Gateway Partners With Local Law Enforcement And First Responders For Shop With A Hero Program







Gateway wrapped up yet another successful year of our Shop With A Hero initiative over the week of December 11 through 14, providing children in Cumberland, Gloucester, and Salem counties with the chance to connect with local law enforcement and first responders to shop for holiday gifts. Joining the heroes and Gateway staff volunteers were Albert B. Kelly, Gateway's President and CEO, and Edward Bethea, Gateway's Executive Vice President and COO.

As part of the program, each child was provided with a \$150 gift card to shop for their gifts of choice. This program aims to make sure that children in low-income families still have gifts "under the tree" for the holiday season, especially when finances are tight. With the support of our partners, our wider goal for Shop With A Hero is to build trust and positive relationships within communities, reducing the gap between police officers and first responders and the general public. With this goal, Gateway hopes to move forward in our mission "to provide services that improve the quality of life and promote self-sufficiency" while contributing to creating more connected, equitable, and resilient communities.

Gateway is thankful for our partners who volunteered their time to make this program possible (many of whom come back year after year), including multiple police departments, the New Jersey State Police, sheriff's departments and, for the first year, fire departments and EMS units – allowing us to expand our program to serve more children and forge more connections.

This program is provided by Gateway through a Non-Discretionary Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funded by the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, as well as funding and support from local Walmart stores.

As the City's Mayor, he expressed his love and appreciation for the Great City of Bridgeton, as he proudly calls it, and applauded everyone involved in this transformational and beautifying project.

The mural project was led by Esaul Martin, SEG Neighborhood Revitalization Coordinator and his then assistant Cassandra Avila, who is now Site Coordinator at Gateway Wellness Center in Salem. Michelle Lopes Barakat, Grantmaking and Program Manager for Justice Outside's Liberated Paths Program (Philadelphia) - which granted funds to help make this project possible - congratulated everyone on a job well done.

Edward Bethea Presents At Housing
And Community Development Network Of NJ Jumpstart Program







Edward Bethea, Gateway's Executive Vice President and COO, presented at the Housing and Community Development Network of New Jersey's JumpStart program on Friday, December 1. This program provides training and certification to nonprofit community agencies developing affordable housing, with a focus on Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC) developers, with a goal of closing the racial wealth gap in New Jersey. Bethea was the featured presenter at the first meeting of the series, discussing Gateway's experience in affordable housing development and neighborhood revitalization. Bethea currently serves as Vice Chair of the Housing and Community Development Network, and will be Chairman beginning in the new year.

Gateway's Foster Grandparent Program Brings Joy
To Head Start Children All Year Long













Gateway partners with AmeriCorps Seniors to provide a service opportunity for adults 55 and older in Atlantic, Burlington, Camden, Gloucester, and Salem Counties known as the Gateway CAP Foster Grandparent Program (FGP). Through this program, FGP volunteers visit many of our Head Start locations throughout the school year to read, play, make arts and crafts, serve meals and snacks, and spend meaningful time with the children. The program also provides the FGP volunteers with a larger social support system as they interact with other volunteers and attend meetings, luncheons, and holiday parties.

Not only do we recognize the importance of grandparents and grandparent figures in the lives of young children, but these interactions also greatly benefit our FGP volunteers. Socialization in and around retirement is vital for seniors in both maintaining and improving their level of independence and quality of life. FGP aids volunteers in developing stronger social networks and helps them live longer, healthier lives.

The program welcomed a new group of FGP volunteers on December 8, and held their monthly meeting on December 14, during which one of our volunteers from Williamstown, Ms. Elizabeth Beatty, shared her experience with FGP and answered questions from new recruits.

How Atlantic City Electric's New Smart Energy Network Will Benefit You

Atlantic City Electric is building a Smart Energy Network throughout its South Jersey service area. The network is designed to enhance reliability, improve the resiliency of energy service and customer experience, and support new tools and programs to help customers save money and energy. As part of Atlantic City Electric's Smart Energy Network initiative, the company will install upgraded smart meters for approximately 565,000 residential and business customers across its service area.

In addition to the benefits The Smart Energy Network brings to a household, the network will support the local companies within South Jersey as well. More than \$27 million will go to local companies that are supporting the smart meter upgrades. In addition to their current efforts in supporting the South Jersey community, Atlantic City Electric has continuously supported the South Jersey workforce. In 2020, Atlantic City Electric donated \$50,000 through its Community Scholars Program, to support local South Jersey students seeking careers in energy or related fields. The Smart Energy Network supports the efforts made by Atlantic City Electric by creating jobs for field technicians and support personnel. There is no upfront cost to customers for new smart meters. Customers will receive several communications prior to their meter upgrade providing additional information about the upgrade process.

The Smart Energy Network comes with numerous benefits once the smart meters are installed and activated. Customers will have access to new tools to help them manage their energy usage and lower their bills. Some benefits that customers will notice after the installation are:

- · Tools that can help customers use energy more efficiently and save money.
- Enhanced reliability with faster and more efficient power restoration efforts.
- More detailed outage information when outages occur.
- Reduced need for estimated billing.
- · Better integration of new clean energy technologies.

Customers will receive more information about the new features and benefits that will become available once Atlantic City Electric activates their smart meters.
