Introduction To Literature A/B (9) (Honors)

# **Description of Target Group**

This yearlong course, required to meet the district's graduation requirement, is designed for only those freshman students whose recommendations and portfolios have been accepted by the English Department Honors Committee.

## **Purpose**

This course is designed to provide selected students with a qualitatively different and varied curriculum, which challenges and enriches their individual potential while maintaining the requirements of the basic course outline. Students will focus upon an introduction to literature and the writing process through an integrated approach. This course will prepare students for World Literature (Honors) as they read and write accessing themes which include self-exploration, prejudice, tolerance and personal and human values. Students will develop communication skills in reading, writing, listening and speaking in which group and individual projects will be assigned. In addition, students will participate in beginning career exploration to provide a greater awareness of the need for proficiency in communication skills.

Students must maintain a grade of HB" or better at the end of each semester to remain in the honors program.

# **Standards of Expected Student Achievement**

Upon completion of this course, students will demonstrate the following skills:

### READING

A variety of genres from literature will be read. Students will be expected to:

- read independently
- identify literary genre
- identify elements of literature, literary terms
- construct meaning from a text
- make connections within a text
- extend beyond the text
- include an element of risk taking in constructing meaning
- keep a journal or log
- analyze literature on both symbolic and thematic levels

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Core selections include:

novel: Of Mice and Men - John Steinbeck

drama: Romeo and Juliet - Shakespeare

Other possible selections include:

novel: <u>Captain's Courageous</u> - Rudyard Kipling

Night - Elie Wiesel

A Tale of Two Cities - Charles Dickens

drama: The Mother - Paddy Chayefsky

Visitors from Forest Hill - Neil Simon

epic poetry: The Odyssey - Homer

short story, poetry, essays: selections from the basic and supplementary texts.

### WRITING

Students will be expected to demonstrate the following skills:

### Rhetoric:

- present an idea; acknowledge an audience/reader
- use logic and relevant support/details
- state and develop an argument
- demonstrate coherence and style
- attempt an element of risk
- demonstrate improvement

### Conventions:

- practice sentence variety
- use proper word choice/usage and vocabulary development
- demonstrate good mechanics
- improve spelling
- demonstrate improvement and growth

Students will demonstrate the ability to write in the following types of discourse:

- autobiographical
- reflective
- descriptive
- narrative
- expository discourses

- use the library and computer catalog
- use reference volumes appropriately
- cite works using MLA documentation
- document within a text using MLA format
- take notes
