Dear Friends.

In today's learner-centered classrooms, students take ownership of their learning, inquire about their interests, and build new knowledge through active participation in the learning and teaching process. This reality frames the questions that guide our approach to "protecting the

potential" of our students. How do we provide the right mix of rigorous academic content, opportunities for critical thinking, problem-solving and working collaboratively? How do we cultivate a growth mindset in students? How do we create learning environments enriched with an interdisciplinary approach that is responsive to students' interests, abilities and needs?

Research supports STEM (Science-Technology-Engineering-Math) education as a rigorous interdisciplinary approach. STEM's emphasis on problem-solving and critical thinking develops skills students need for a successful life and career. Potential thrives when students have opportunities to solve problems in a team approach.

Other studies have focused on the impact of music education on students' motivation, attitudes and performance in math. Integrated physical activities improve academic outcomes in math learning, math fluency and classroom engagement

Guardian Catholic is in the early stages of creating an outdoor STEM³ Learning Lab. In addition to the traditional Science, Technology, Engineering and Math — we plan to add Music and Movement. Our hopes and dreams include outdoor gardens, a greenhouse, weather station, underwater robotics lab, a rocket–drone launching site, outdoor musical instruments and a fitness station. Mr. Winston Timmons

Guardian Catholic's teacher brings new energy to the Music Program

Mr. Winston Timmons, our new full-time music teacher, joined Guardian in August 2021. He is a percussionist who graduated in May 2021 from Edward Waters University in Jacksonville. During college he was the drumline leader and discovered a passion for "inspiring and teaching others about what music really is and means."

Seeing my students grow and learn how to do what I love the most inspires me every day.

Mr. Timmons experiments with different techniques to keep students learning, engaged and having fun at the same time. "For first graders to learn how to read music is an accomplishment because it is a skill that not a lot of people have," he said. He believes that elementary and middle school are key years to learn how to read music and prepare for high school and college music programs.

Seeing the effort that students put into class and how they change their perception of music is what Mr. Timmons enjoys most about teaching at Guardian.

Mr. Timmons notes that his students' favorite way to learn is through playing music. With more instruments and equipment, the class could have better results and he could continue with a plan to start a drumline for elementary students, with more instruments being incorporated in future years.

Besides teaching at Guardian, Mr. Timmons teaches at a youth center, plays percussion for a local church and First Coast Wind Symphony, and is a member of lota Phi Theta Fraternity.
