The district will protect students with food allergies when meals are in spaces outside the cafeteria All Kids Eat FREE! Money can be added to your child's account to purchase snacks, drinks, or extra meals – linqconnect.com

Please fill out the income form as it benefits the school and students in many other ways.

Our meal program is conducted as a non-profit operation under the management of the school lunch director. Type "A" lunch consists of 1/2 pint of fluid milk, two ounces of meat, fish, cheese, or poultry, or four tablespoons of peanut butter, or two eggs, or any combination of the above foods; also 3/4 of a cup of vegetables and/or fruit, and one serving of bread. Students are offered a choice of three out of five components. Salads are available daily. Paper copies of free and reduced meal applications are available in the main office and cafeterias. 

District Asbestos Management Plan 2024-25

The Hadley-Luzerne Central School District has submitted information regarding asbestos containing building materials in the central school district to the New York State Education Department in compliance with the Department's notification procedures. This information is documented in the school district's Asbestos Management Plan, which is in accordance with the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) of 1987 (40 CFR Part 763). This memorandum is intended to fulfill annual notification requirements.

In compliance with the AHERA Regulation, the school district conducted its Asbestos Triennial Re-inspection. Documentation related to the reinspection is available in the Asbestos Management Plan. The District continues to perform the required six month surveillance inspections as prescribed by AHERA. Anti-Idling Law

The Anti-Idling Law prohibits the idling of a diesel or non-diesel fueled engine for more than five consecutive minutes except to maintain temperatures inside the vehicles during cold or hot weather when it is required by certain regulations and the operation of equipment. Hadley-Luzerne Central School District's Transportation Department monitors compliance with the Anti-Idling Laws. When loading or unloading buses at school, buses are shut off. Visitors must follow the same rules and regulations regarding the idling of buses.

"School Bus Safety Is... One Bus Stop at a Time"

Be cool...follow the rules:

- 1. Be ready when the bus arrives. You are required to be at your stop 10-minutes before your scheduled pick-up time.
- The driver has the right to assign seats. 2.
- Always cross at least 10-feet in front of the bus and wait for the 3. driver's signal. Never crawl under a bus, and never go behind the bus.
- If you need to go to a different location, your parent or guardian 4. must send a written request to the school office. You cannot ride a different bus or get off at a different bus stop without a bus pass issued by the school office.
- No food or gum is allowed on the bus. Alcohol, tobacco, and 5. marijuana are forbidden.
- 6. No skateboards or rollerblades are allowed on the bus. Musical instruments that will not fit in a student's lap cannot be transported to or from school on the buses.
- No aerosol cans are allowed on a school bus (i.e. bug spray, hair 7. spray, etc.)
- You must stay in your seat while the bus is in motion, with arms 8. and legs kept out of the aisle.
- Remain seated until the bus stops at your destination. 9.
- 10. Head and/or arms must be kept inside the bus at all times.
- 11. Quarreling, fighting, or rough play will not be tolerated.
- 12. Swearing or abusive language must not be used. Yelling or shouting is not be allowed. It can distract the driver and cause an accident.
- 13. For the safety of our youngest elementary students in K-4 we ask that they be released to a parent/guardian or responsible adult. If a parent/guardian/responsible adult is not present, elementary students in grades K through 4 will remain on the bus.
- 14. No electronics on the bus.



Requirements For School Attendance

In accordance with the NYS Education Department Guidelines, students in grades PreK, K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11, are required to have a physical exam as well as all students participating in sports. Also, all new students entering the district must have a physical on file. If your child has not received an examination by his/her own physician, he/she will have the exam completed by our school physician during the course of the school year. Attendance: All children absent from school must submit a written excuse upon return.

Medication During School Hours

According to New York State Education Law 257, Mandated Procedure: All medication orders must be renewed ANNUALLY. This applies to a change in medication, as well as updated dosages. Furthermore, an adult must deliver all medications to the school in the original container.

