

Dedication

In the modern era (1938-2020)* of basketball Wadena has had approximately 20 head coaches. The most team success during that time has been under coach Lowell Roisum (1970-1984). His teams' cumulative winning percent during those fourteen years is significantly higher than during any other fourteen-year period before or since. In 120 years, no Wadena boys' basketball head coach has had a longer tenure nor more wins than Lowell Roisum. And none have won more conference and district titles. This "Scrapbook" is dedicated to Coach Roisum.

^{*}From 1927-37 the Indians thrived under Coach Anton Chermak, in an era marked by a "center jump" after each made basket. His teams won two District 24 titles, one Region 6 championship and they were runner-up of the 1936 Minnesota State Tournament. The 1936-37 season marked the end of the "center jump" after each made basket.

The Beginning

Wadena High School basketball started around the turn of the century. The Wadena athletic teams' nickname of "Indians" came from the town's namesake, Ojibwe Chief Wadena, who lived in the later part of the 19th century.

In the 1990's the Wadena and Deer Creek school districts merged and the new WDC athletic teams' nickname was changed to the "Wolverines."

The one constant affiliation for Wadena basketball was being a "large school" member of **District 24** along with Aitkin, Brainerd, Crosby-Ironton, Little Falls and Staples. Wadena was also a charter member of the **Mid-State Conference**, with 1954-55 being its inaugural season. In 1965 Little Falls joined the Mid-State Conference to make it a sixteam league.

District 24 Tournament Format

The general format of the District 24 tournament in the 1960's had two components, as in the past. First the small schools competed in the Sub-District 24 tournament. The champion and runner-up (or East/West division winners 1961-63) would then be seeded in the District 24 tournament with the six large schools.



Big Changes on the Horizon



The 1970 Minnesota State Champions would be the Sherburn Raiders. A community of about 1,000 Sherburn was much like the 1960 Minnesota State Champions, the Edgerton Flying Dutchman.





After 14 years as Wadena's head coach Roisum had collected more than160 wins, two Mid-State Conference titles and two District 24 Championships. In the thirteen seasons of 1960-72 Wadena won only 35% of its games. In the next eight seasons the Indians won 64% of their contests.

Wadena Basketball 1970's Team Affiliation

The one constant affiliation for Wadena basketball was being a "large school" member of **District 24** along with Aitkin, Brainerd, Crosby-Ironton, Little Falls and Staples. Since 1954-55 Wadena was a charter member of the **Mid-State Conference**. Little Falls and Detroit Lakes joined the conference in 1965 and 1970, respectively making it a seventeam conference. Effective the 1976-77 season Little Falls left the Mid-State Conference.

Below are the 1969-70 final standings of the six large schools of District 24. Starting with the 1970-71 season Little Falls and Brainerd would become class "AA" schools and therefore removed from the class "A" District 24 tournament while Aitkin, C-I, Staples and Wadena would be in the class "A" division and comprise the four large schools of class "A" District 24, along with the eight schools that formerly made up Sub-District 24.

District 24 Tournament Format

Effective 1970-71 Minnesota high school basketball teams were divided into two classes. Class "A" (small schools) and class "AA" (large schools) would each have their own postseason tournament. The traditional format of the class "A" District 24 tournament changed because of that. After 1970 there was no Sub-District 24 tournament. For the class "A" District 24 tournament, from 1971-75, the top two teams of the four large schools (Aitkin, C-I, Staples and Wadena) and the top two teams from the eight small schools were automatically seeded into the eight-team District 24 tournament. The remaining six small and two large schools had a "play-in" round and the winners were seeded into the remaining four slots to complete the quarterfinal match-ups.


- 1. For two seasons, starting with 1975-76, Wadena was moved into Class AA, Sub-Region 2 of Region 8. Effective 1977-78 they returned to Class A, District 24, Region 6.
- 2. Effective 1975-76 Bertha-Hewitt, Deer Creek, Henning and NY Mills joined District 24.
- 3. Effective 1976-77 Aitkin and Crosby-Ironton left District 24.

