Be Safe, Be Responsible, Be Respectful and Be a Positive Learner

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Special Education-Title1/LAP- Social Emotional Learning (SEL): Mrs. Duren

Recently I had the opportunity to spend some extra time with a number of past graduates of Evaline ...both recent and from many years ago. As is common when former Evaline students meet, they often will reminisce about "the good old days' and the unique opportunities to learn that Evaline was able to offer. They also would ask the same set of questions - how many students, staff, classrooms and grades are there now...and, is it still at its core the same Evaline School as they fondly remembered.

After having these conversations, it really hit home the importance of incorporating how to be students of character within our school days, as this was a key component to each positive memory which was shared. For example, the most recent character traits our students have been focusing on are Perseverance and Honesty. While pretty easy traits for students to define, with perseverance basically meaning "to hang in there, even when it gets tough" and honesty basically meaning "tell the truth", they also seem to be some of the hardest for students and adults alike to consistently apply to their lives in a successful manner. So, knowing how tough it can be to act consistently as a person of character in all of life's ups and downs, what can we do at an elementary school to make a difference regarding this need for our students?

Well, in all the conversations with past Evaline students, one thing stood out more than the rest, and that was the value of making a human connection and leading by example. Whether there was only 2 teachers,1 part time bus driver (actually not even ours- they were borrowed from Winlock as a morning only route), and a part

time custodian - as it was when my father attend Evaline, or the 9 classified staff, 3 administrative staff, 5 certified staff and 4 contracted specialists as it is today, the positive connections these people regularly have with our students fostered a sense of community and encouraged the students to treat each other as the kind of family they all wanted to have, even if they didn't have it at home personally at that time.

This kind of connection can only work if the adults are demonstrating in their own lives and actions what being a person of character looks like, such as being truthful in uncomfortable situations, or hanging in there when challenges arise. Evaline School is fortunate to be blessed with having outstanding staff members who care deeply for both the work that they do and the students that they work with. I want to personally take a moment to thank them publicly for caring for our students, their families, and our community as a whole through the hard work that they do each day in our district. As they demonstrate being the people of character which they are, it is directly helping to bring out the best in our students.