All medications, prescription or non-prescription must be accompanied by a written prescription to the school nurse from the doctor and permission by the parent to administer the medication. The pharmacy label is not a sufficient order and cannot be used in lieu of a written order from a licensed prescriber.

All medication MUST be provided by the guardian/parent. We are sure you can understand that this procedure is designed to protect the child, the parent, and the school, and we hope in the event that your child must take medication during school hours, that you will cooperate with us.

Is My Child Too Ill for School?

Please be advised if your child has a temperature of 100 degrees and/or is vomiting, the child will need to be picked up from school and the child should not return to school until he/she is 24 hours free of temperature or vomiting.

BMI Reporting

Hadley-Luzerne will be required to report Body Mass Index (BMI) information to the New York State Department of Health unless a waiver is signed and returned to the school nurse.

Code of Conduct on School Property

The district is committed to providing an orderly, respectful environment that is conducive to learning. To create and maintain this kind of an environment, it is necessary to regulate public conduct on school property and at school functions. For purposes of this section of the code, "public" shall mean all persons when on school property or attending a school function including students, teachers and district personnel. The restrictions on public conduct on school property and at school functions contained in this code are not intended to limit freedom of speech or peaceful assembly. The district recognizes that free inquiry and free expression are indispensable to the objectives of the district. The purpose of this code is to maintain public order and prevent abuse of the rights of others. All persons on school property or attending a school function shall conduct themselves in a respectful and orderly manner. In addition, all persons on school property or attending a school function are expected to be properly attired for the purpose they are on school property.

A. Prohibited Conduct

No person, either alone or with others, shall:

- 1. Intentionally injure any person or threaten to do so.
- 2. Intentionally damage or destroy school district property or the personal property of a teacher, administrator, other district employee or any person lawfully on school property, including graffiti or arson.
- 3. Disrupt the orderly conduct of classes, school programs or other school activities.
- 4. Distribute or wear materials on school grounds or at school functions that are obscene, advocate illegal action, appear libelous, obstruct the rights of others, or are disruptive to the school program.
- Intimidate, harass or discriminate against any person on the basis of actual or perceived race, creed, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sex, sexual orientation, or gender (including gender identity and expression).
- 6. Enter any portion of the school premises without authorization or remain in any building or facility after it is normally closed.
- Obstruct the free movement of any person in any place to which this code applies.
- 8. Violate the traffic laws, parking regulations or other restrictions on vehicles.
- 9. Possess, consume, sell, offer, manufacture, distribute or exchange alcoholic beverages, controlled or illegal substances or any synthetic versions (whether or not

specifically illegal or labeled for human consumption), or be under the influence of either on school property or at a school function

- 10. Possess or use weapons in or on school property or at a school function, except in the case of law enforcement officers or except as specifically authorized by the school district.
- 11. Loiter on or about school property.
- 12. Gamble on school property or at school functions.
- 13. Refuse to comply with any reasonable order of identifiable school district officials performing their duties.
- 14. Willfully incite others to commit any of the acts prohibited by this code.
- 15. Violate any federal or state statute, local ordinance or Board policy while on school property or while at a school function.

Code of Conduct Penalties

Persons who violate our code shall be subject to the following penalties:

- 1. Visitors. Their authorization, if any, to remain on school grounds or at the school function shall be withdrawn and they shall be directed to leave the premises. If they refuse to leave, they shall be subject to ejection.
- 2. Students. They shall be subject to disciplinary action as the facts may warrant, in accordance with the due process requirements.



- 3. Tenured faculty members. They shall be subject to disciplinary action as the facts may warrant in accordance with Education Law 3020-a or any other legal rights that they may have.
- 4. Staff members in the classified service of the civil service entitled to the protection of Civil Service Law - 75. They shall be subject to immediate ejection and to disciplinary action as the facts may warrant in accordance with Civil Service Law - 75 or any other legal rights that they may have.
- Staff members other than those described in subdivisions 3 and 4. They shall be subject to warning, reprimand, suspension or dismissal as the facts may warrant in accordance with any legal rights they may have.

