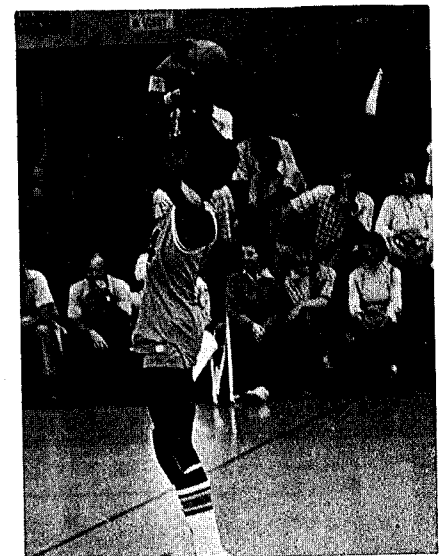

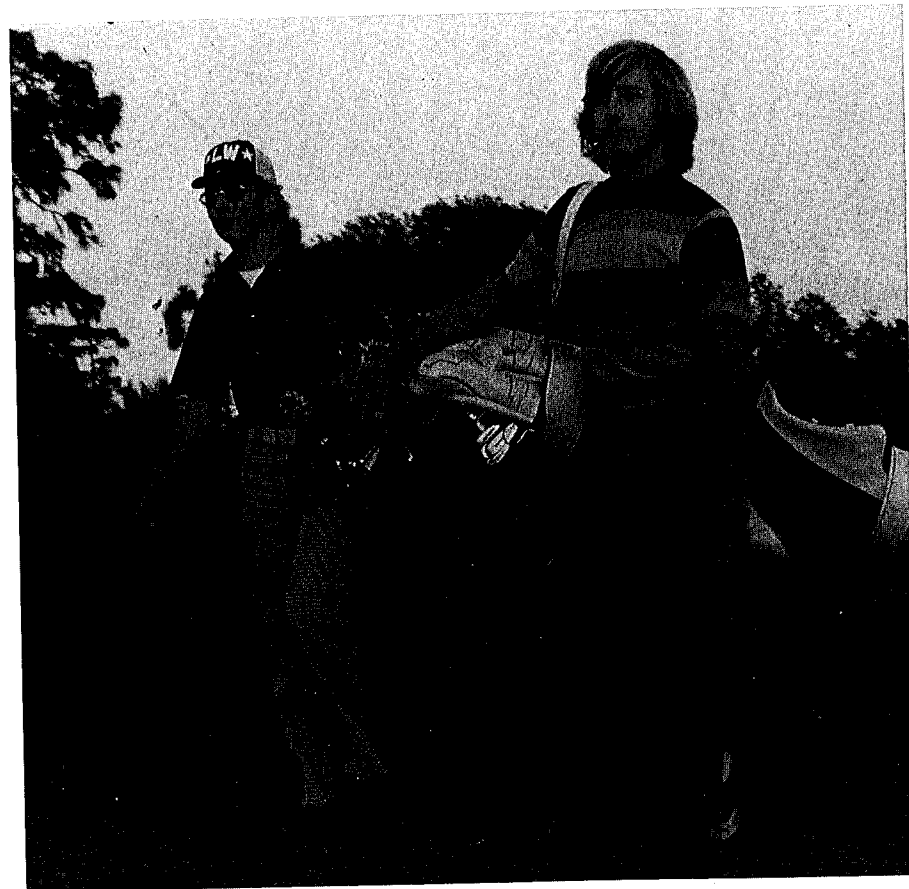




## Lake Wales Places Fifth In District

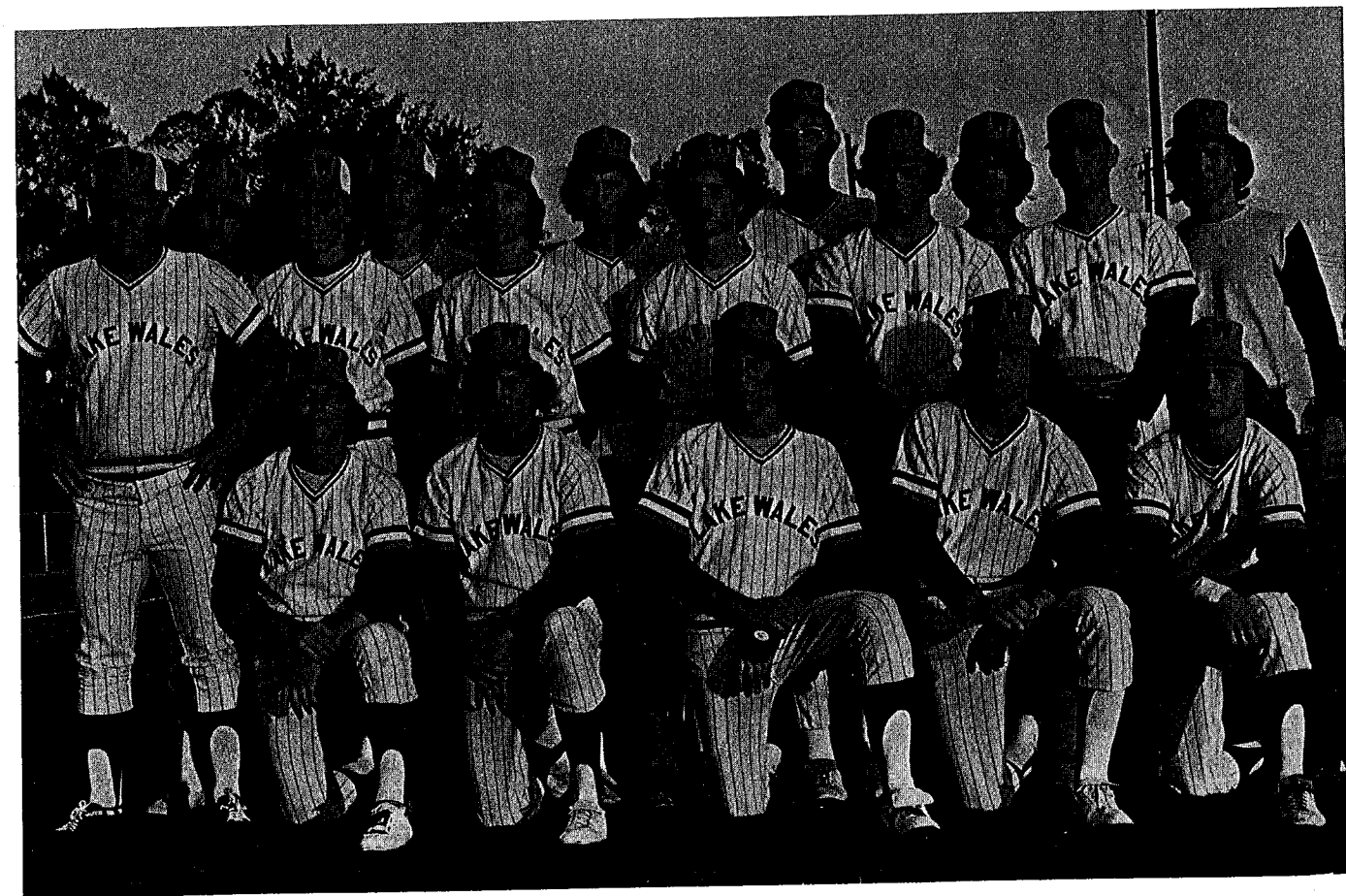


## White Named To First Team All Conference

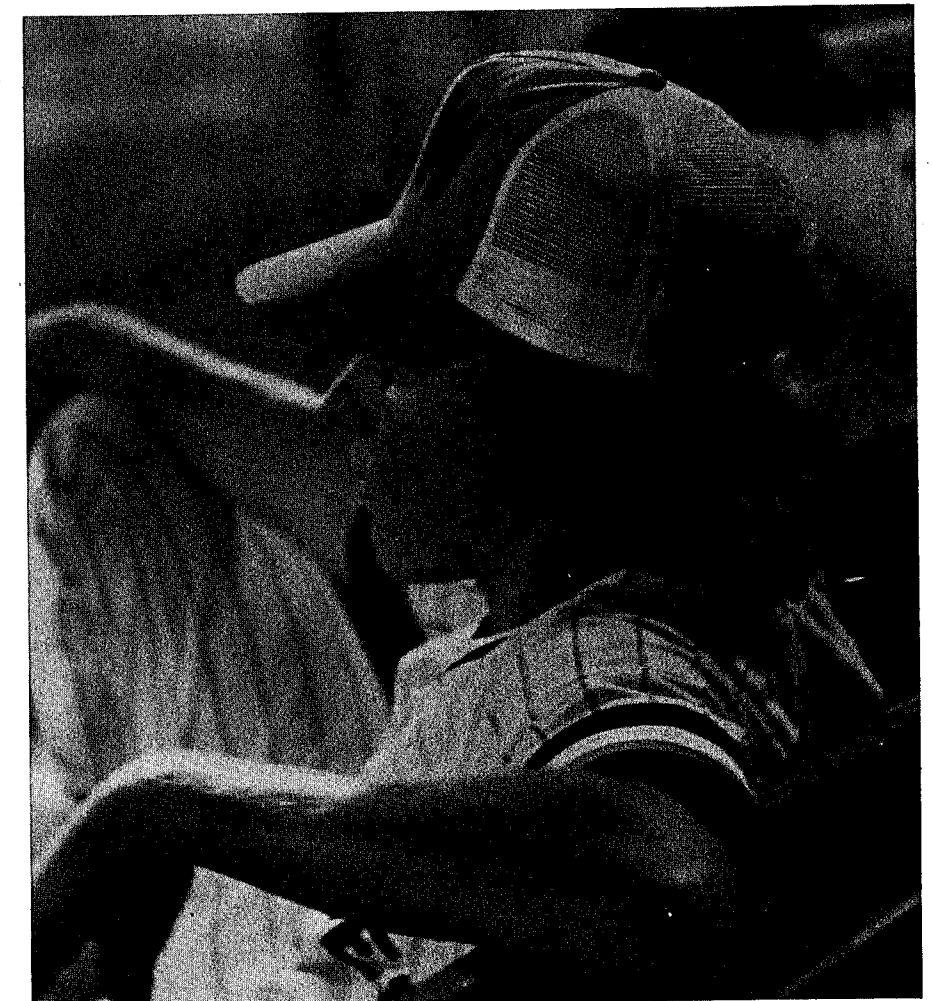

