School Teachers and Staff will:

- Have students complete monthly book challenges advertised to parents via social media to improve literacy, recognizing textual evidence, improving comprehension and vocabulary.
- Utilize IXL, Lexia, Legends of Learning, Mobymax, and USA testprep to improve literacy, critical thinking, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension skills.

Hold parent-teacher conferences throughout the year to discuss student progress.

- The compact will be used as a guide to ensure responsibilities are being met by all parties.
- Parent-teachers conference will be held as needed and can be requested by parents, teachers, counselors and/or administrators.
 School personnel are available before and after school as well as during planning periods during the school day. Phone conferences may be held

- Parents will have access to the Infinite Campus Parent Portal to access their student's grades and attendance at any time.

Family Responsibilities

- Attend Title I Family events with students to help foster understanding of the learning goals and tasks for each content area.
- Utilize IXL, Lexia, Legends of Learning, Mobymax, and USA Testprep at home with students to improve math fluency and critical thinking, literacy and writing, comprehension, and vocabulary skills a minimum of 30 minutes per week.
- Volunteer in the classroom in all content related classes to gain a better understanding of the curriculum.
- Facilitate learning activities in the areas of Science, Social Studies, Math, English/Language Arts and literacy skills

nightly by accessing various electronic and print documents via Google Drive/Google classroom, or other source as provided by the teacher.

- Review progress toward mastery of standards by discussing SAFE (weekly short and frequent evaluations) scores with students
- Monitor student participation in Monthly/Nightly reading assignments to improve overall literacy, vocabulary, comprehension, and citing of textual evidence for students. Reading should be a minimum of 20 minutes per night.
- Attend Academic Night events with students to help foster understanding of the learning goals and focus for each content area and grade level.

Student Responsibilities

- Set personal learning goals in Social Studies, Science, English/Language Arts, writing, and math and work with my teachers to meet these goals.
- Read nightly for at least 20 minutes. Participate in Monthly Book Challenges to improve overall literacy skills, comprehension, vocabulary, and citing textual evidenc.
- Practice Social Studies, Science, English/Language Arts, Math and Reading activities on USA Test Prep Lexia, Legends of Learning, Mobymax and IXL a minimum of 30 minutes per week to improve math fluency, reading comprehension, vocabulary, critical thinking skills, and citing textual evidence.
- Practice and complete learning activities in the areas of Science, Social Studies, Math, English/Language Arts and Writing nightly by accessing various electronic and print documents via Google Drive, Google Classroom or other source as provided by the teacher.
- Attend Academic Night events with parents to help foster understanding of the learning goals and tasks for each content area.
