Lumberjack Families,

Progress despite the times. This is a topic covered quite a bit with administration and our staff. I am proud to say our students are learning and making progress with the support of school and home communities. I shared at a recent school board meeting Lincoln-Woodstock Cooperative School District state data showing the progress our students have made throughout the pandemic. We are not perfect; however, we are working hard with a common goal to improve.

Math and ELA proficiency data as reported by NH SAS is listed below. Lin-Wood is represented in blue. The state is in green. Notice the upward trend, congratulations students and staff. As you can see, we are very close to the state targets. Yes, our science scores need improvement. We are aware of that and we will continue to strive for improvement.



Comparisons of Lin-Wood to other local districts are favorable. We outperformed many in the North Country and surrounding districts. Sustaining this momentum is up to all of us and it starts by getting to school.

Assessment Proficiency measures the percent of students proficient in each of the three assessed subject areas. NH has also set Targets for Math and English Language Arts, which are included on the scale for reference. ELA Proficiency 55% State Target:64.4% Image: Comparison of the target of tar

Excessive Absences and Tardies

K-12 students cannot exceed **TWELVE (12) DAYS OF ABSENCES** in a school year. Promotion to the next grade may be affected by excessive absences. Attendance totals are listed on the student's report card. When a student in grades 9-12 has reached 8 days absence in a class, parents will be notified.

Absences are up overall. Students need to come to school when healthy. As a reminder our Excessive Absences and Tardies is in the handbook on page 31.

Letters will be mailed home soon to those students who may be affected by this rule. Covid 19 will not apply to the max number of absences. Please bear in mind that absence numbers for Covid 19 are included in your student's total absence letters to bring awareness of ensuring your child has completed necessary work assignments.

If your child can't get to school due to illness, be sure to communicate with the front office, school nurse and the student's teachers. Most homework does not take that long to complete, <u>even less time to turn in</u>. Remember, if a child misses a day of school, they have (1) day to make up that work.

It is important for parents to reach out to teachers should the student be absent for an extended amount of time. Coordinate the work that can be completed at home by the student. We understand that having an illness is not always conducive to completing homework. The best way to stay on top of these matters is to do the work on time and to communicate with teachers. All teachers are expected to assign work via Google classroom and assignments can be found there.

REMEMBER

- Middle School Students Should not have their phones on them. Phones should be in their locker or backpack.
- High School Student High School Teachers are expected to monitor student usage and allow phones for educational purposes only. The expectation is to put it away until staff say it is ok to have. Parents should reinforce this with their children. Please do not text your children while they are in class. Lunch is a perfect time to do this. High school students have lunch from 1218-1246 pm on MWF and 1229-1258pm on Tues. & Thursday.

- Should your child have to leave school early due to illness, all communications should be coming from the school nurse, Lynn Murray. It is important for Ms. Murray to assess students and make determinations for the wellbeing of the child and the rest of our school community.
- Absences known in advance (family vacations, medical procedures, etc.) should be communicated ahead of time by completing a Student Absence form and submitting into the front office. Parents/Students should also reach out to teachers prior to this leave to ensure any necessary work during that time is completed.

BOOK TASTING IN 5TH GRADE

Boost Your Self-Compassion

As we approach Valentine's Day, let's think a bit about self-love and compassion. Take a moment to think about how you treat yourself when you make a mistake or fail to reach a goal. If you tend to beat yourself up when things go wrong, you, like most people, can use a little more self-compassion in your life.

Forgiving and nurturing yourself seem to have benefits in their own right. Strong self-compassion can even set the stage for better health, relationships, and general well-being. So far, research has revealed a number of benefits of self-compassion. Lower levels of anxiety and depression have been observed in people with higher self-compassion. Learn to have self-compassion:

Here are four ways to give your self-compassion skills a quick boost:

- **Comfort your body.** Eat something healthy. Lie down and rest. Massage your own neck, feet, or hands. Take a walk. Anything you can do to improve how you feel physically gives you a dose of self-compassion.
- Write a letter to yourself. Think of a situation that caused you to feel pain (a breakup, a job loss, a poorly received presentation). Write a letter to yourself describing the situation, but without blaming anyone including yourself. Use this exercise to nurture your feelings.
- **Give yourself encouragement.** Think of what you would say to a good friend if he or she was facing a difficult or stressful situation. Then, when you find yourself in this kind of situation, direct these compassionate responses toward yourself.
- **Practice mindfulness.** Even a quick exercise, such as meditating for a few minutes, can be a great way to nurture and accept ourselves while we're in pain.

