

This week we are continuing to learn how to write capital letters. So far, students should know how to write uppercase letters A-R and be able to match them with the lowercase partner. This unit also focuses on vocabulary words and answering questions that are in the story. Students are learning to look back in the story if they are unsure of the answer.

We are finishing up with our last couple of lessons in math. We continue to play games to reinforce skills we have learned. Students enjoy math talks, and playing the games like Which one doesn't belong, Ten more, and Bump.

It is at this point of the year that we need to think like runners and push all the way across the finish line. We want to work and play hard.

Please discuss with your child how important it is that they come to school as ready learners. I would like to keep our classroom engaging and fast-paced. If learners come to school having read for 30 minutes the night before; with their Boomerang Folders and reading logs signed and checked they are better prepared to receive the day's skills and concepts.

Please continue checking work daily. Discuss with your child the concepts they have learned through the assignments you are looking at. Please continue listening to your child read aloud for 30 minutes each night. Try those nightly 60 second fluency reads that are sent home each Monday.

Third and Fourth Grade Classroom

This week in science students learned what an ecocolumn was and got the opportunity to create one with their team. We learned an ecocolumn is a small model of an ecosystem that includes both terrestrial (land) and aquatic (water) habitats. Students created their own model using cups, wicks, soil, radish seeds, and a worm that they found for themselves!



This week was our last week before we start SBAC testing. We spent some time this week going over the different features of the test and tools that can help to make it easier. Testing will begin on Monday morning. Please encourage your child to do their best as well as help them to get a good night's sleep each night and a protein filled breakfast in the morning. This is a bright group of kids and they will do great!

Fifth and Sixth Grade Classroom

Next week starts our annual SBAC testing period! This is a great opportunity for students to demonstrate how much they have learned over this year and I am excited to see what they can do!

In preparation, we have been learning the tools of the program and working on our paragraph writing skills. I have seen impressive improvement this week and your students should feel very confident about their writing skills going into this testing period.

There are many tests that make up the SBAC and so to keep it manageable we break up the testing into shorter periods which students will work on during the morning hours in place of ELA and Math. We will start testing at 9:00 and end at 11:30 each day. Students will still get their normal recess and the subjects at the end of the day ie. music, art, library will not be affected.