WADENA'S INDIANS, certainly the District 24 large school quant with the greatest ups and down during the 1964-65 season, can point to reasons for suffering 10 setbacks in 18 genes; but Brainerd's mening round District 24 tourney for Monday is a much-strengthened club at this time,


Evidence to that effect are its 71-62 and 66-50 windup victories over Staples and Detroit Lakes quints which dealt them 51-48 and 67-53 beatings carlier in the season when Coach Whitey Aus was without 6-3 rebounder Tony Schiller (ineligible the first half of the season) and 6-0 senior forward Brent Grangruth missed eight games due to an infection.

Schiller has played the last nine games and has ranged from nine to 19 points in scoring to total 119 points, Grangruth has not regained the scoring tnuch that saw him tally \$3 points in his team's first six games; however, he did score six points against Detroit Lakes.

Moving to the backcourt where the Indians were not too impressive in a 56-50 home floor loss to the Brainerd Warriors has been 6-2 senior Don Stoneman, the club's leading scorer with 32 points in 18 games. He teams there with Dave Campbell (146 points). This pair hit 22 and 21 apiece against Staples and 23 and 12 each against the Lakers. The Schillers, Tony and Larry, added 14 and 11 against the Lakers.





It was the fourth district crown in seven seasons tor C-1, which has been a finalist six of those seven tempaigns.



Effective this season, in the new two-class format, the previous District 24 schools all are in the small school Class "A," except Little Falls and Brainerd are in the large school Class "AA."



Wadena Wins First District Since '43

Wadena's Indians, champions of the Mid-Stote conference and now sporting a 19-2 record heading into the Region Six tournament at Moorhead Monday to face unbeaten Melrose, presented the school its first District 24 high school basketball championship in 31 years here Fridoy night.

Scoring a third victory this season over the Crouby-Ironton Rongers, this time by a 60-52 score, Caach Lowell Roisum's hustling quint brought Wadena its fourth district title of all time and prevented C-1 from attaining its 24th.

In records dating back to 1925, Wadene has gained the finals just 10 times. After winning 33-25 over C-I in 1943, the Indians last the next season to the Rangers, 38-37; fell to Brainerd 50-47 in 1950; lost to Aitkin 73-68 in 1959; and took it on the chin twice from the Rongers in 1965 (43-42) and 1966 (40-38).

Wadena didn't get this win put away until late in the final period despite charging from a 27-23 halftime lead to a 17-point spread of 54-37 at the close of the third stanza as C-i scored nine at the next 11 points to trail by just 10 paints at 56-46 with 3:20 to play.





Meeting Staples and Crosby-Ironton in the District 24 Tournament allowed the Indians to win for the third time against each team that season. That may have never happened before or since..


Teamwork

David Hunnicutt, class of 1979, asked to include a note sharing his thoughts when reflecting on the "evolution" of Wadena High School basketball in the 1970's. Below are his comments.



For every aspiring athlete at every level—in every town, everywhere—there is inevitably THE MOMENT. The "moment" is that point in time where everything clicks. There's a sense of absolute clarity. It all just makes perfect sense.

For the WHS basketball teams of that late 70's, there is no question that our "moment" was when the 73-74 hoops team took the floor for the first time. Seeing that group of guys perform at a very high-level—against some of the best teams in the state—was indeed a turning point for all of us.


In a continually-packed gymnasium, we watched Jebb Willis, Rick Grewe, Roger Olson, Duane Vandenberg and Tom Hamerlinck—and all the others—wage war against some of our mosthated rivals (Staples and Crosby-Ironton, you know we're talking about you).


And epic victories over highly-ranked teams like Little Falls and Bemidji—not to mention Mid-State Conference and District 24 Championships—only help to further solidify the notion that this is what we, as younger athletes, wanted to experience for ourselves. Undoubtedly, for us it was THE MOMENT.

Suddenly, playing hoops in the summer-time made perfect sense. Saving your lawn-mowing money for basketball camp was a no-brainer. Shoveling the courts in the dead of winter—awesome idea.

As young, aspiring athletes, all you can really ask for is an example and an opportunity. We found that in the 73-74 team. The way they played the game, the way they carried themselves on and off the court, the way they delivered in the big moments—it's what set the stage for the rest of the decade.

