Grant School District Board of Directors,

I have attached input I received from parents and community members over the weekend and yesterday. I also have attached reply's from Colt Gill and the legislators secretaries.

I want to let you know that we will be at the GU Old Gym at 6:00 August 3.

Update on yesterday's meeting with ODE and OHA.

Colt Gill explained that the change to mandatory mask was a direction the governor moved to because of the large spread we are experiencing in the state. The Delta Variant is highly concerning because there are not protections for student with vaccine. Only half our students are even eligible for a vaccine. although the first release of the guidance on June 25 said local control there was a caveat that the governor could take measure to revert back to state control. OHA will be the agency adopting the rule not ODE. The rule will go in to effect August 2, 2021 and enforced August 12, 2021. These are some draft components of the rule.

Schools must ensure that all individuals, including but not limited to staff, students, contractors and visitors wear a mask, except as provided in sections (4) and (5) of this rule, when in an indoor setting:

- At school during regular school hours;
- Engaged in educational activities such as field trips or off-campus classes during regular school hours; and
- At school engaged in educational activities outside of regular school hours.
- A face shield may be worn instead of a mask if an individual cannot wear a mask for medical reasons.
- Nothing in this rule is intended to prohibit a school from complying with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), the Rehabilitation Act, or the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

An individual is not required to wear a mask under section (3) of this rule if the individual is:

- Actively eating or drinking.
- Sleeping.
- Playing a musical instrument that requires using the mouth.
- Engaged in a sport during physical education class such as swimming, other water sports, or a sport where wearing a mask could be a strangulation hazard such as gymnastics or wrestling.
- Alone in a private office enclosed by walls on all sides with a door that is closed.
- Is under the age of two (2).

Colt outlined consequences to violations of mask mandates.

• A school that violates this rule is subject to a civil penalty of \$500 per day per violation/incident.

- OHA has authority/responsibility under ORS 431A.010 for additional action
- Licensed educators who fail to obey this rule may face additional penalties. OAR 584-020-0035 (3) The ethical educator, in fulfilling obligations to the profession, will: (a) Maintain the dignity of the profession by respecting and obeying the law, exemplifying personal integrity and honesty. There would also be a possible violation of 584-020-0025 (3)(a), related to leadership skills. Deviation from these standards may subject the educator to discipline for gross neglect of duty, per OAR 584-020-0040 (4)(n) & (o).

Jim Green added that our district liability for COVID would be \$50,000 per incident if following the rules. If we are not following the rules there is no protections. District, boards, administration and staff not following the rules could be held personally liable.

I visited with Mark Owens this morning and we are preparing a meeting with our legislators to see if we can gain back a little common sense in the rule. It is my next step in advocating for the district. If you have additional paths that may help let me know.

# Strategy Choices for the required 20%+ to address the academic impact of lost instructional time:

- Empowering, Adaptable Instruction: For students to experience empowering curriculum that is motivating, appropriately-challenging, and that honors their identity and lived experience, districts and schools need a high-quality, culturally relevant curriculum, time and expertise for teachers to collaborate and check-in on student learning, and support that is differentiated and adjustable to meet students' strengths and needs. (Possible examples: Implementing or deepening authentic, culturally-responsive learning; assessing quality of current instructional materials and Investing in high-quality instructional materials from the adopted materials list or independent adoption that meets state criteria and providing high-quality professional learning for teachers on implementation, investing in formative assessment practices, providing sufficient time for both content-focused collaboration and planning as well as student-focused collaboration, providing instructional coaching and resources, providing career connect learning (CTE).)
- Time & Attention: For students to engage in learning that meets their strengths and distinct needs, districts
  and schools need to explore new ways to expand and vary the time and individualized attention they receive
  inside and outside of school hours. (Possible examples: Providing focused, high-dosage tutoring, peer tutoring,
  extended school day, enrichment programs, summer academic and enrichment, planning for post-secondary
  and career, developing work-based learning programs.
- Conditions for Teachers: For students to experience engaging, high-quality instruction in a supportive
  environment, districts and schools need to prioritize ways to make teaching jobs and roles more rewarding,
  collaborative, and sustainable while also tending to teacher mental health and well-being. (Possible examples:
  providing mentors and/or at least one team member that has an instructional content expert to help with
  planning, providing stipends and/or release time for selected teacher leadership roles, investing in wellness
  supports, providing highly effective teachers with opportunities to share their strengths and expand their
  impact).
- Relationships & Mental Health Support: For students to feel safe, welcome and supported in school, districts and schools need to develop structures and enact policies and practices that cultivate positive, supportive relationships, and provide for staff and student mental and emotional health needs. (Possible examples: create time and space in the school day for relationship building, provide opportunities for staff and students to make meaning of their experience through creative outlets [art, music, writing, movement etc.], regularly engage with staff, students and families to assess their relational and emotional support needs, and build robust relationships with linguistically and culturally responsive community health and mental health providers and local systems of care.
- Family & Community Partnerships: To increase academic, health, mental health and emotional support for students, districts and schools need to engage families as partners and leverage the local community and its system of care to provide integrated, wrap-around services and supports. (Possible examples: Implementing or deepening community- based organization's support to provide authentic, culturally-responsive academic enrichment and learning supports, strengthening connections with local systems of care, communicating in home languages, culturally-specific liaisons, business and college partnerships.)

# Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan

In order to best support students and families with the safest possible return to school for the 2021 school year, the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) has created an operational plan template to align guidance from the federal and state level in support of local decision-making and transparency of health and safety measures in the communities that school districts serve. The Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan serves the following purposes:

- 1) Replaces the Ready Schools, Safe Learners Operational Blueprint required under Executive Order 21-06; and
- 2) Meets the requirements for:
  - a. An operational plan required under OAR 581-022-0106(4), while aligning the CDC Guidance on School Reopening with the Ready Schools, Safe Learners Resiliency Framework for the 2021-22 School Year (RSSL Resiliency Framework);
  - Section 2001(i)(1) of the ARP ESSER and the US Department of Education's Interim Final Requirements for Safe Return/Continuity of Services Plan; and
  - c. Communicable Disease Plan and Isolation Plan under OAR 581-022-2220 (Division 22 requirements).

As districts plan and implement the recommendations in ODE's RSSL Resiliency Framework, they will need to consider a continuum of risk levels when all recommendations cannot be fully implemented. For example, universal correct wearing of face coverings between people is one of the most effective preventive measures. However, there will be times when this is not possible based on a specific interaction or a physical space limitation, such as during meal times. It will be necessary to consider and balance the mitigation strategies described to best protect health and safety while ensuring full time in person learning.

ODE remains committed to the guiding principles introduced in spring of 2020 to generate collective action and leadership for efforts to respond to COVID-19 across Oregon. These principles are updated to reflect the current context:

- Ensure safety and wellness. Prioritizing basic needs such as food, shelter, wellness, supportive relationships and support for mental, social, and emotional health of students and staff.
- Center health and well-being. Acknowledging the health and mental health impacts of this past year, commit to creating learning
  opportunities that foster creative expression, make space for reflection and connection, and center on the needs of the whole child
  rather than solely emphasizing academic achievement.

•	Cultivate connection and relationship. Reconnecting with one another after a year of separation can occur through quality learning
	experiences and deep interpersonal relationships among families, students and staff.

- **Prioritize equity**. Recognize the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on Black, American Indian/Alaska Native, and Latino/a/x, Pacific Islander communities; students experiencing disabilities; students living in rural areas; and students and families navigating poverty and houselessness. Apply an equity-informed, anti-racist, and anti-oppressive lens to promote culturally sustaining and revitalizing educational systems that support every child.
- Innovate. Returning to school is an opportunity to improve teaching and learning by iterating on new instructional strategies, rethinking learning environments, and investing in creative approaches to address unfinished learning.

Devote time for students and staff to connect and build relationships	We are starting the year with a barbecue which will bring together parents and students. This has been a tradition prior to COVID. We have added a lot of activities to our event in hope we can decrease the anxiety for students that are returning to school. Most of our students were in the building last year for in person instruction. We will implement various activities within our school throughout the year to keep students connected to school. We have a mental health first aid training for staff at the beginning of the year. That training will transition to activities for students in the classroom every week at a prescribed time. There will be a first day of school celebration to help	We have had a majority of students for on-site instruction. Our transition plan is to reincorporate on-line learners with on-site learners and move to the next level by trying to create some normalcy back in on-site school. Even with the restrictions that are advised at this point our plan is to have as much of a regular looking school year as possible. While writing our plan we considered all subgroups with priority towards making everyone feel included in our positive culture.
Ample class time, and private time if needed, for creative opportunities that allow students and staff to explore and process their experiences	We have created our schedules so that students in the schools will receive all the instructional time that is necessary. For all the students who have chosen to do on-line, we will document our instruction to make sure we are meeting the requirements. We will provide academic support after school both in person and using virtual platforms. The staff have not had access to an area that is a retreat from the classroom. A staff room upgrade will help give an area to decompress and process their experiences. Student desks are mixed-type tops. There are multiple desks that have slanted tops and Chromebooks do not function well. Replacing the desks will decrease student	We will continue to create an environment that serves all student equitably. All student subgroups will have access to our programs and advertisement will target subgroups.