## J.V.'s Finish Season With 7-3 Record

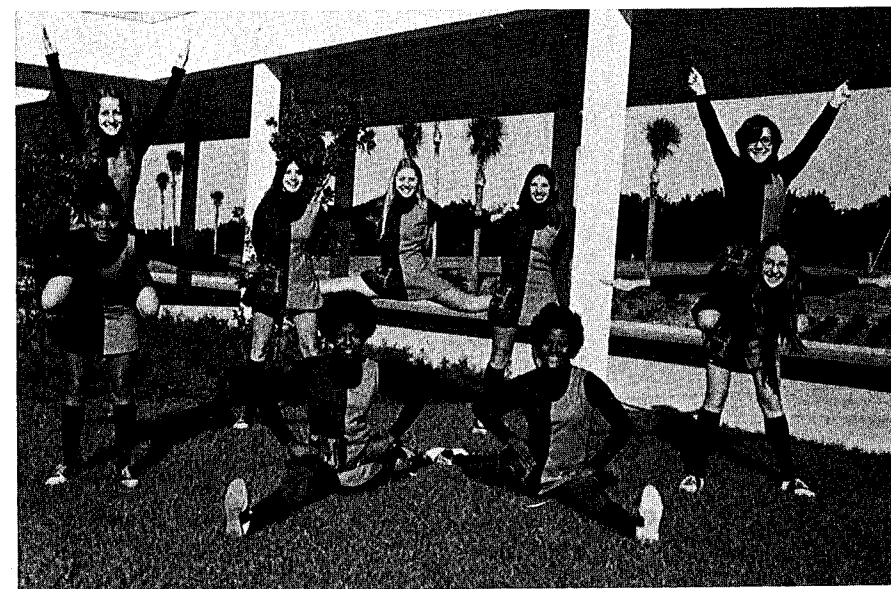
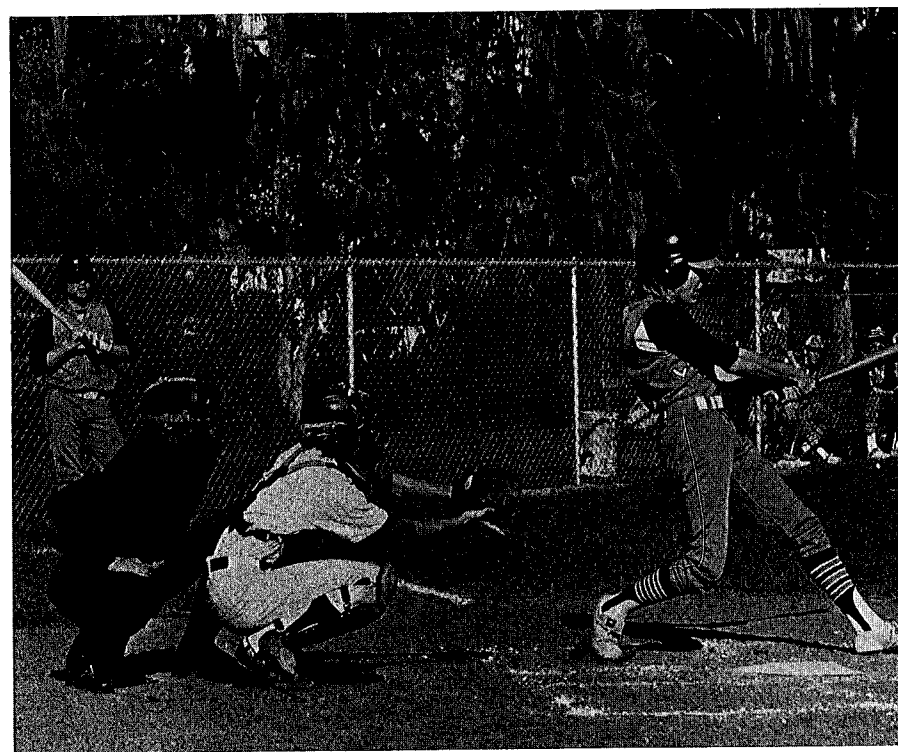

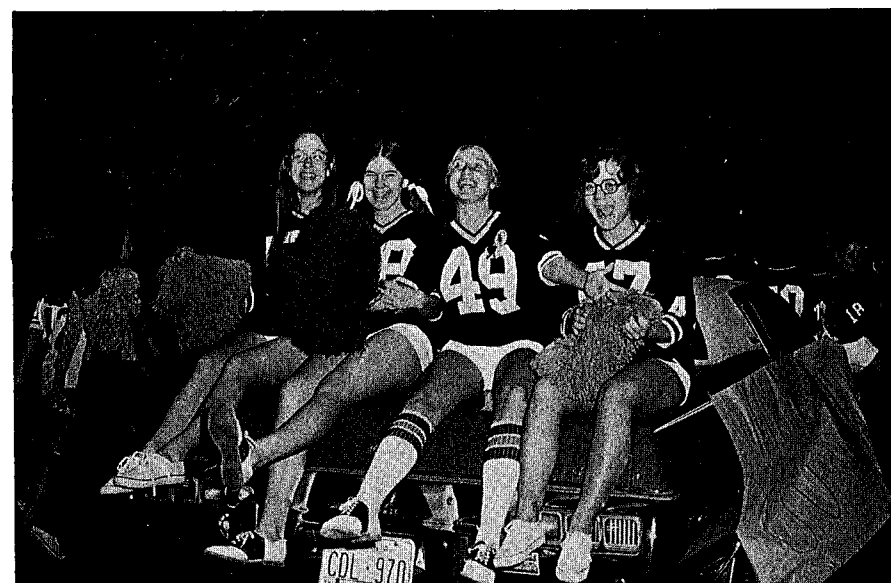
A strong pitching unit lead the Highlanders to six other victories. With a good hitting team and outstanding fielding, the Highlander J.V.'s had a highly successful season.

