In this competition, students had to create an arcade style video game. Then, at state, present the project to a panel of judges in a seven minute presentation. Cole Kleinebekel created an unbelievable Galaga-inspired game called "Star Shooters". He has spent countless hours on the project, beginning work in August and working with his Computer Science teacher during and after school all the way to the State Leadership Conference. The game has so many features, including three levels with over eight enemy types, three unique bosses for each level, a shop system, power-ups, functioning leaderboard and so much more. Cole plans to major in Computer Science when he graduates in 2023.

Keegan Parker and Spence Peters competed in 3D Animation. 3D Animation had the students create a 3D animated video that was three minutes in length and advertised a career pathway offered in our county. Spence and Keegan decided to focus on Industrial Manufacturing offered at the Career Academy. The students created ALL of the graphics in the video, as well as all of the music and voice acting for the video. They then had to present this to a panel of judges in a seven minute presentation. Spence plans to pursue a career in 3D animation most likely in the video game industry.

#### The Flying Legion, Houston County Robotics Team 3635

The Houston Alliance FIRST Robotics team recently competed in the 2022 Georgia FIRST Robotics State Championship at Mercer University. The team finished 20<sup>th</sup> in the state of Georgia's 67 teams. District teams are ranked against all teams in their state and the final rankings, once all district events have been played, are used to determine eligibility for State Championships and/or the FIRST National Championship (i.e. Worlds). This year the top 10 district teams qualified for the FIRST National Championship. While the team fought hard and earned numerous industrial design awards, spirit awards, and qualification points this season, they missed qualifying for the FIRST National Championship by 10 positions.

HCCA is incredibly proud of this team, as many members are freshmen and sophomores—very new to robotics. Most importantly, the skills they are learning and developing will certainly lend themselves useful in any STEM career path.

#### Houston County Robotics Team 3635, The Flying Legion, Competes in Peachtree District Columbus Event

The Houston County Robotics Team 3635, The Flying Legion, competed in the Peachtree District Columbus Event March 17-19, 2022. They were ranked 4th after the qualifying matches and were an Alliance Captain, getting to choose their alliance teammates. The team won their quarterfinals and advanced to semifinals. They were eliminated during semifinals with a record of 14 wins and five losses for the competition. The Flying Legion finished the competition ranked 5th out of 25 teams. They won the Industrial Design Award sponsored by General Motors, due in part to the engineering process in designing the intake arms and the bracket for their shooter. First they drew out their idea to scale and cut it out of wood, then they modified the design using CAD and cut it out of paper. They then ended the design process by making a final proof-of-concept model made of wood on the laser cuter. The team traveled to Mercer University where the final product, made of aluminum, was cut with the help of Mercer Engineering students on their plasma cutter.
