr. Foley-Hindman** said
35 then it's fair to say that the chief concern is behavior issues in the classroom has
36 an impact on education. **Mrs. Titus** said she would be fine with 22 students in a
37 class if four didn't "multiple into 16 in a way" with their behavior.