To this day, my teammates and I still talk fondly about that 73-74 team. And although it's never been said, every single one of us are grateful for those guys and that team. No doubt, it's what lit the fire in us. And because of that team—and their hard-work and leading by example—we were able to make some great memories our own…one's that have lasted us a lifetime.

After the Fact

"<u>After the Fact</u>" includes pictures and articles discovered after the "Scrapbook 1900-59" was printed. Also included are recollections "<u>From Joe Krause</u>," WHS Class of 1955. My path crossed Joe's when a book was recommended to me, "Life in the Slow Lane" by Wadena native Joe Krause. I loved it and shortly thereafter I connected with Joe. Since we have known each other, Joe has reviewed "The Scrapbook 1900-59" and I have read his sequel, "More Memories from the Slow Lane." Another excellent read.

Joe has been an avid sports fan since his youth. He provided me with his thoughts and recollections as he has paged through **"The Scrapbook 1900-59."** Hearing of his first-hand knowledge and experience has been of great interest to me.

From the Intro and Pre 1930's

February 5, 1916


From Joe Krause:

So far, I have read the introduction and pre-1920's and the 1920's. Several of the players from that era were people that I knew quite well in the community when I was a young boy but never aware that they were athletes. That includes Harold Parker, Maurice Merickel, Milt Gaslin, Harold Zosel, and Joe Rice.

When I was in the 5th and 6th grades, I played on The Eager Beavers. We practiced in what was called the "Little Gym" or sometimes called the "Old Gym". We had a hard time believing that the varsity team actually played home games against other towns in that gym. The "Old Gym" is described perfectly in the article dated Feb 5, 1916 "talk about homecourt advantage!" (NOTE: For those familiar with the old Wadena HS, and later the junior high, it was the band room in the lower level that was the "Little Gym.")

I was going to games with my dad during the years when the school colors were changed (effective 1948-49) from orange and white to blue and gold. I actually remember that the orange numbers were faded and hard to distinguish on the white uniforms.

	dilemma, the student body voted last January to change the school colors to blue and gold.



In a fast, exciting game Friday night at Wadena, the locals were defeated by a good margin, 22 to 8. Wadena enthusiasts say it was the best game ever played at Wadena.

The locals' defeat was due to the fact that the Wadena floor is very smail and exceedingly low. The baskets were only about two feet below the ceiling and is intercepted by two cross beams and eight lights with guards which protrude about a foot below the ceiling. The seats are on three sides and only about two feet from the court. Thus the long shots which are the feature of the Brainerd team, were impossible. All shots that were made had to be shot from the immediate vicinity of the baskets.

<u>After the Fact</u>: This 1923 Minnesota State Tournament team picture is replicated 50 years later at a 1973 WHS class reunion. Coach Kuefler and the surviving players are positioned as they were in 1923. Empty chairs represent their deceased teammates.



From the 1930's

From Joe Krause:

It was probably in 1947 when I was 11 years old and in the 5th grade that I looked at the trophy case in the high school. The large trophy for the 1936 state runner-up Wadena Indians was displayed. I studied the team picture and recognized many of the names from families still in the community. Bill Browne was one of them. He had established a restaurant downtown called the Dairy Bar. I actually became a friend of Bill's shortly after I was out of high school. It was somewhat earlier that I learned of his heroics in the opening game of the state tournament.

No one seemed to talk about any of the other years or teams or individuals from the 1930's. Yet, the next four years they were 15-8, 13-7, 11-7, and 15-8 for a combined 54-30. Pretty darn good.

Ironically, my autobiography, "Life In the Slow Lane," begins with my birth on March 19,1936 (NOTE: the same date as Bill Browne's infamous shot) and the 1936 State Tournament. The first pages recall events of the tournament and how it tied into my birth.