We have hired an engagement specialist to work with parents to connect them and their student to the school. That person started July 1 and has already made contact with parents of students who were not part of our school community last year.	The designated subgroups will be targeted by specialists to support them in accessing mental health services and supports as well as emotional regulation strategies.
Foster peer/student lead initiatives on wellbeing and mental health	There is a self manager program at the elementary school, implementation of SEL programs like Sources of Strength at the high school. Pride lessons are part of a monthly PBIS program for grades 7-12. The 6 Pillars of Character at the elementary are rewarded with incentives. Stepping up our incentives and our SEL program frequency will be a priority. Students will be facilitating the programs under the direction of the adults. "We are so thrilled to return this year with many aspects of school looking normal," said Bret Uptmor Public Schools Superintendent. "Safety for our students, families, teachers and staff remains of utmost importance."

The vast majority of health and safety protocols are now *advisory*. The term advisory means school districts and public charter schools will have the option to implement them.

Grant School District, supports the ODE recommendations that vaccinations, face coverings, cohorting, ventilation and handwashing all play a role in our doors remaining open. To help mitigate the Spread of COVID the district will implement the following:

- Encouraging vaccination for those who can get it.
- Mask are recommended at school and required on busses or school transportation.
- All schools will maintain 3 ft. distancing for student to the extent possible.
- We will start our year with cohort sizes of 100 and will tighten that up if cases increase in our schools.

Dear Students & Families,

We are excited to welcome students and staff back to school this fall and want to share some updates about what to expect.

# **School Days & Instructional Time**

Grant School District will operate 4 days each week, serving all students full-time, in-person this fall. Our district will provide remote learning for students who may need to quarantine. Students who are still in need of virtual access to school, the district will continue to offer our District Virtual Academy (DVA).

# Health & Safety in Our Schools

As our schools plan for the fall 2021 in-person school year, it is important to remember our communities will be living with the virus until there is widespread immunity. COVID-19 continues to change with new variants, our knowledge of mitigation efforts grows over time.

Right now, the best tools to protect ourselves and one another are vaccination for those eligible, physical distancing, face coverings, ventilation and airflow, hand hygiene, and staying home if you feel sick or you know you've been exposed to someone with COVID-19.

The Oregon Department of Education shared guidance this summer that empowers school district leaders - in partnership with local public health - to make decisions about how to implement health and safety protocols, including physical distancing and face coverings.

We want to share the health and safety protocols we will have in place in our schools, along with steps we plan to take in response to COVID-19 cases and outbreaks, should they occur in our school(s) during the 2021-22 school year.

We encourage you to review the information below and talk with your student(s) about what to expect. We want you to know it is a priority to create safe spaces where your child feels safe, cared for, and connected to the learning environment. Working together, we can harness this opportunity to rekindle joy and learning in the classrooms, auditoriums, and playgrounds.

# What to Expect Fact Sheet

## **Health & Safety Protocols**

The vast majority of health and safety protocols are *advisory* for the 2021-22 school year. The switch to advisory means school districts and public charter schools will have the option to implement as needed.

# Key measures that remain required include:

#### Federal

• Mask are required to be worn on all school transportation services. Students riding busses to school will be required to wear a mask.

### State

- Maintaining a communicable disease plan
- Maintaining an isolation space in schools and
- Submitting a plan for operation
- Governors Order under review

#### GCHD

- Contact tracing and contact tracing logs
- Testing will be available in the schools
- Students with symptoms will be required to go home
- Quarantine period is 14 days

**Vaccination**: Our schools bring together people who are fully vaccinated and people who are not fully vaccinated. Everyone age 12 and older is eligible for a vaccine. Vaccination of 12-14 year olds requires parental or guardian consent. Vaccination of students and staff is encouraged but not required to come to school. Vaccination supports a student's access to in-person learning, sports and extracurricular activities. Fully vaccinated individuals who are exposed to COVID-19 **are not required to quarantine** unless they develop symptoms which ensures continuity of inperson instruction. When as many eligible students and staff are vaccinated as possible, our school is better able to serve students and families without interruption.