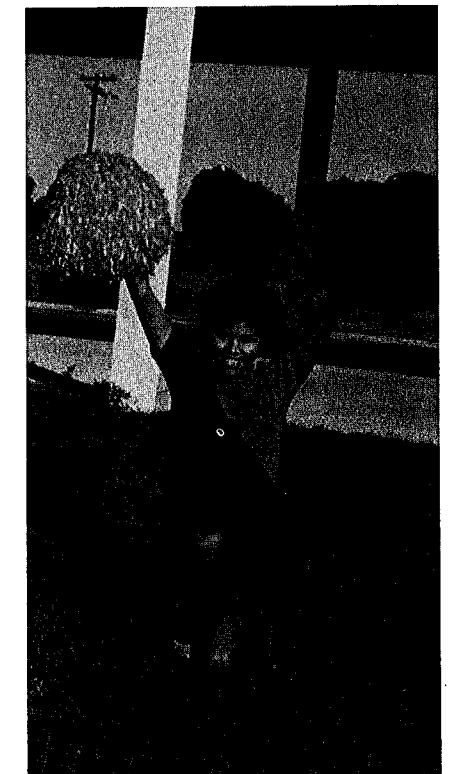


## Cheerleaders Lead Support For Highlanders

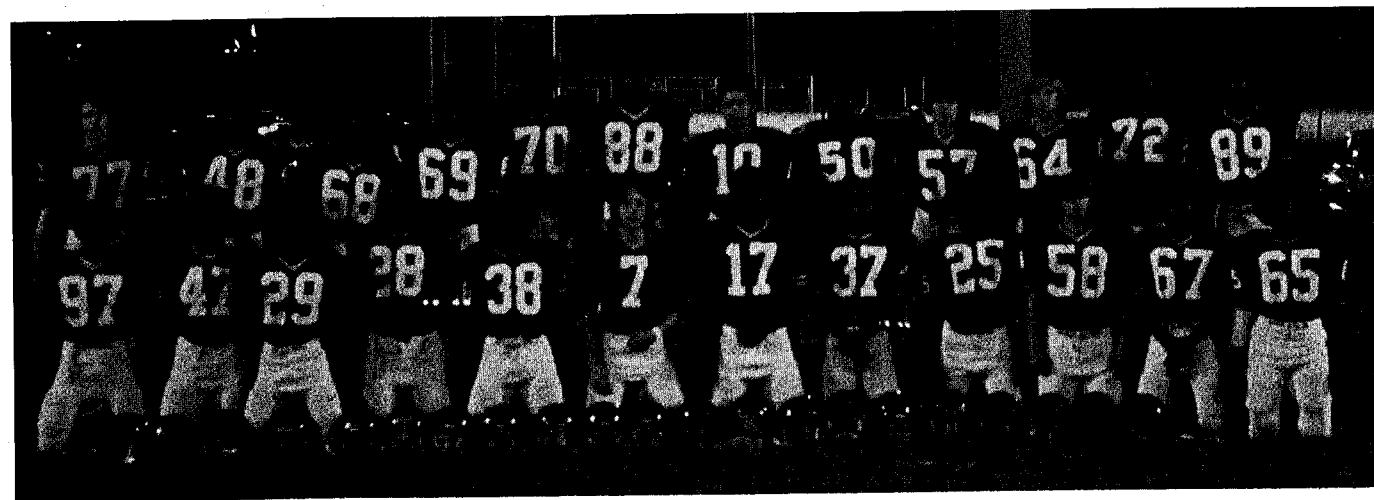
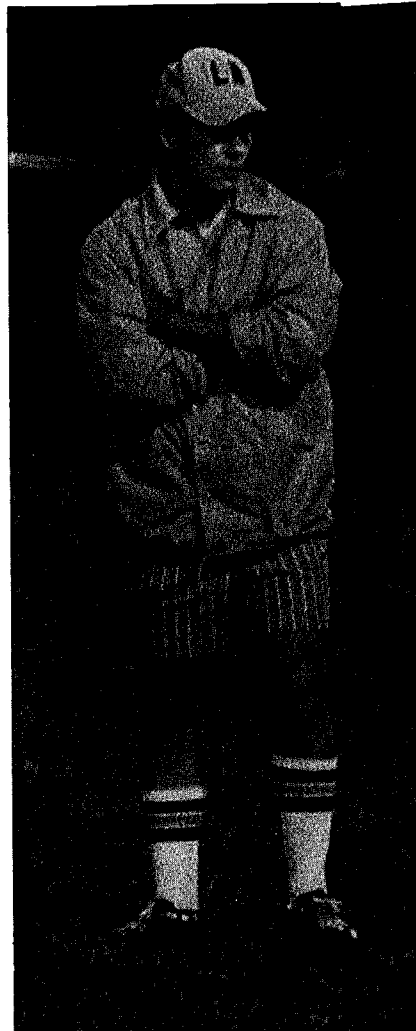




## Jayvees Strive For Perfection

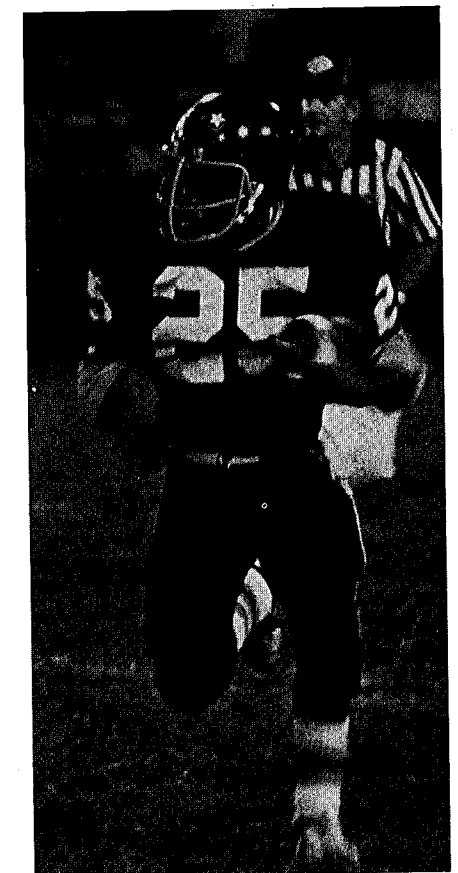
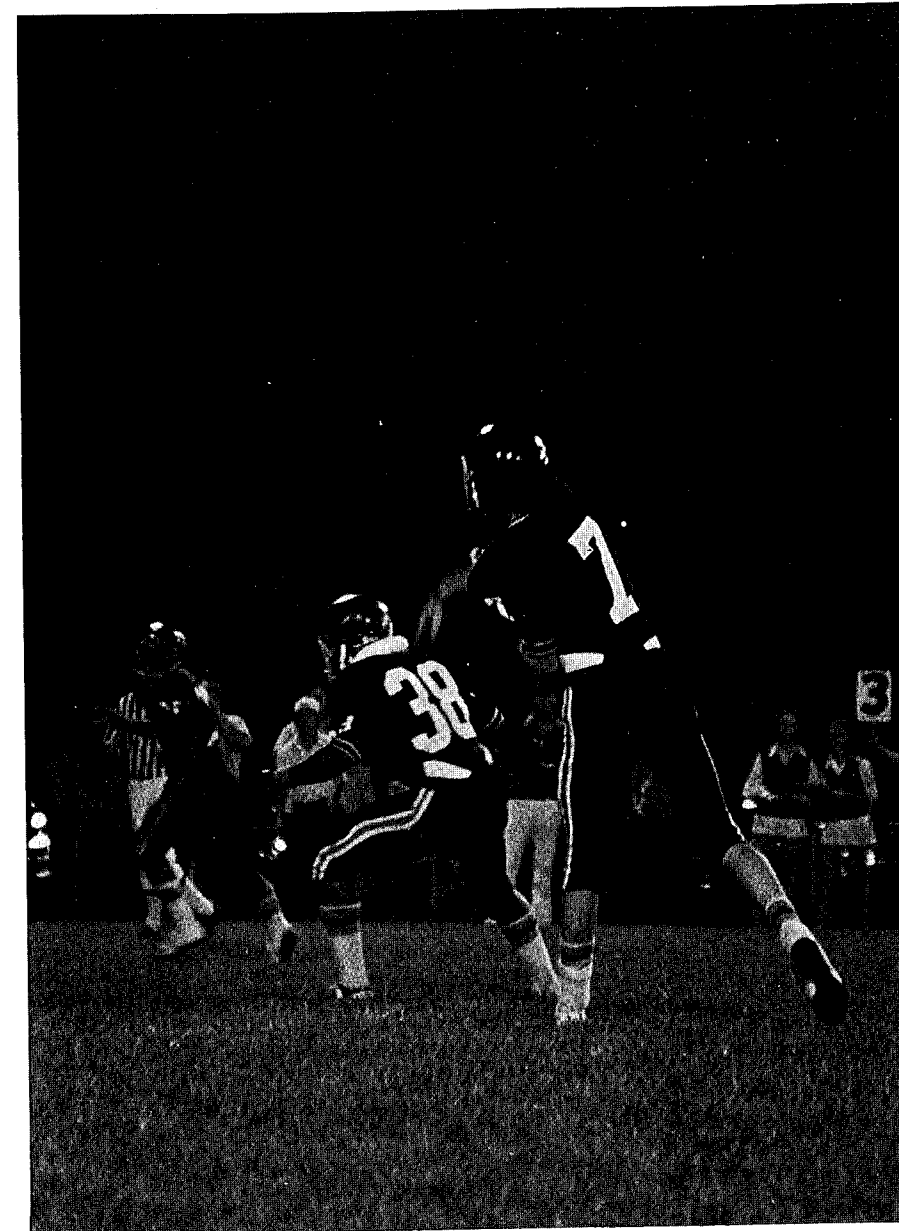