"The Center of Attention"



The 1936 season was the most successful run of any Wadena basketball team in school history. In fact, the 1930's decade was full of success. The other District 24 Championship of the decade came two years earlier in 1934. One of the senior leaders on that team was center **Russ Askew**. When compiling "The Scrapbook 1900-59" I discovered there was an Askew starting at center for five consecutive seasons from 1929-34. I could not determine if it was Russ Askew alone or not. During those five seasons an Askew (first name unknown) was

named to the 1931 All-District 25 Honorable Mention Team and Russ Askew was named to the 1934 All-District 24 First Team. While I tried to determine if Russ Askew was possibly a five-year starter, I looked at a number of factors including box scores. I was focused on points scored. It seemed Russ was only an average scorer. Eventually I noticed a statistic that I was not in the habit of thinking about. See the "evidence" below that may explain the primary value Russ Askew brought to his team in 1934, and perhaps in a number of previous seasons.

In the above three games Russ Askew gave his team 61 more possessions than their opponents. Russ Askew looked tall and lanky and I would bet he had great timing and an impressive vertical jump. He was surely a top rebounder as well. I never was able to confirm if he was the center for five years, however, I did discover that his brothers could not have played in the years just before him. Based on that discovery I do believe Russ Askew was likely a five-year starter.

From the 1940's

From Joe Krause:

I was just 7 years old when Wadena won their last District Championship (1943). No memory at all of the event itself. In 'More Memories from the Slow Lane', I said "The first game that stands out in my memory would have been in 1945 when I was 9 years old. It was a District 24 tournament game over in Brainerd with Wadena playing the host school." Brainerd won 39-30.

I was in the 4th and 5th grades respectfully in the 1946 and 1947 seasons where they won a combined total of 3 games. I was in the 6th grade in 1948 and old enough to make the short walk over to the high school gymnasium. I remember the optimism about future seasons although they won only 4 games. Bob Hedstrom and Pat Merickel were sophomore starters and often leading scorers. Other contributors included sophomores Ken Jordahl, Chuck Garr and freshman, John Nyberg. The next year, I remember the disappointment in the community when the 1949 team lost the opening game in the District Tournament to Little Falls by 2 points

After the Fact:

From the 1950's

From Joe Krause:

I remember the enthusiasm in anticipation of the 1949-1950 season. The Wadena vs. Brainerd game is included with 'The Fifteen Most Memorable Events' in the Sports Chapter in my second book, "More Memories from the Slow Lane". NOTE: Below is an excerpt from Joe's book:

were packed with fans. As I recall, Wadena started slowly and trailed at halftime by something like 33-26. Wadena had several three-year starters headed by a 6 foot 3 inch center named Bob Hedstrom. That was a tall player in those years. Hedstrom was a complete basketball player who would dribble the ball up the court against a press, and could take the ball inside, or shoot jump shots from 10-20 feet from the basket. Hedstrom took over in the second half and did all of those things. I remember leaping to my feet on those bleachers with every basket. Hedstrom finished with a school record 37 points that held for many years, as Wadena rallied to win like 63-57. The Sunday *Minneapolis Tribune* followed that Friday game with a headline on the high school sports page proclaiming "Wadena Rises as Region Six Threat". They

NOTE: In that December 16, 1949, game both teams were undefeated. Brainerd ended their season at 22-1. Wadena finished 17-6.

The 50-47 loss to Brainerd in the District 24 championship game that year was a heartbreaker since they had made a great comeback late in the game. I was returning from a game in Little Falls with the St. Ann's basketball team when we heard that they lost the game. There was one other huge win that year and that was a home win over a strong Bemidji team.

The cupboard was left bare for the 1950-1951 season. These next four seasons were the years when I was in high school. Did it bother me that the basketball teams were that bad each and every year? Not that much! As for my freshman year, I recalled in 'Life in the Slow Lane' that "I was satisfied with my playing time". In my sophomore season, I recalled that " My longtime friend, Buzz Gouldin and I usually started together as guards on the jr. varsity team." I hung around in my junior season without contributing because I enjoyed the comradely of being with the teammates and just being on a team.

I followed the progress of the teams after graduation and when I was a student at the 'U'. Of course, I was well acquainted with the players. The 1955 winning streak (NOTE: after starting 0-5 Wadena rattled off 10 straight wins) was amazing and the upset win over Brainerd was a big deal. I did see my first game in the new gym in December of 1955. I was still dating Cathy Campbell and her brother, John (NOTE: John Campbell, the eventual Minnesota Gopher All-Big Ten and All-American football player, and NFL All-Pro in his 8-year career with the Vikings, Steelers and Colts), was a senior forward. The 1957, 1958, and 1959 seasons were similar to the earlier seasons of 1948, 1949 and 1950 that culminated with outstanding seasons that came up just short.