Face Coverings: Face coverings is mandatory by rules for students and staff indoors during school hours. Face coverings are required on public transit, including school buses, for passengers and drivers until lifted by the federal government. The CDC order for mandatory use of face coverings on public transit cannot be waived by state or local authorities. The CDC guidance is available on the CDC website.

**Physical Distancing:** We will support physical distancing in all daily activities and instruction, maintaining at least 3 feet between students to the extent possible. Our schools will have signs and visuals to remind students, staff and visitors.

**Cohorting**: Cohorting will be present in each building. When the amount of spread is low we will see less restrictions. As more cases develop in our community and schools there will be more cohorting restrictions.

**Ventilation and Airflow:** We will utilize opening of windows and doors to develop air flow within our buildings whenever possible.

**Handwashing:** Hand washing will be taught and encouraged. Students and staff will have access to soap and water and hand sanitizer.

# Responding to COVID-19 Cases or Outbreaks

We want you to know it is a priority for our school district to create a learning environment where your child feels safe, cared for, and connected to peers and school staff.

When staff and students show symptoms of being ill: if the student or staff member feels ill prior to coming to school, they should stay home. If a student or staff member becomes ill at school, we will have a designated location to isolate people who have symptoms of COVID-19 from people who are not sick.

When a staff member or a student tests positive for COVID-19: our school district will work with Grant County Health Department to take next steps. This will include communicating to our school community and contacting those who may have been exposed.

CDC guidance states that people who are <u>fully vaccinated</u> and do not have COVID-19 symptoms do not need to quarantine or get tested after an exposure to someone with COVID-19.

We look forward to our school year starting back up and a return to normalcy. Thank you for all your support over the last 18 months.

As a dentist I have had many years of study including microbiology, biochemistry, immunology, cell biology etc. I have yearly updates in infection control for my office, including Covid-19, and deal with infection control on a daily basis. Since Covid-19 emerged Jan 2020 I have been following research as it has come out.

Intuition tells us covering our faces must be worthwhile. After all, if the virus is emitted from our noses and mouths, covering those openings has to make a big difference, right?

That gut feeling misleads us, though, because we tend to only think of the virus in terms of visible, tangible droplets masks can absorb. Indeed, the initial scientific consensus held that Covid-19 was exclusively transmitted by droplets, prompting the emphasis on distancing six feet from each other—room enough for gravity to pull those droplets out of the air.

That exclusive-droplet-transmission consensus proved wrong. We now know Covid-19 is spread to a great extent via aerosols, particles so small they can easily float along in the air, traveling well beyond six feet. Even that description fails to convey how <u>unfathomably small</u> Covid-19 viral particles actually are—and why masks are a mismatch.

These particles are as little as 20 <u>nanometers</u>. That means the "gaps in blue surgical mask material are up to 1,000 times" larger than a Covid-19 viral particle.

Gaps in typical cloth masks can be 5,000 times the size...to say nothing of all that air that's merely redirected past masks' edges when we exhale.

Clearly these masks are ineffective.

If you did however still require a mask the only reliably effective, but not perfect, mask against the Corona virus and bacteria is a fitted, N95 mask worn with the proper techniques like that used by nurses and surgeons. This mask would provide about 8 hours of protection and then need to be replaced at the cost of around 15-20 dollars per month per person. Depending on availability which does fluctuate.

Unfortunately, even highly trained healthcare professionals have difficulty properly using these masks.

For these reasons alone you should refuse to impose a mask mandate on our children. But I have more reasons.

We now know that children ages 0-18 overwhelmingly have mild symptoms, if any, and are at a higher risk of poor outcomes from the seasonal flu than CV. It is also unfair to make a child with natural immunity, one that has recovered from Covid-19, wear a mask...they are not a vector. What message does that send?

Prolonged Mask usage by children is not only ineffective, it is harmful.

Children are at risk for a laundry list of challenges from mask mandates including stress, Anxiety, and impaired social skills and cognitive development .Psychology today, among others, warns that "after universal masking of children is long gone, we will be dealing with the unintended consequences for a

long time."

In closing, Last week the CDC released the following statement.

Given new evidence on the B.1.617.2 (Delta) variant, CDC recommends universal indoor masking for all teachers, staff, students, and visitors to K-12 schools, regardless of vaccination status. Children should return to full-time in-person learning in the fall with layered prevention strategies in place.

Also,

Oregon Health authority recommends mask wearing.


This guidance refers to substantial or high-risk counties. We are currently at moderate. And are rural

None of the CDC guidelines point to a mask mandate in schools. Merely Recommendation.