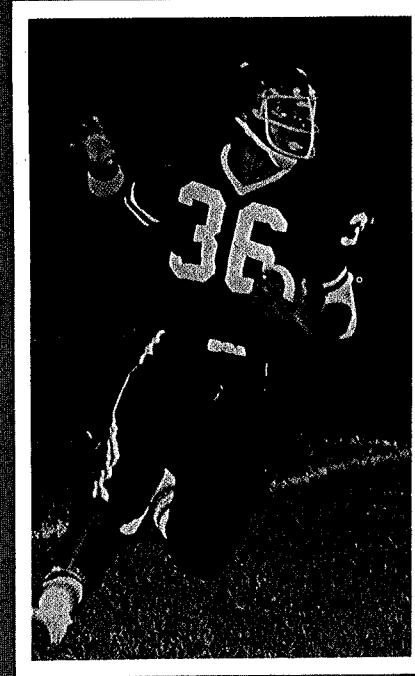
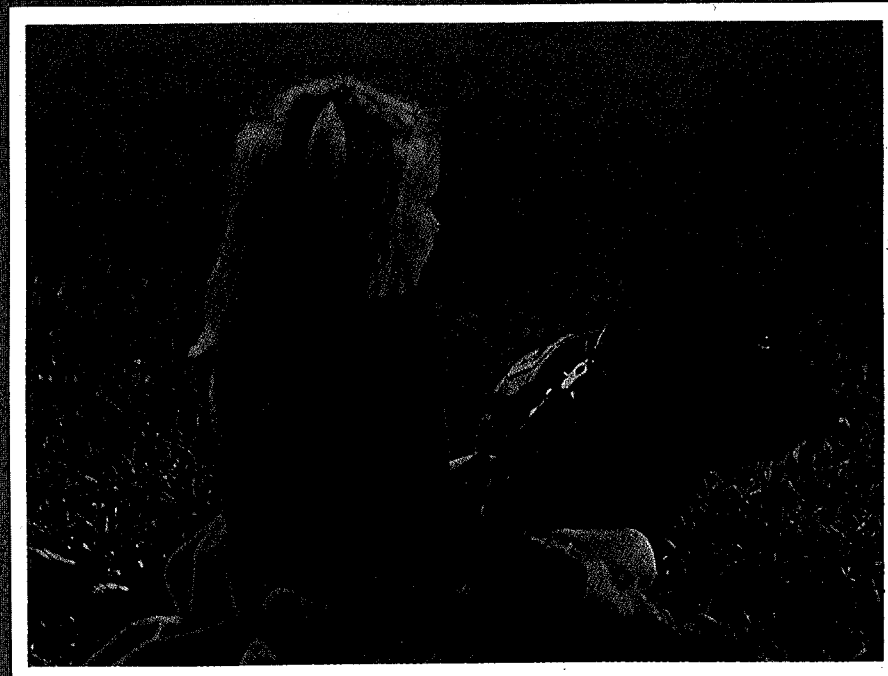
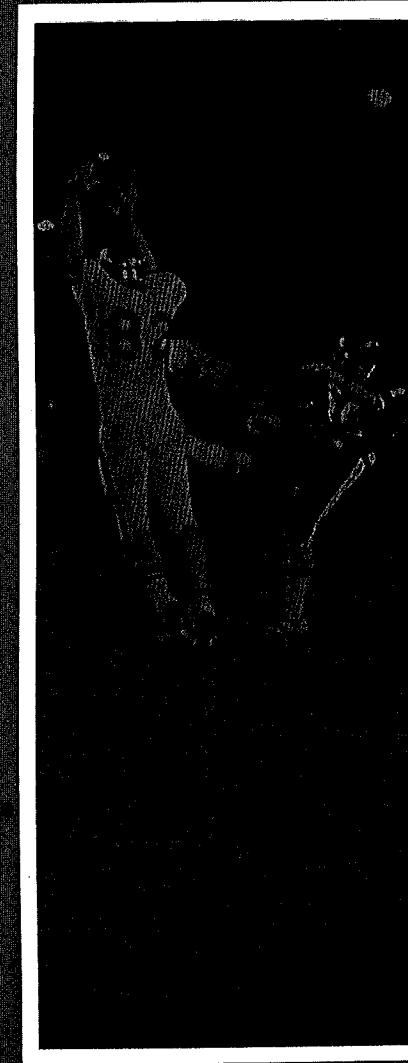
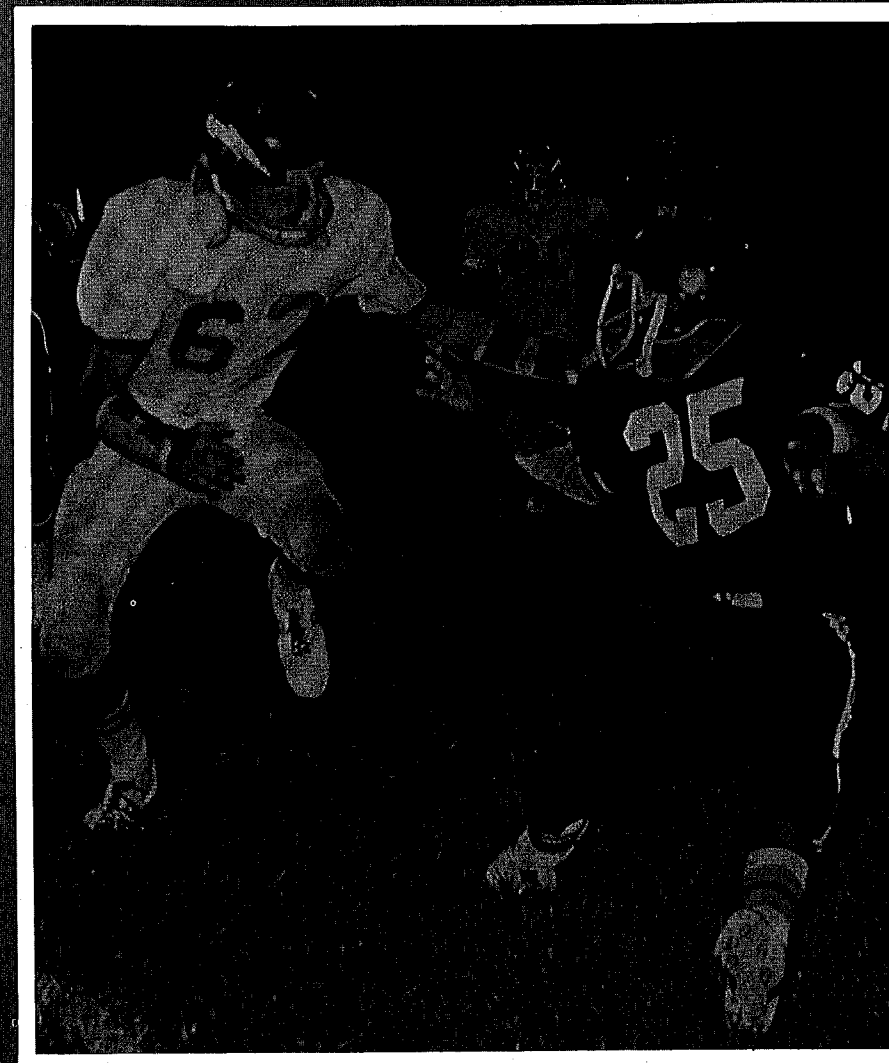
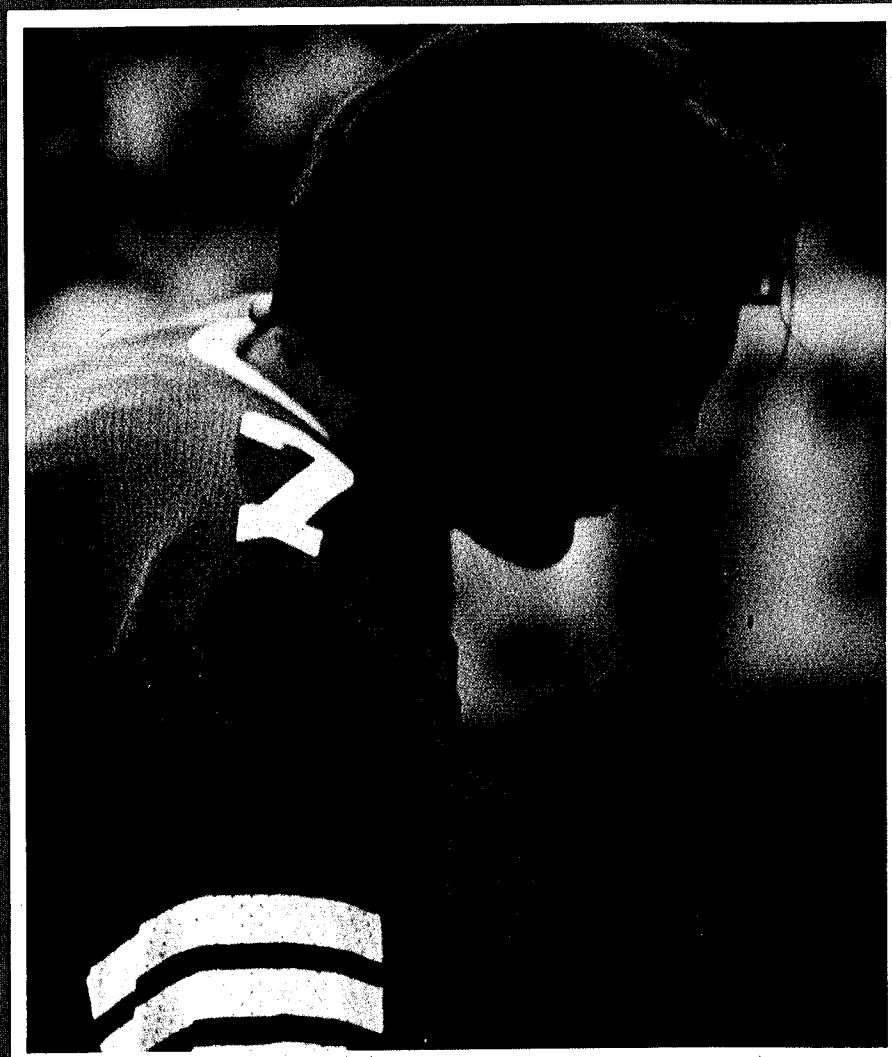
# LW Eleven Dominates Play