I totally agree that Bob Hedstrom, Pat Merickel, Dick Shearer, Bill Gaslin and Sam Phillips were clearly the outstanding players of the 1950's.

Obviously, I thoroughly enjoyed reviewing and commenting on "The Scrapbook 1900-59".

Statistics of Interest

I have always been interested in numbers, statistics, spreadsheets and the like. Not everyone is interested in those things but sports fans in general share some degree of interest in "sports stats." The only real sports statistic that matters is wins and losses. Significant change in any sport makes individual and team statistical comparisons inconclusive. In the sport of basketball significant changes include:

eliminating the center jump after each made basket.
widening the lane.
implementing the three-point shot.
adopting a shot clock.
other rule changes.
change in level of competition.
etc....



As stated, these and other changes make it difficult to draw any meaningful conclusions about individual player and team statistics from one era to the next. However, it is still fun to look at the numbers from one team to another. And toward that end, I have included some player and team statistics.

Let it be known that my documentation is incomplete and therefore these statistics are not intended to be any official declaration of school records. These statistics are just included for the fun of it. My data are from my compilation of information reflected in "The Scrapbook: 1900-59" and "The Scrapbook: 1960-80," raw data sheets compiled by coaches Whitey Aus (1964-70) and Lowell Roisum (1970-84), a few player scrapbooks from the 1960's and 1970's, and newspaper archives.

Below are team facts and "stats." Behind them are the coaches' "Raw Data" sheets.


Mark Olberding 6'8"

Melrose High School 1971-74 Minnesota Gophers 1974-75 NBA 1975-87 -San Antonio Spurs -Chicago Bulls -KC/Sacramento Kings

December 1971

Mark Olberding played against Wadena in each of his three seasons as a regular for "The Dutchman." In early 1971 the 6'4" sophomore, Mark Olberding, led the Dutchmen with 21 points beating the Indians easily on the road. At the time no one knew much about him.





February, 1973

The next year Wadena traveled to Melrose late in the season. Olberding was now 6'7" and every basketball fan in the state knew of him. The Indians put up a good fight. With Wadena leading 52-51 with 3 minutes remaining, Olberding (39 points, on 18/21 FG, and 17 rebounds) and the Dutchman scored the last 10 points of the game.

<u>March, 1974</u>

In the Region 6 semifinals Wadena (19-2) drew #1 Class "A" Melrose (21-0). Olberding got into early foul trouble, but Wadena was unable to capitalize. The Dutchmen won 52-36 behind Olberding's 18 points. Melrose went on to claim the state title and finish 27-0.

Frank Wachlarowicz 6'5"

Little Falls 1973-75 St. John's University 1975-79



Frank Wachlarowicz, aka "Frankie Alphabet," was 6'5" and built like a lineman. He competed against Mid-State Conference opponent Wadena four times in two years. He and his team were 3-1 against the Indians. His best effort in those games was in the first 1974 encounter when he dropped in 35 points. The lone loss was in meeting #2 of 1974 when Wadena won the game and the Mid-State Conference, with the Flyers finishing second. In 1975 Little Falls won twice as Wadena finished second and Little Falls not only won the conference, but they won the state championship as well.

The above facts are impressive, but not the reason Mr. Wachlarowicz is included in this "Opponents of Interest" section. The main reason is because after his four years as a star on the Division III St. John's University basketball team, he had accumulated more points than any other Minnesota collegiate basketball player ever. At any level, Division I, II or III. He amassed 2,357 points. His scoring record stood for 39 years, from 1979-2018. Division II St. Cloud State player Gage Davis is the new record holder with 2,599 points.





