

ST. CECILIA'S CATHOLIC CHURCH Jasper, Alabama

The first Mass was celebrated in Jasper, Alabama in the lobby of the Collins Hotel in 1902 by Father Patrick O'Reilly. He traveled to towns along the Illinois Central Railroad Line between Birmingham and the Alabama/Mississippi State line. He visited Catholic families and administrated the Sacrament to them.

Mass was celebrated monthly in the Collins Hotel until 1915. At that time they moved the celebration of the Mass to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Henry McLean. There were many Priests' from the Mission that served the people in this area. Some of those were Rev. William Kerrigan, Rev. Andrew Sweeney, Rev. Max Coevert, Rev. James S. Down, Rev. M.E. Kitrick, Rev. John Bratton, Rev. Thomas Lenahan and Rev. Fred Diviney.

In 1916 Rev. Walter Tobin began visiting Jasper the second Sunday of the month to celebrate the Mass. At that time he listed his parishioners as Mr. and Mrs. Henry McLean and their four children. Also, Mr. Blanchard, Mrs. Schlanser, Miss Simmons and Miss Anne Dever of Cordova.

Rev. James White succeeded Rev. Tobin 1918-1920. Rev. Thomas Brady in 1920 listed three families with a total of nine persons in Jasper; eleven persons at Demar Station, two at Oakman, one family of six at Cordova and one family of six at Doleski Station.

Under the supervision of Rev. Joseph Parker who was here 1921-1923, the brick church on Sixth Avenue was erected.



The 75 by 35 foot building was completed in 1923. It was the first Catholic Mission in Jasper. It seated 125 people and cost \$12,000,00 to build. There were five families consisting of 23 persons in the parish.

The Mission was dedicated in 1923 by Bishop P. Allen and Rev. Parker, with a High Mass. Parisioners from surrounding Missions came to participate in the Solemn High Mass. The Holy Rosary Choir from Gates City, Birmingham, sang at the Mass. Mrs. John D. Gibbons played the organ and Mrs. Ellis Walker played the violin. There were basket dinners with picnicing on the banks of the Warrior River.

Rev. Francis McCormack was Mission Priest 1923-25.


In 1932 Rev. J.G. Moir, a Paulist Missioner, visited St. Cecilia Mission and baptized the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence and Sarah Pare Kreps, Clarence W. In 1934, Rev. Alexander O'Neil was here and following him was Rev. Hugh J. Duffy and Rev. Lorigan. In 1939 Rev. Alban J. O'Hara was appointed and remained in the mission until they were placed under the care of the North Alabama Mission in 1944.

The first Christmas Mass at midnight was celebrated in this Mission in 1944. There were 37 Catholics and 32 non Catholics in attendance. Other priests that served this mission were; Rev. Ballentine, Rev. Cordina, Rev. Campbell, Rev. Mullins and Rev. Michael Quealy, (who was killed in Vietnam War. He was a chaplain).

In 1962 a new site was chosen on a hill on 78 Highway West. The property was donated by Dr. Chapman. Construction began on the church under the direction of Msgr. Foster, who was Director of the North Alabama missions.

It seated 125 people with a cry room on the right and small quarters for the priest on the left.






The columns of marble at either side of the Altar were salvaged from the Cathedral in Mobile following the disastrous fire of 1954.

The Tabernacle was donated by an anonymous giver.


The front of the Altar depicts the Burning Bush, recalling the meeting of God and Moses indicating a Holy place.



The 34 unique windows were disigned by Robert F. Philips, a Birmingham artist. One of these windows were featured in a Birmingham Museum Art Show on Feb. 2, 1964. The transoms above indicate the Seven Sacraments and the Seven Gifts of God. The front doors have the ends of four prayers etched in the glass. The Altar rail was from the Our Lady of Sorrows Church in Birmingham. It was removed in later years. The Stations of the Cross were from the Catholic Boys Home in Mobile.

The pews in the cry room were from the Chapel of the old Community hospital.

The first Mass was celebrated on Easter Sunday, April 1963.



Due to the construction being done on the road, the dedication was postponed. St. Cecilia Mission was dedicated on Sunday, May 17, 1964 with Rev. Michael Dyer in charge. He welcomed those present during the High Mass of Thanksgiving. Celebrant of the Mass was Msgr. Foster. Archbishop Toolin blessed the interior and exterior of the mission and presided at the Mass. The John Carroll High School Glee Club under the direction of Sister M. Bridget O.S.B. sang at the Mass. Rev. Henry Dougherty, a John Carroll faculty member delivered the homily. At this time there were 36 families registered.