Cherry's best game was against the Pasco Pirates, where Cherry rushed for an astonishing 178 yards.

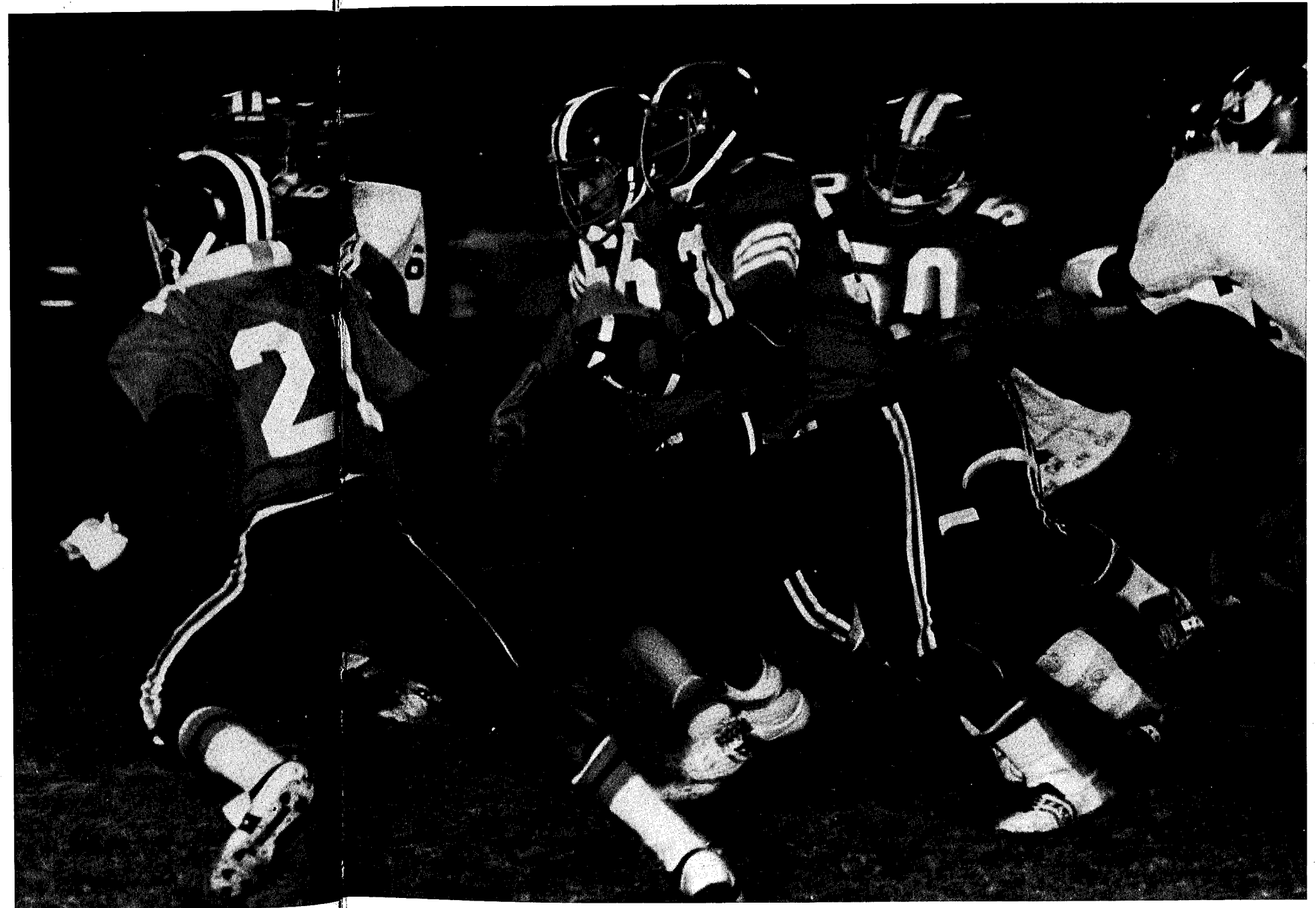
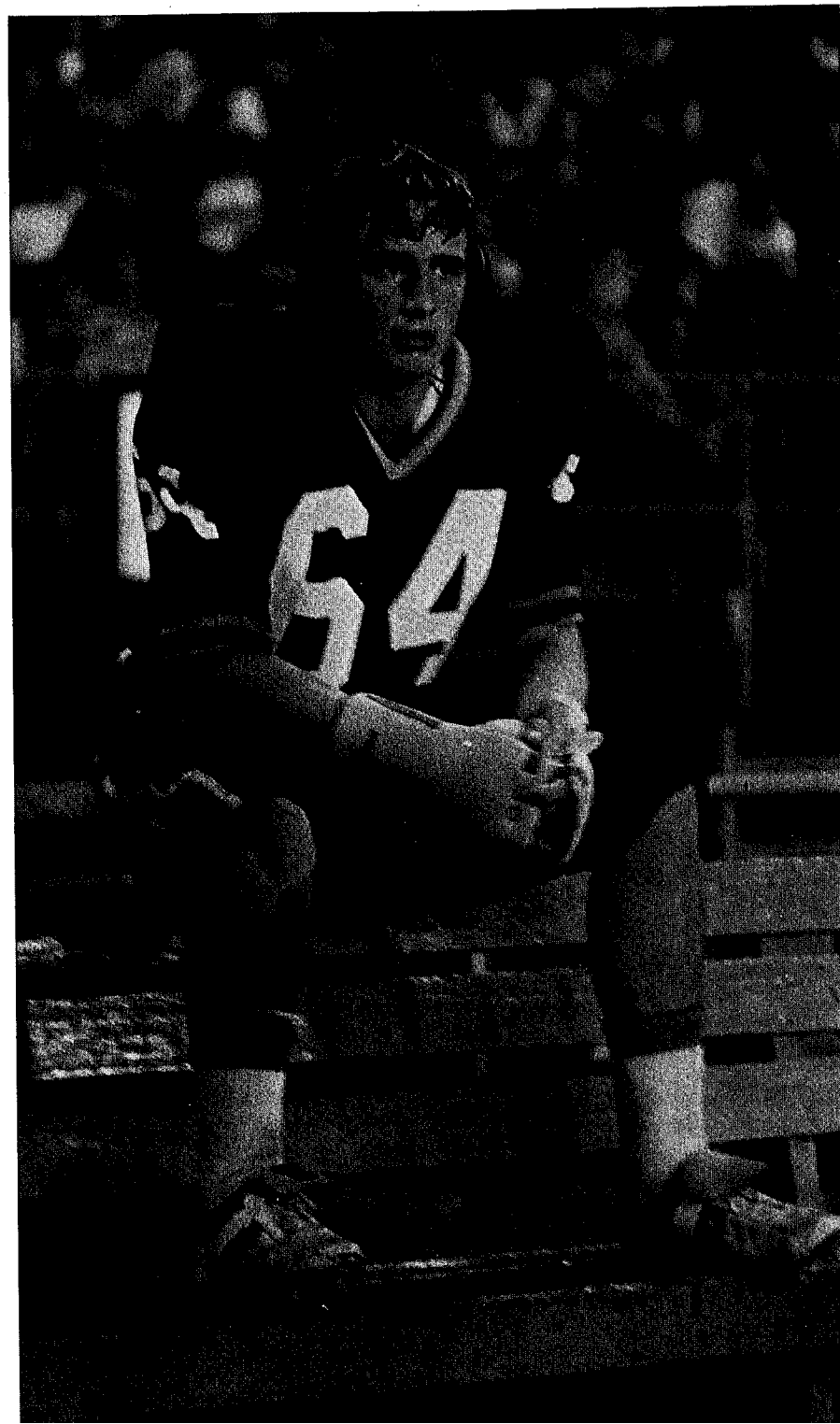
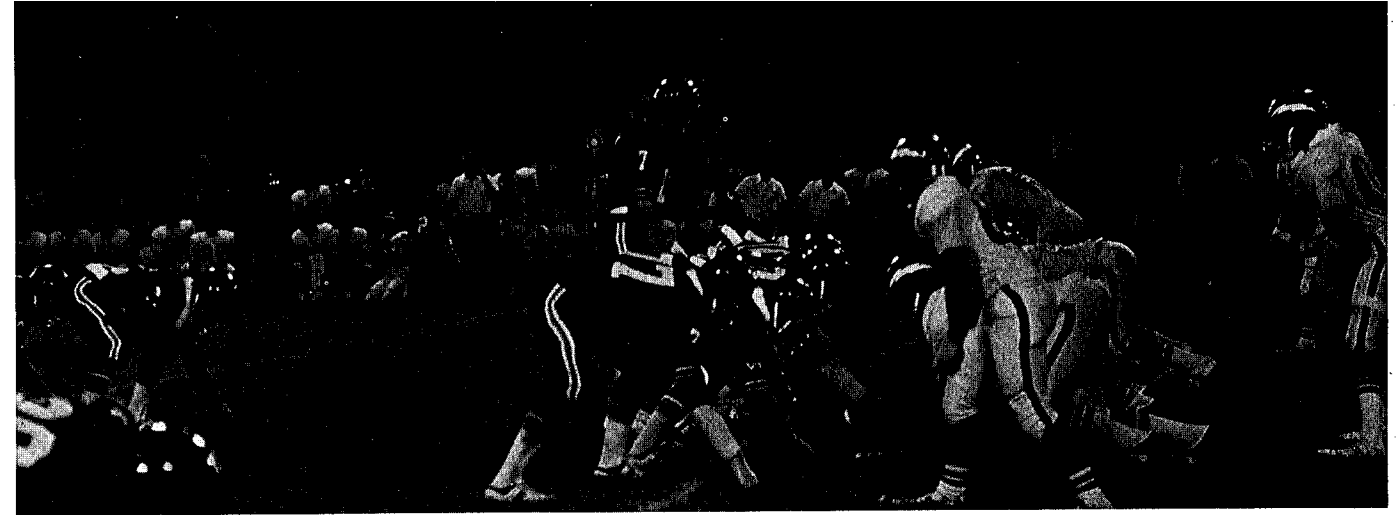