Code of Conduct Enforcement

The Principal or his/her designee shall be responsible for enforcing the conduct required by this code.

When the Principal or his or her designee sees an individual engaged in prohibited conduct, which in his or her judgment does not pose any immediate threat of injury to persons or property, the Principal or designee shall tell the individual that the conduct is prohibited and attempt to persuade the individual to stop. The Principal or designee shall also warn the individual of the consequences for failing to stop. If the person refuses to stop engaging in the prohibited conduct, or if the person's conduct poses an immediate threat of injury to persons or property, the Principal or designee shall have the individual removed immediately from school property or the school function. If necessary, local law enforcement authorities will be contacted to assist in removing the person. The district shall initiate disciplinary action against any student or staff member, as appropriate, with the "Penalties" section above. In addition, the district reserves its right to pursue a civil or criminal legal action against any person violating the code.

Pesticide Notification

Initial Notification To Persons In Parental Relation And Staff Pursuant to

Section 409-h of the State Education Law and Commissioner's Regulation 155.24.*

September 2024

Dear Parent, Guardian, and School Staff;

New York State Education Law Section 409-H and State Education Department Commissioner's Regulation 155.24, effective July 1, 2001, require all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year. The Hadley-Luzerne Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application;
- Anti-microbial products;
- Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- Nonvolatile insecticidal baits in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- The application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25;
- The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps, and hornets.

In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list. If you would like to receive 48-hour prior notification of pesticide applications that are scheduled to occur in your school, please complete the form below and return it to Mary Visscher, District Clerk, HLCS, PO BOX 200, Lake Luzerne, NY 12846.



FAMILY RIGHTS, STUDENT INSURANCE

Family Rights, Student Insurance

Family Rights

Each year we like to remind parents that you have the following rights according to Section 99.7 of the Family Rights and Privacy Act of 1974:

1. The right to inspect and review the student's education records.

2. The right to seek amendment of your child's educational records that you believe to be inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights.

3. The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's educational records, except to the extent that the Act and Section 99.31 authorize disclosure without consent.

4. The right to file with the United States Department of Education a complaint under Sections 99.63 and 99.64 concerning alleged failures by the district to comply with the requirements of the Act and this part.

A copy of our district's Student Records Policy may be obtained in the main office of the Hadley-Luzerne Central School District. If you have a question in reference to any of the above items, please feel free to contact one of the administrators at the school.

Special Education Information

Section 4402 of the NYS Education Law requires you have access to information for parents, guardians and other family members about laws, regulations and policies affecting special education programs and services. Student Accident Insurance

Should a student at the Hadley-Luzerne Central School District be injured at an approved school function, the parent or guardian must notify the appropriate Health Office and acquire appropriate insurance form (Parent Part B). The form must be completed by the parent/guardian and mailed to the address on the form. No claim is filed if the Health Office has not received written notification of the injury from the supervisor. (Always keep copies) The School District provides a very limited Student Accident Insurance Policy which may provide some excess coverage. This coverage is initiated after the parents/guardians' personal health plan has been used. Therefore, ALL BILLS related to the injury will first be paid by the family health insurance carrier. Should a balance remain, it should be submitted to the school's Student Accident Insurance Carrier. The amount of coverage if any, is determined by the insurance company, not the school. The benefits payable by the School Insurance carrier for school related claims are according to a fee schedule. ANY REMAINING BALANCE WILL BE THE PARENT'S RESPONSIBILITY. NO CLAIM IS FILED UNTIL THE PARENT COMPLETES PART B ON THE BLUE FORM AND MAILS IT TO THE INSURANCE COMPANY (THE PHONE NUMBER AND ADDRESS ARE ON THE FORM).
