A computer is available for students to search the library inventory by book title or author. It's important that students understand how a library works, so they can have the independence and ability to find what they are looking for. Additionally, library literacy includes knowing the difference between fiction and nonfiction books, how and where books are shelved, and understanding the classification of the Dewey Decimal System.

The 5th & 6th grade book report projects are not only bright and colorful, but are the type of assignment that provides enjoyment and entertainment to every student entering the library!

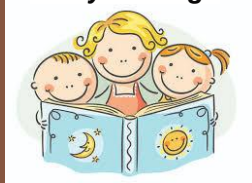