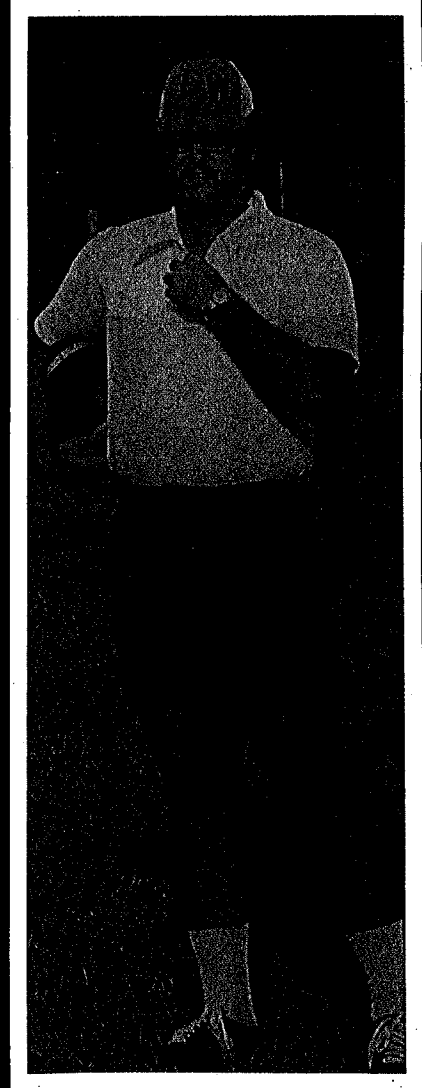
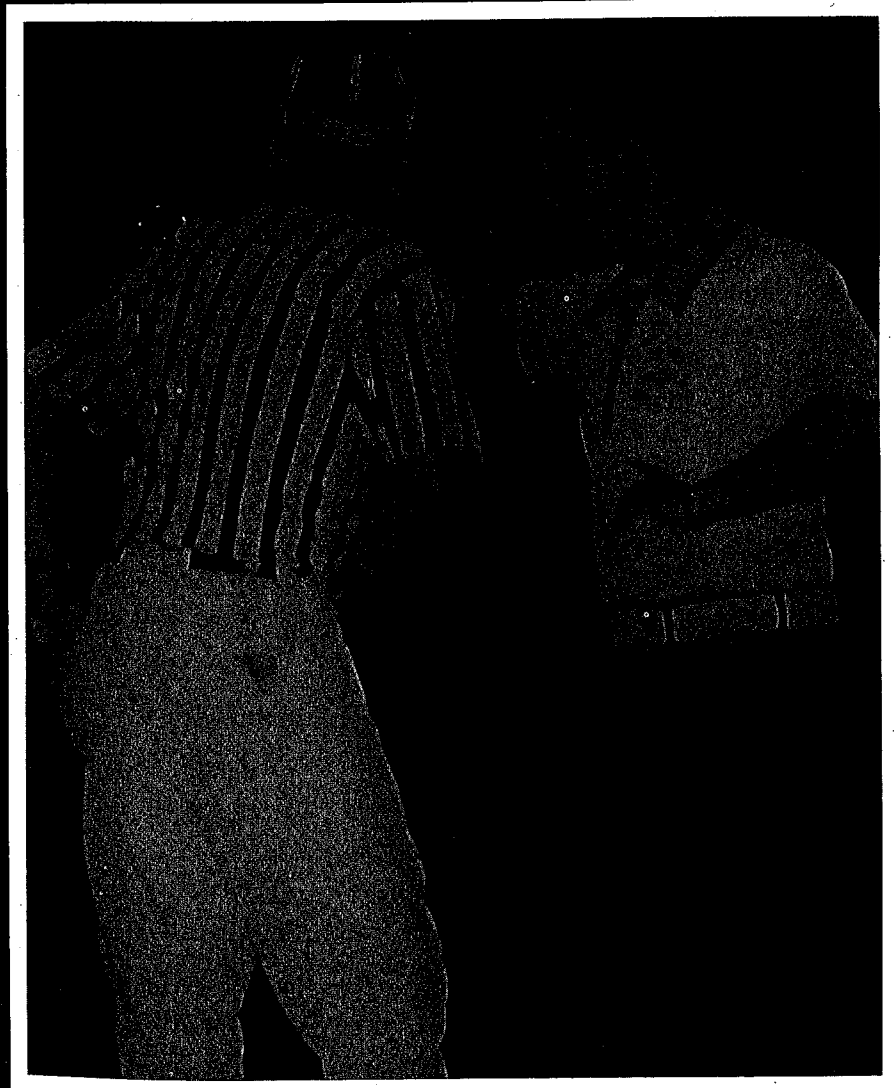
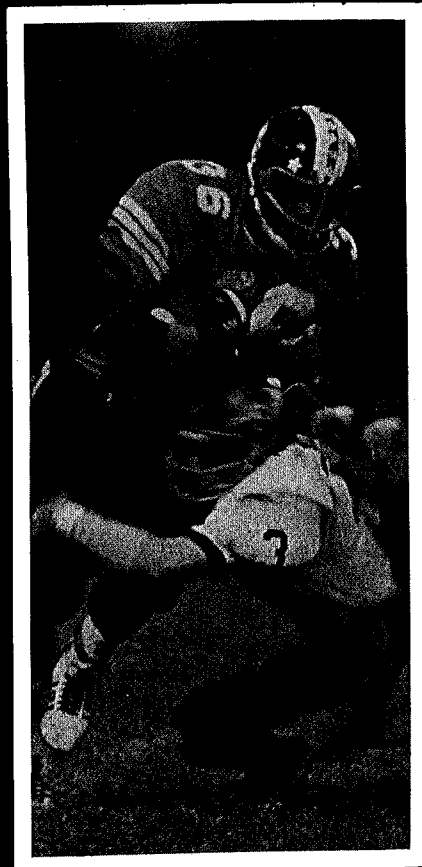