Please do not use CDC as primary guidance. CDC guidance is out of step with research concerning mask effectiveness and risk to children. The vaccines and natural immunity have proven to give robust protection against Covid-19. Masks have not.

Over 100 years of virology informs us, like it or not, that this virus is going to do what it is going to do. A mask is not going to stand in its way. And yet our emotional and political attachment to masks represents a powerful barrier to an intellectually honest evaluation of their effectiveness. I implore you not to mandate mask wearing because you "feel" you have to do something. You don't. A mask mandate in school would be useless in protecting children from the virus and only interfere with their education and development by distancing them from their peers and teachers.

If you feel like you must follow CDC or Oregon Health Authority guidelines, please consider following their guidance to the letter and "Recommend" mask wearing since neither of these agencies have proposed a mandate.

#### Good afternoon,

My name is Alici Archibald, and I am an incoming sophomore at Grant Union Jr/Sr High School. I am writing to you today because I support my Superintendent Bret Uptmor in making decisions regarding to COVID-19 in schools. I hope that by sharing my input and my experiences with you, I can show that our local school district can make the best decisions for our students regarding their health and safety.

My first reason for holding this position is that I feel that smaller counties such as ours are often overlooked when some of these state decisions are made. My school was lucky enough to return in person in the fall last year, due to the fact that between March and August, our county had only had 8 coronavirus cases total. Our first real "spike" was early November when 21 cases were recorded in one day. At this point, our school made the local decision to close down for a few weeks. Our 7-day average has stayed under 5 cases the entire summer. As you can see, our small town has had a very different experience than the rest of Oregon when it comes to COVID. I think that for many Grant County residents, it feels like the pandemic is over and that COVID is not a threat to our health and safety. This is probably very different from other counties in Oregon, further underlining the fact that different decisions should be made according to different circumstances. Our local administration knows first hand what is happening in our county, making them the best people to make these decisions for us.

I would also like to question the decision-making of Governor Brown. I would like to see the data and facts and be assured that these mandates that she has set will protect us. I would like to know why the length for social distancing has been cut in half. Does 3 ft really protect us from getting sick? I would also like to know how effective masks are in preventing this disease. I can assure you that masks have never been worn properly within the school. Masks are pulled under the nose and mouth, and adjusted in ways that help students to breathe easier. Some masks that are worn are not effective either. I have seen neck gaiters, bandannas, and masks that are unable to stay up on someone's face. Cloth masks are not washed regularly, paper masks are reused for weeks, and masks are shared between students. These practices are not protective at all. Also, if these things really protect us, why are we allowed to take off our masks to eat together? Why can I sit 2 ft away from people outside of my cohort while we talk and eat lunch? Why are we jam-packed into the lunch line for 15-20 min at a time? Unless there is evidence that all of these restrictions truly protect us from COVID-19, I question why we are asked to do these things.

I would also like to address the negative impact these rules and guidelines have had on my academics. I am very soft-spoken and have a hard time speaking up at times. When I wear a mask, I am unable to properly communicate with my teachers and my peers because they cannot hear me, or they are unaware that I am speaking. I am constantly asked to repeat myself and to speak up, which makes it hard for me to want to participate. Cohorts are another thing that I have struggled with. I took 3 classes this year that required me to make accommodations to my schedule. I was placed in a math class where I was given the textbook and assignments and told to teach myself the content while my teacher taught another class. My teacher was great at helping me, and I did not have a hard time learning the content, but I was still missing out on a classroom experience. I also opted to take two advanced classes in science and history, which I was told I could take when I had signed up for my classes. Because of cohorts, I could take these online, and so I did for a semester. The system that I took these classes on was horrible. I had such a hard time communicating with my teachers on it, and I learned very little. I have heard every single teacher of mine complain about this system, and the curriculums it provided were very different from the ones taught in the classroom, not to mention more

complex. Students need to be able to freely take classes that will help them learn as much as they can. Some of these mandates that were set have severely impacted my academic experience, which is why I think our local school system should be in charge of decision making.

I hope that my viewpoint will be taken into consideration in this decision, as it reflects the viewpoint of many of my fellow classmates and teachers. 

Dear Oregon School and District Leaders:

Thank you for your **steady** partnership as we navigate the challenges and shifts in preparation for next school year.

Today Governor Brown directed the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) and the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) to create a rule requiring face coverings in all indoor school settings, both public and private, for all individuals two years and older, including all students, staff, contractors, volunteers and visitors. This decision is in response to the sharp uptick in the spread of COVID-19 in Oregon and the emergence of the highly transmissible Delta variant of COVID-19.

