
#### *Iurassic World Rebirth:* Review: An Enthralling, Life-Saving Adventure

# The History of Rap: Rooted in Heritage

Rap, as a genre of music, is a musical style characterized by rhythmic speech, often rhyming, delivered over a backing beat. The flow of rap is the rhythmic delivery of the lyrics, including the rhythm, rhyme scheme, and emphasis on certain words or phrases. A good flow is crucial for engaging the listener. The wordplay of rap is clever and creative use of language, including metaphors, similes, and other figurative language techniques. While often used interchangeably, rap is specifically the vocal performance style within the broader hip hop culture which also includes DJing, breakdancing, and graffiti art. Rap can be seen as the musical foundation of hip-hop, with the rapper being the primary

Rap, a core element of hip-hop culture and i s a form of vocal expression that emphasizes lyrical dexterity, wordplay, and flow, which is the rhythmic delivery of the lyrical American. It was started in the early 1970's by a dj named Dj Kool Herc.

It first started as simplistic poetry over beats and was usually constructed in clubs and party situations. It is derived from Jamaican and New York inner city culture. It was mainly used as expression breakdancers, graffiti artists and actual rappers. aka MCs. When rap got popular in the mid 70s to the 80s, rappers such as Kool G Rap, Rhakim and a list of others helped bring lyricism with metaphors and similes into rap. Late 80s gangster rap became popular with artists and groups such as Ice T, NWA, and Schooly D. In the early 90's rap became more popular with rappers like Kid n Play, Mc Hammer, Tupac and many more. Female rappers such as Roxanne Shantae, Queen Latifah, Foxy Brown and Lil Kim have also made an impact and paved a way for future female rap artists to be respected the same way as their male counterparts. rappers, female,Lots of rappers talk about political standpoints;

others makemade music about having fun. and Most of the newer rap at the time has become about hardcore gangster lyrics dealing with everyday life in the inner city.