On January 10, 1967, St. Cecilia Mission was raised to the stature of a Parish by Bishop Toolen. Rev. Patrick Donoghue was appointed the first resident Pastor. Rev. Michael McMahon replaced him on Sept. 29, 1973. At this time the parish had grown to 90 families. Dan Whitaker became our deacon in May 1977. Rev. Jeremiah Deasy came on Sept. 15, 1979 and at that time the parish had grown to 110 families. Rev. Ray Keiser came to the parish on Dec. 15, 1984. At the present time our Parish has grown to 130 families.





At the time Father Donoghue was Pastor of the church the garage was erected at the back of the property. The area at the left of the church was enlarged to make living quarters for the priests.

Through the request of Joe Micheals a flag that flew over the Capitol in Honor of Rev. Quealy was presented to the Church by Congressman Tom Bevill, July 5, 1970.

A HISTORY OF OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE HALEYVILLE, ALABAMA

MISSION CHURCH OF ST. CECILIA CHURCH

For many years Winston County, Alabama, was without a Catholic Church, because of an insufficient Catholic population to warrant a church. Those Catholics who lived there attended church in Florence, Cullman, Decatur, and some even went to Tuscaloosa. With the advent of the mobile home industry to Winston and Marion counties and further industrial developments, sufficient number of Catholics arrived into these areas to warrant a church in Winfield and the celebration of Mass in Haleyville on a more regular basis. Haleyville became a part of the North Alabama Missions and was served by Fr. Michael Quealy, who was killed later while serving as a Chaplain in Vietnam. In the meantime, under the direction of Fr. Raymond Mullins a house was rented on 15th Ave., where Mass was celebrated for some time. Later the home of Michael and Eleanor House was used. Fr. Michael Dyer labored in this vineyard, until Our Lady of Guadalupe became a Mission of the new-founded parish of St. Cecilia.




CONGREGATION 1963



DEDICATION OF OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE

In 1971 under the direction of Fr. Patrick O'Donague plans to erect a new church in Haleyville got underway. Two mobile home modular units which served as a school in Lynn were later donated by Mr. Jim Forman, vice president of Commodore Homes. Unfortunately, this building was gutted by fire during construction. A fund was initiated by The Northwest Alabamian to help the Catholic people of Our Lady of Guadalupe begin anew in the erection of a new church. Ecumenically speaking, it was a major success. The present structure was made possible through donations from churches, civic groups, various industries, a large donation from the Catholic Extention Society in Chicago, and the tireless work of parishioners and pastor alike. Our Lady of Guadalupe was dedicated on Oct. 17, 1972 by Bishop Joseph G. Vath, Bishop of the Birmingham Dicese. After many years of struggle, to have a church of their own. The parishoners are proud to be in a position to share their church with the Lutheran brethren in Haleyville. From a few families in the sixties. Our Lady of Guadalupe is pleased with its growth to thirty-three families, despite the fact that we have a "mobile" congregation due to the nature of the local industry.




The addition to the right of the church which consists of a kitchen, restrooms, fellowship hall, library and classrooms, was constructed during the time Fr. McMahon was here.

Bishop Josefh Vath of the Birmingham Diocese conducted the formal dedication of the addition. The addition was sponsored by the Catholic Church Extension Society of Chicago, members of the church and five diocesan parishes.

It was dedicated in March of 1977, at that time there were 110 family members. The draftsman was Johnnie Shumate of Jasper.







The Grotto was built in 1979 by Father Michael McMahon and parishioners. The Grotto is centered around the statue of the Crucified Christ which was removed from the church when it was replaced by a statue of the Risen Christ.

Mr. Hugh Gerst donated the money for the statue of the Risen Christ.




The sign at the bottom of the hill was built by Allen Lafoy and Snooky Wallace in 1979.



As the church is growing, the breezeway between the church and the parish hall was closed-in to make more classrooms for the children. This was done in 1986. Father Keiser supervised this. Our CCD Students have grown to 95.

PATRON SAINT OF SAINT CECILIA

SAINT CECILIA

A child prodigy, Carlo Dolci (1616-1686) at the age of eleven painted a whole figure of Saint John, and a head of the infant Christ Child. While he was not a great master, his new and delicate style made him extremely popular in the Florence of his day.

At her wedding banquet, while the pipes were playing, Saint Cecilia sang to the Lord asking that her heart might remain immaculate, that she not be put to shame. This inspired early composers to write elaborate music for the antiphon used on her feast day, and Saint Cecilia became the special patron of musicians. For this reason she is usually shown at the organ, although a harp or lute may be used. Sometimes she wears a wreath of red and white roses.






Rev. Patrick Donoghue 1963-73









