

Alabama Literacy Act

In 2019, the Alabama legislature passed the Alabama Literacy Act. The Alabama Literacy Act was established to improve the reading proficiency of public school kindergarten through 3rd grade students and ensure that those students are able to read at or above grade level by the end of the 3rd grade.

Why is the Alabama Literacy Act important to my child?

- By 3rd grade, students must be proficient in foundational reading skills in order to comprehend texts. If they are unsuccessful, they will have difficulty understanding grade level reading material. As a result, students begin to fall further behind each year. Students also need strong reading skills in order to learn other school subjects such as science, social studies, writing, and even math.
- One of the most important predictors of a child's academic and future success is the ability to read by the end of third grade. Everything that happens in your child's life in the early years has a lasting impact on their future potential. Families are essential in setting high expectations for learning and encouraging their child's academic achievement, growth, and success! Your active participation and partnership with your child's teacher and school, along with reading support at home, is critical to their success in meeting the assessment standards established in Alabama.

Alabama Literacy Act

ACAP

- o Grades 2-5 : English
 Language Arts, Math, Science
 (grade 4 only)
- Teachers target instruction to individual student needs; learn areas of need and strengths to better target instruction




- o A reading portfolio will be started for all rising third graders who scored at the lowest achievement level on the reading subtest of the ACAP Summative Assessment in second grade.
- o Each standard and assessed portion must include a minimum of three (3) work samples of mastery whereby the student earned a grade of 70% or above on each example.

SRIP

- o Any K-3 student who exhibits a consistent reading deficiency shall receive an individual reading improvement plan.
- o Instruction and intervention are provided by the classroom teacher.
- o Additional support is provided as deemed necessary by the PST.

All students are provided Science of Reading (S.O.R.) Core Reading Program.





- Address deficiencies with intervention (and comprehensive core instruction).
- Evaluate every grading period.

If deficiency is CONSISTENT:

- Notify parents in writing of deficiencies within 15 school days of identification.
- Provide additional tutorial support.
- Develop a Student Reading Improvement Plan (SRIP) within 30 days.
- Provide intensive reading intervention (vetted programs) until deficiencies are rectified.
- Provide summer reading instruction and intervention (70+ hours) to all with a reading deficiency.



Basic guidelines to share with your kids for safe online use:


- •Never share personal information, such as address, phone number, or school name or location.
- •Never send or trade personal pictures.
- •Don't share passwords (other than with parents).
- •Never agree to get together in person with anyone met online without parent approval and/or supervision.
- •Never respond to a threatening email, message, post, or text.
- •Always tell a parent or other trusted adult about any communication or conversation that was scary or hurtful.



What's Good About Social Media

Social media can help kids:

- •stay connected with friends and family
- •enhance their creativity by sharing ideas, music, and art
- •meet and interact with others who share similar interests
- communicate with educators and fellow students
- •learn about current events



What's Bad About Social Media

- •Kids can be teased or harassed online through cyberbullying
- •Privacy and safety can be compromised if kids share more online than they should
- •Photos, videos, and comments made online usually can't be taken back after they're sent or posted. Even when a kid thinks something has been deleted, it can be impossible to completely erase it from the Internet.
- •Too much time on social media can have negative mental health effects.
- •Kids may see online ads or content that are inappropriate for their age. This is especially true for kids who lie about their age to get access to certain social media sites.



What Can Parents Do?

- •Teach Kids to be nice online.
- •Think twice before hitting "enter."
- Use privacy settings.
- •Don't "friend" strangers.
- •Consider making a "social media agreement" with your kids
