Gateway Celebrates Grand Opening Of New Philadelphia Early Head Start Center With Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony





On October 26, Gateway welcomed families and partners to a ribbon-cutting for the new Early Head Start Infant-Toddler Learning Center on 5th Street in Philadelphia. The building features five colorful classrooms filled with educational materials and hands-on activities to aid in child development. The center will allow 40 children to enroll and receive Early Head Start services.

Located at the Roberto Clemente Homes, the new center is the result of a long-time partnership with Esperanza. After a Nor'easter storm rendered the previous Early Head Start center in the area uninhabitable in 2018, this partnership came to life and allowed for the creation of this beacon of hope for the Philadelphia community.

The event featured walkthroughs of the classrooms, pumpkin painting and fall activities for the children, and tables with resources and referrals provided by our partners for families in attendance. Edward Bethea, CCAP, Gateway's Executive VP and COO cut the ribbon, officially opening the center.

"This has been a long time coming, but we are here, finally. We are very proud and pleased," said Bethea. "When you go inside and see what the five classes look like, I think you will agree that it was definitely worth the effort and the wait."

The event featured remarks from Gateway as well as our partners. Gateway speakers included Bethea, presenting a keynote address, as well as Bonnie Eggenburg, CCAP, Vice President Gateway Early Head Start and Head Start Programs; Jinnea Terrell, Assistance Director of Operations – Philadelphia Region; Miguel Maldonado, MPA, CCAP, Director of Operations-Mercer/Project Manager; and Carolyn Robinson, Community Services Manager, Supervisor County Council for Young Children, who also opened the program by singing the National Anthem.

Partners who spoke at the event included Carolyn Baker, the Administration for Children and Families Region II representative, and Melissa Calhoun, Region III representative, as well as Esperanza Founder and CEO Luis Cortés, Jr.

"Our vision for today was not just about the center. It was about how to engage the community and the families and the children," said Eggenburg. "That's what today means to me. This is not just a building. It's a place we where we can say to families that when you are bringing your children here, you are bringing them to a place where they can learn and grow, and we are going to work with you side-by-side to help you in this lifelong adventure as a family. We are so excited to be here in Philadelphia, be here in this center and be a part of this community."


Gateway and Twin Rivers Head Start thank the East Windsor Fire Department for volunteering their time to visit our center last Friday, and for being heroes in our community every day.
