
Georgia pharmacy technician programs are available at technical colleges.

A Day in the Life of an Pharmacy Technician

Pharmacy Technicians help licensed pharmacists dispense prescription medication. They work in retail pharmacies and hospitals.

As a Pharmacy Technician, you will spend much of your time interacting with customers; you will need to be helpful and polite with people of all kinds. You will do such routine things as collecting information for filling prescriptions, measuring medications, compounding medications (such as ointments), packaging and labeling prescriptions, and accepting payment. You will work under the supervision of a pharmacist, who will review all prescriptions before they are given out. You may work in a hospital or other clinical setting, or in the pharmacy department of a retail store.