Lin-Wood Food Service News

Thanks to a waiver from the USDA and National School Lunch Program (NSLP), Lin-Wood is once again able to serve free breakfast and free lunch to all students in K-12 for the 2021-22 school year. This means that each student can have the daily breakfast or lunch meal that is on the school lunch menu for that day at no charge.



Here's some additional information on the Lin-Wood Food Service:

- 1. All breakfast and lunch meals include a milk option. It is part of the free meal.
- 2. Milk purchased separately must be paid for on student accounts.
- 3. A la carte items, including milk purchased separately, must be paid for on student accounts. No charging is allowed for a la carte items.
- 4. If a student wants an additional meal during lunch, it will be charged to their lunch account, like an ala carte purchase.
- 5. Funds can be added to student accounts in different ways. If cash is brought in, please identify your student's name and grade on the envelope so it gets applied to the proper account.
- 6. The preferred methods of adding funds to student accounts are prepayment by check or using the online payment portal through MySchoolBucks. (see additional information in this newsletter)

Working with our Community to Keep Children Safe

Mandatory Reporting & DCYF

According to New Hampshire law (RSA 169-C:29-31) <u>any</u> person who has "reason to suspect" that a child has been abused or neglected *must report* that suspicion to the Division of Children, Youth and Families of the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services (DCYF). Under the law, these reports are expected to be made immediately.

Quick Facts

- 1. It is not the reporters role to investigate.
- 2. Proof of abuse and neglect is not required to make a report.
- 3. Sometimes, people are unsure if a situation is abusive. Reporters in doubt are still encouraged to call.
- 4. In some cases, failure to report could result in criminal prosecution.
- Results made in good faith entitle the reporter to both civil and criminal immunity.

Some professionals may have further requirements and ethical codes regarding mandatory reporting. In schools this includes; teachers, school officials, nurses, social workers, psychologists, and counselors. In our community this can also include medical doctors, hospital staff, childcare workers, foster care workers, therapists, faith leaders, and law enforcement officials.

It is important to remember that these laws were developed to support and protect children. We take our role in keeping the children in our community safe and hope that you do as well.

If a child tells you that he or she has been hurt or you are concerned that a child may be the victim of any type of abuse or neglect, call the Division for Children, Youth and Families (DCYF) Central Intake Unit at: Telephone: (800) 894-5533 (in-state) or (603) 271-6562 (out of state) 24 hours a day, including weekends and holidays. For immediate emergencies, please call 911.

2021-2022 STUDENT DRIVERS

If your student will become licensed for this upcoming year, please review the following information:

- Student Automobile Use Policy Any licensed student may be permitted to bring their vehicle onto campus. Student transport of minor siblings must be authorized by parent/guardian and on file with the office for siblings to leave school grounds. Additionally, students must follow the handbook policy regulations stated below regarding their vehicles on campus:
 - Student use of an automobile on school grounds is a privilege. Careless driving is <u>prohibited</u> and is subject to disciplinary actions. Anyone guilty of careless driving, may be reported to the police. Improper use of a motor vehicle on school grounds <u>can</u> result in suspension from school.
 - Driving a motor vehicle from school grounds during the school day without authorization will be considered improper use of a motor vehicle and will be considered grounds for suspension.
 - Parking at the school is a privilege granted by the school and the privilege <u>will be</u> withdrawn if it is abused. Prior to driving or parking on school grounds, students will be required to register motor vehicles in the main office. If a student leaves the school grounds in a motor vehicle without authorization, parents will be notified, and the student will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including suspension from school.
 - Automobiles *must* be parked in the designated parking area.
 - Students, including the driver, are not allowed in vehicles during school hours, except for arrival or departure. Drivers and their passengers must leave the vehicle as soon as they arrive at school and are not to be in it until they leave school again.
 - NOTE Any items displayed in or on a student's vehicle which violate normal codes of conduct may be subject to disciplinary actions, including student suspension and loss of parking privileges per policy JIC.