This rule will take effect upon adoption. Summer school and other summer programming students and staff will also be required to wear face coverings when the rule is instituted.

## Maintaining Continuity of Learning By Maintaining Health And Safety

Universal and correct use of face coverings keeps kids learning in person, which we all agree is best for students. Two of the most important tools the state has to control COVID-19 are vaccination and face covering. However, currently children under the age of 12 are not eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccines authorized for emergency use. In order to protect students under age 12, individuals who are not vaccinated, and those with underlying health conditions that make them more susceptible to complications from COVID-19, as well as to minimize the disruption of student education in schools because of

exposure to a confirmed or suspected case of COVID-19, requiring universal use of face coverings inside schools is necessary.

## The rule will include include provisions for:

- Eating or drinking.
- Playing a musical instrument that requires using the mouth.
- Swimming or other water sports.
- Engaging in a sport in which wearing a mask could be a strangulation hazard such as gymnastics or wrestling.
- Nothing in the rule is intended to prohibit a school from complying with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), the Rehabilitation Act, or the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).
- A school that violates the rule will be subject to civil penalties.

The Ready Schools, Safe Learners (RSSL) Resiliency Framework will be updated in the next few days to reflect this change.

I realize this is a significant shift in direction. The vast majority of the recommendations in the RSSL Resiliency Framework remain advisory and in control of local decision makers. It is noted within the framework, "Changes in the amount of community transmission of COVID-19, the severity of illness associated with new variants of the SARS-CoV-2 virus that causes COVID-19, or the availability of vaccination for children younger than 12 years old may warrant changes to the state's recovery efforts during the school year. The Resiliency Framework will be updated to reflect any changes...ODE and OHA will continue to monitor guidance updates from the CDC, and will continue to align this recommendation framework as needed." It is imperative that we remain nimble as state and local partners to address the impacts of the global pandemic.

Hi Brandon,

You are not alone in asking this question. When it comes to potential cost for the District, it's important to keep in mind that there are limitations to your district's COVID-19 liability protection.

While HB 4402 (legislation passed during the emergency session in 2020) does provide districts with limited liability protections for COVID-19 related claims, in order to ensure the maximum protection possible under HB 4402, the District *must* be in compliance with all current "COVID-19 Emergency Rules," including guidance issued by ODE and OHA. So, what does this mean? It means that your District could be at risk of losing protections of HB 4402 if it were to open for in-person instruction and *not* be in compliance with ODE or OHA advisory or mandatory guidance.

Additionally, it's important to keep in mind that while PACE liability coverage provides for limited communicable disease defense costs, it *excludes* actual damages that relates to or results from any alleged or actual transmission of communicable disease, including COVID-19. Additionally, PACE's communicable disease defense coverage is capped at \$50,000 per member (i.e., District).

With all this said, I believe there is going to be a state-wide superintendent's Zoom meeting on Monday, during which I believe they are going to address questions about PACE liability coverage, the mask mandate, and issues around compliance vs. non-compliance.

We are also in the process of updating our <u>FAQ website</u>. If you don't already, I encourage you to have this page bookmarked – we update this website frequently, and we often include links to additional resources.

I get the frustration. The continuous changes are challenging as is the shift from local control. As we released the guidance we noted, "Changes in the amount of community transmission of COVID-19, the severity of illness associated with new variants of the SARS-CoV-2 virus that causes COVID-19, or the availability of vaccination for children younger than 12 years old may warrant changes to the state's recovery efforts during the school year." Sadly, this is that moment. The Delta variant has increased rapidly in recent weeks and is now estimated to account for more than 80% of new cases in Oregon.

You have named a couple of the issues:

- We will be bringing students together in a close setting indoors. Some of them are likely to be carrying the virus. This variant needs less than 15 minutes of close contact to spread.
- Schools have proven to be a safe place and able mitigate the spread, but only when multiple mitigation
  protocols are in place. The most critical of those is face coverings, then the others like airflow, physical
  distancing, and handwashing help support.
- We don't want to send individuals home or close schools we want our kids in school for in-person learning. The
  masks rule is being pushed to support continuity of learning.

The rule will be created by OHA. It will be a universal **statew**ide requirement as requested by the Governor and as is in place in Washington and California. It will be reviewed at least monthly with the hopes of curbing this current uptick and going back to local control on this mitigation effort as the others are currently.
