#### **Updates from Elementary Education**

The Elementary Education office has continued to work closely with our BSI elementary school leaders and instructional teams to review midyear student performance data, ensuring that our intervention strategies and instructional practices are meeting the diverse needs of our students. By analyzing key data points from benchmark assessments, classroom performance trends, and student growth measures, we have collaborated with the principals and leadership teams to adjust instructional pacing, identify areas requiring targeted support, and implement data-driven interventions.

Additionally, we have been assisting our schools with their "Beyond the School Day" (after school programs). Through collaboration with school administrators and instructional coaches, the Academic Services department is ensuring that our summer programs are structured, well-resourced, and designed to bridge learning gaps so that students enter the next school year with confidence and readiness.