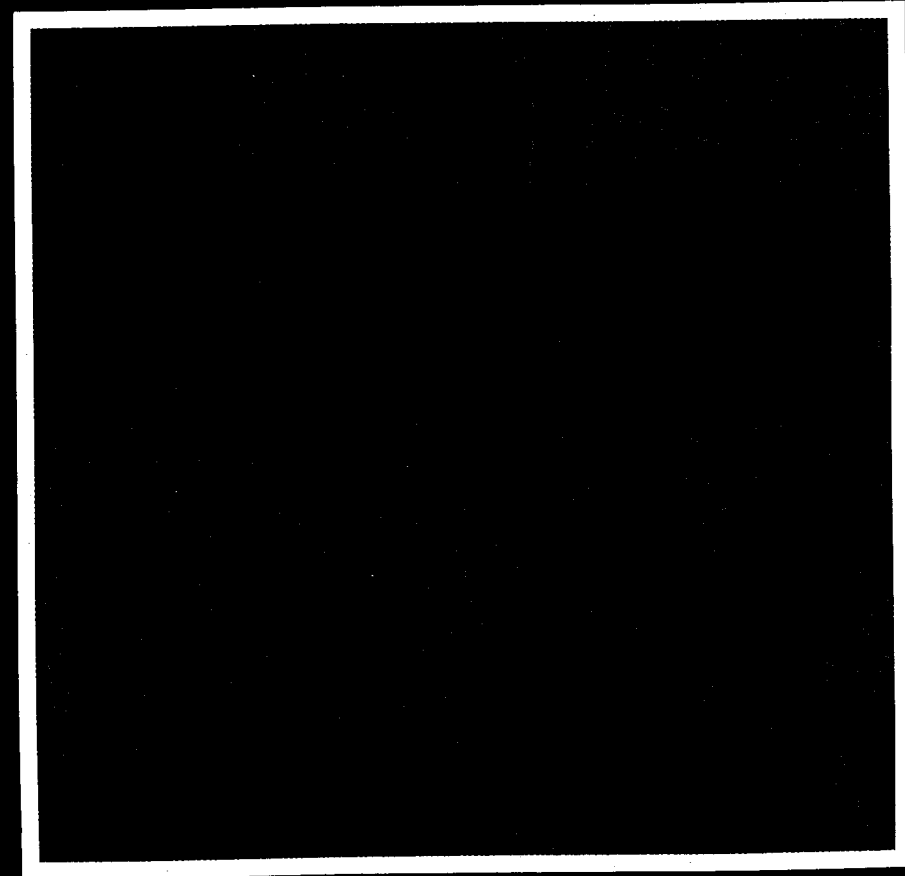
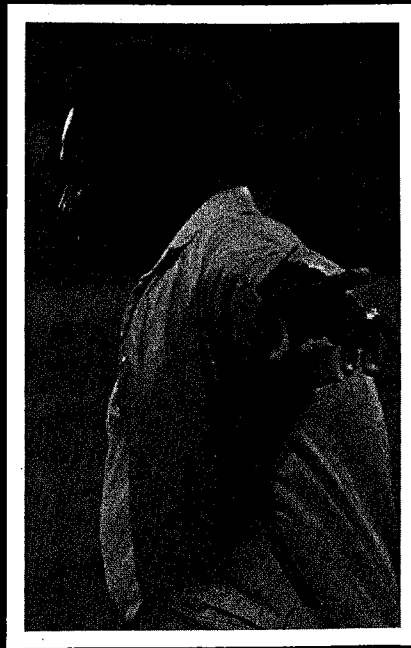
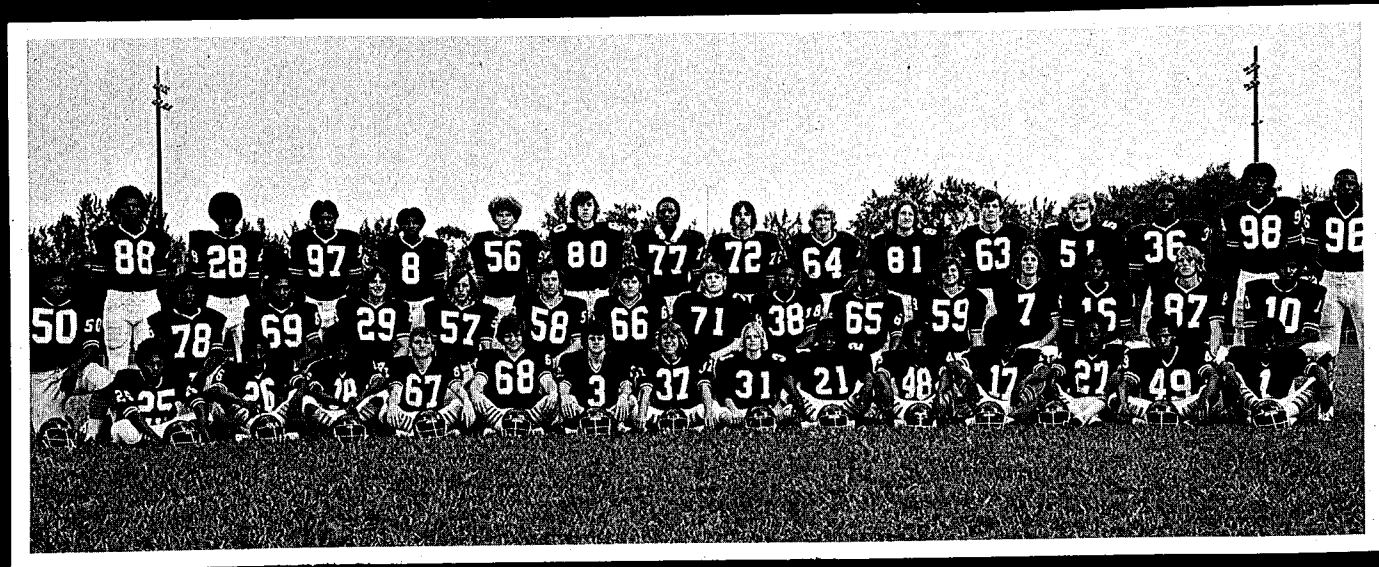