Frank Wachlarowicz The leading scorer in the history of Minnesota collegiate basketball


A native of Little Falls, Minn., Frank Wachlarowicz rewrote the record books at Saint John's including most career rebounds and free throws. Wachlarowicz had stunning career numbers for the Johnnies with 2,357 points, a Minnesota collegiate record at all divisions. His impressive play on offense and defense led Saint John's to four straight berths into the NAIA

Brady Lipp

Breckenridge 1975-78 North Dakota State University 1978-81

Brady Lipp comes from a basketball family. His dad, Steve Lipp, was the head coach in Breckenridge for many years and enjoyed much success with Region 6 titles in 1976, 1978 and 1979. The Cowboys played Wadena in a few games over the years but the biggest for Wadena was in the 1978 Region 6 semifinals.

Lipp's collegiate career was very successful at NDSU




In 2003 Mr. Lipp attended the "NCAA Final Four" tournament. In addition to the college basketball games at night there are many activities going on during the daytime. One such activity that year was the **NCAA Final Four Fans' Hoop Shoot Free-Throw Contest.** Brady Lipp entered the contest. He won. He made 266 free throws in a row before finally missing. Impressive!

FAMILY FOOTPRINT

For the "Family Footprint" section I will most certainly overlook Wadena families whose "footprint" on Wadena High School boys' basketball should have been included. I have tried to identify families whose members have contributed to WHS boys' basketball for periods of time spanning multiple decades. I have relied on the research I have done, going back to "The Scrapbook 1900-59" and continuing with "The Scrapbook 1960-80." To allow for my oversight I have left an area at the end of this section for you to add any families whom have left their footprint on Wadena basketball.

The Zosel Footprint

It is worth noting that from 1924-70 there were sixteen Wadena basketball teams that included at least one Zosel, and at least one of those teams competed in each of the six decades represented during that time. Additionally, **Robert Zosel** was the official scorer at the boys' basketball games, replacing his uncle **Ray Zosel*** in 1948. His tenure covered four decades, ending in the late 1970's.

Many of the Zosels participated in the early years of the 1900's. First names, stats and records were sparse. The Zosel footprint was huge.

The Browne Footprint

From 1933-78 Wadena High School basketball saw five Brownes play on eleven teams in four different decades. **Bill** (1933-36) hit a mid-court game winning basket against Sleepy Eye in the quarterfinals of the 1936 Minnesota High School State Tournament. The Indians went on to lose to Bemidji in the championship game. Read more about that tournament in the "After the Fact" section, on page 69.

The other Brownes included Bill's brothers **Don** (1938-39) and **Jack** (1941-43) as well as Jack's sons **Kip** (1967-69) and **Jeff** (1975-78). Team accomplishments during their participation include:



Researching the first eighty years of Wadena High School basketball has truly been a labor of love. This "Scrapbook 1960-80" will conclude my efforts to document its past. The primary reason for this is because online research was not an option for the years of the late 1970's and beyond. The convenience of conducting research from the comfort of my recliner is what made this project possible.

In addition to the online research conducted for the past two years I was also able to connect with WHS alums from four decades covering the 1950's-80's. Some have provided their memories while others provided access to their own scrapbooks and some have provided financial assistance toward the cost of producing this scrapbook. I thank them all for their unconditional generosity.

Before I bring this project to a close I would like address one last issue, and that is moving from a one-class to a two-class state tournament and currently a four-class format. Speaking as a fan of high school basketball (and not as a coach or a parent), at the end of a season I would like to know who has the best team in the state. In the last five years of the 1960-80 seasons basketball fans were denied knowing who had the best team. The sixteen seasons from 1960-75 saw the best teams in the state to include Edgerton (1960), Marshall (1963), Luverne (1964), Sherburn (1970), St. James (1972), Melrose (1974) and Little Falls (1975).

To increase interest and excitement for Minnesota high school basketball at tournament time consider this simple proposal. "The Minnesota High School Basketball Final Four." Keep the fourclass format, but one week after those champions are crowned have a tournament with the class A vs 2A winner taking on the class 3A vs 4A winner in a "Final Four" title game. This would guarantee a "David vs Goliath" matchup in the championship game. Plus, we find out who has the best team. If you doubt my proposal re-read the previous paragraph. Seven smaller schools were the state champs in a sixteen-year stretch. My guess is the kids from each team would jump at the opportunity to participate.

I know my idea will never come to be, but I think it would be great fun. I would attend.
