District Survey Results Are In

Grant School District 3 strives to be a place where every student is known, empowered, and ready for the world. In order to understand the individual needs of students, the district conducted a survey of all students, employees, and parents/caregivers in October, 2025. The survey was designed to make sure students feel supported in their education, and guardians feel included and communicated with. "We want to make sure we are meeting the needs of our parents/caregivers," said Grant Union Principal Shanna Northway. "We want to improve, and to do that we need to understand where we should focus."

The survey questions included statements regarding students feeling safe, valued, and in control of their own education. Parents and students alike were asked about communication from teachers, consistent enforcement of school rules, and the approachability of the staff. Staff were asked about communication from administration and as a team, as well as questions regarding feeling supported and the balance of responsibilities.

The parent/caregiver survey included 15 questions and received 155 participants. The student survey included 20 questions, receiving 267 responses. The staff survey included 20 questions and received 95 employee responses. The parent/caregiver and employee surveys also included a space for comments to encourage the opportunity for feedback.

Northway worked with ElementaryPrincipal Janine Attlesperger and Superintendent Mark Witty to review all of the survey results, compiling lists of what the district does well and where improvements are needed, along with the creation of goals to help achieve those

Backpack Food Program Starts in Grant County

program, through her position with OSU Extension intended to take away from the provision of a family but Service as the SNAP-Ed Program Coordinator, since 2020. She is also the Every Day Matters Specialist at the Grant County Education Service District in John Day, Oregon. She spends her days supporting students around the county, finding ways to meet each student's physical and emotional needs to encourage school attendance.

The idea of a backpack program started three years ago when a local elementary student commented that he did not have access to meals outside of school. Breakfast and lunch are served four days a week, leaving long nights and weekends without food for students whose families are struggling financially.

Booth applied for the Supporting Health for All through Reinvestment (SHARE) Grant from Eastern Oregon Coordinated Care Organization (EOCCO). These funds have been designated to help Eastern Oregon communities with housing, food security, and health equity. Once the funds were awarded, Booth arranged storage space at a local church and ordered shelves.

The next step was ordering shelf-stable foods that could be stored. Chester's Market helped keep the funds local by arranging bulk pricing and ordering cases of food. Easy, kid-friendly foods like soups, cereals, fruit snacks and applesauce now lined the shelves, waiting to

> Grant County Health Department made a large donation, expanding to include hygiene items such as body wash, dish soap, etc.

> Blue Mountain Hospital donated the proceeds from their canned food drive, and employees are encouraged to volunteer in the community through Wellness Community time. Several Blue Mountain Hospital employees have used these volunteer hours to fill food bags for the backpack program. Bags were delivered to teachers at each Grant County school that chose to participate, ready to be sent home when a student needs help.

> The program has slowly settled in over the past few years. Booth tracks how many pounds of food are distributed, ordering food to be directly delivered to some schools, where school employees help by filling bags and administering them to students. Booth also orders food to be stored on hand, where ESD employees and the school resource officer are the main deliverers of filled food bags.

> Booth is optimistic that the backpack food program is making a difference in the lives of students and their families, and she continues to look for ways to help families succeed and thrive in Grant County.






Congratulations to Lilly Paddock, on her ACE Excellence in Art Award for her work "Lill Berries" (shown above middle) in fused glass!

I will be available via my cell if you need me to step into the principal role today. Otherwise, enjoy your new principal! I anticipate great things from this young lady!

Fifteen students participated in this year's Principal for the Day essay competition. "Finley was chosen based on her ideas and grade-level conventions, and alignment with our school's values," said Attlesperger. During her time as principal, Armichardy:

- Went to all staff and asked how they were doing and if they had any concerns
- Turned up the heat in the lobby for the morning drop-off so it wasn't so cold in the office
- Helped Mr. Huerta improve parent communication by suggesting paper fliers for events instead of just virtual, and approved the fliers when complete

- Conducted classroom walk-throughs and helped teachers problem-solve
- Launched the Junior Self-Manager program by distributing packets and explaining the program to all 2nd-4th grade classes
- Planned and led the afternoon assembly
- Met with Mr. Witty about remodeling the office and other positive changes for the school
- Made two signs for the cafeteria to remind students of expectations and ordered them for printing

Here is a copy of Miss Finley's essay:

If I were principal for a day I would always help the school. I would listen to every idea. I would be kind and respectful to others. I think everyone can be a principal if they work hard enough. I would be Safe, Respectful, and Responsible. I would check in with everyone and see how they are doing. I would greet everyone I see and tell them to have a good day. Teachers give Kindness Cards to students when they are caught being kind to others. Students write their name on the card and put it in the Blue Kindness Tub in their quad of classrooms.


Each Thursday, one card is drawn from each quad. Those students receive a prize at the assembly and a Kindness Trophy they get to have on their desk for the week.
