APRIL IS OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY MONTH

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Occupational therapy assists individuals in performing necessary tasks through therapeutic use of daily activities (occupations). This skill based therapy supports the student's ability to participate in school activities or occupations. This includes academic support and non-academic support. Occupational therapists collaborate within the educational team to provide supports and interventions for students to engage in school activities and achieve independence in the school setting. They may work on maintaining or improving functional joint motion needed during the school day such as putting on a coat or reaching for items in a locker. When needed, they work on the development of hand skills for functional writing, keyboarding, cutting, and buttoning. Occupational therapists fabricate splints to enable the student to perform educational tasks such as writing, eating, using a keyboard, or stabilization of work material. They recommend and assist with modifying seating or positioning on the school bus. An occupational therapist will promote safety within the school environment and modify playground equipment and common areas. Our occupational therapy team works hard for student success!

March was Social Worker Appreciation Month. The Houston County School District celebrated School Social Worker Week March 6-10. The theme for this year's celebration was "We Rise." School Social Workers rise to support their students, families, and school communities. School Social Workers rise to share hope. They rise to listen and understand. They rise to challenge inequities. They rise to support all students. School Social Workers are advocates who help students achieve academic success by linking home, school, and community. In order to reach this goal, School Social Workers provide support services to remove barriers to student success. These support services include intervention, crisis support, assisting students in dealing with mental health and behavioral challenges, and addressing issues of truancy.

Several schools across the district have campaigns to increase school attendance with assistance from School Social Workers. The goal is to ensure that every child has an equal opportunity to reach his or her potential. Social Workers collaborate with families to help meet their basic needs and reduce barriers that keep students from attending school. Georgia House Bill 1190 states that students missing five or more unexcused days from school are considered truant. Social workers conduct home visits to locate students who are truant, attend court, collaborate with the judges at magistrate and juvenile courts, work with community agencies, and write grants for the department. They have a direct impact on increasing graduation rates and decreasing drop-out rates among students. We thank you for your hard work and dedication!




Special Education Teacher Induction Series

Presentation topics included Understanding the Reevaluation Process and Transition Planning for Life after High School. Why students may be referred for reevaluations and the referral process were discussed. The 12 eligibility areas and the basics for writing IEP transition plans were reviewed. Participants had opportunities for Q&A, and resources were provided through a shared site.
