The Holly Springs High School auditorium itself is getting a major facelift. The remodeling was scheduled to start July 22. After a delay, it instead began between late August and mid-September.

"We're excited about seeing a newly-renovated auditorium, including the balcony which has not been used in a very long time," said Dr. Irene Turnage, superintendent of education.

The old auditorium had many issues. There were broken seats, torn curtains, and bad lighting. The auditorium has been the same since the school was built.


The work includes the removal of asbestos, installing new tile on the first floor and the balcony area, new audience seating, new lighting fixtures, new wall paint and new acoustical wall and ceiling panels. The auditorium is going to have recessed lighting down the aisles.

Students have had to adjust to not having an auditorium during the first few months of the school year.

Instead of having assemblies in the auditorium, they are being held in the gym. On the first day of school students had to meet in the gym as opposed to the auditorium.

The expectations for the new Holly Springs High School auditorium are very high. It should be finished soon. The facility is being improved for not only the students and staff, but for the community.

"It's going to be top of the line," said high school principal Cravin Turnage.

I am from Bruce originally and live in Ingomar now.


How long have you been teaching? three months

"I liked to be active and dance so I decided to try cheering," Jones said. "The pressure from being captain is always taking accountability for your team and having to always be a leader."



This album also had an influence on another student. Braya Crane thinks the album is great, and she gave it a solid rating.


"I rate the album an 8 out of 10," Crane said.

The pros are that cell phones add to students' safety, and they can sometimes be used after the instruction for the day.


The cons are that students can easily get distracted, and the phones can cause drama, emotional distress, and allow students to cheat.


Terry also has a love for gospel music.



She was picked as Student of the Month by the staff at the school and then honored by the Holly Springs Rotary Club.


She said she pushes herself to do great in life, and she will help any student who needs her.