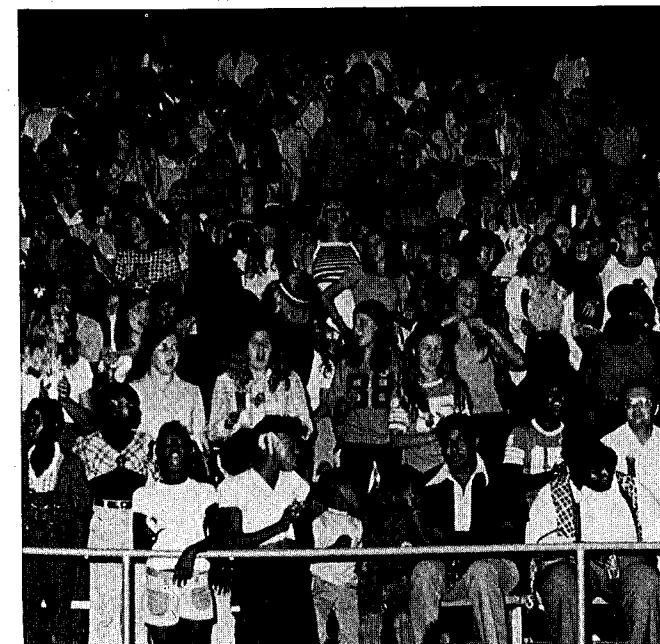
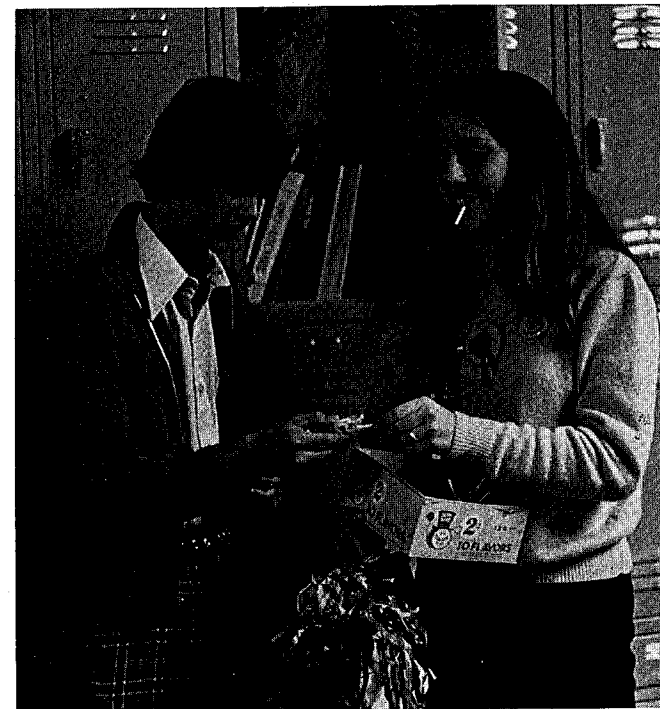
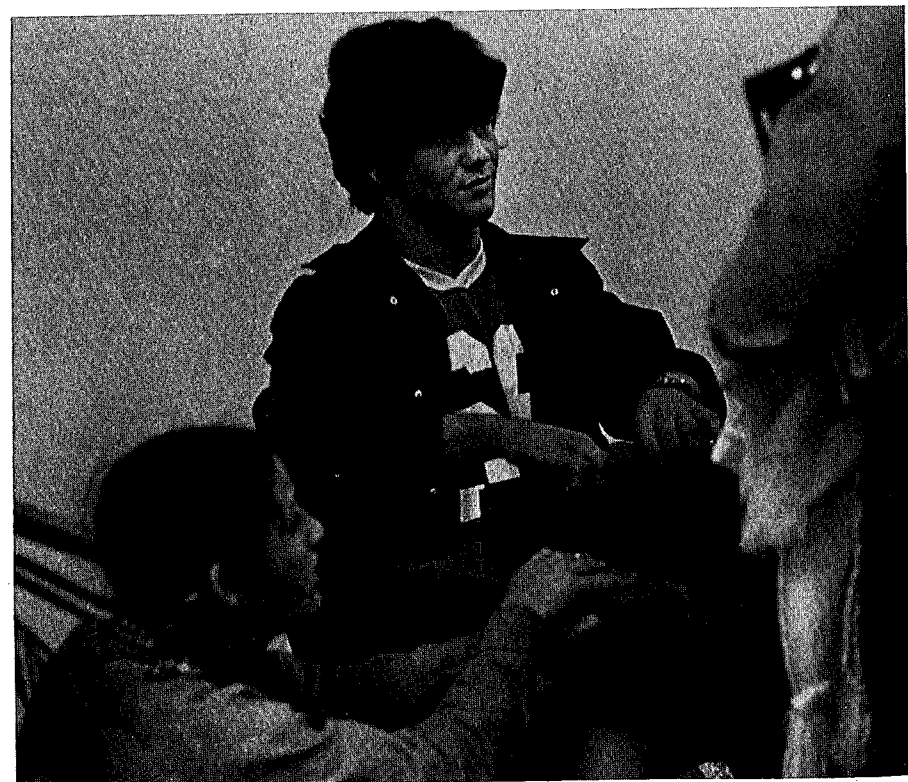
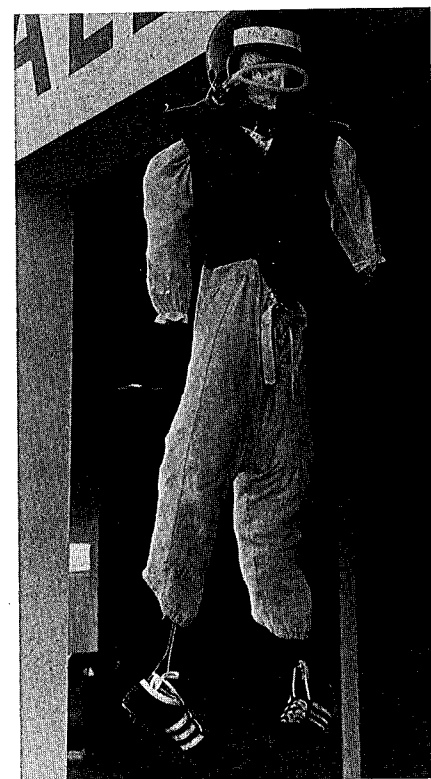








# H O M E C O M I N G

Later in the day the band lead the Homecoming parade through town, with the prize winning floats among the entries.

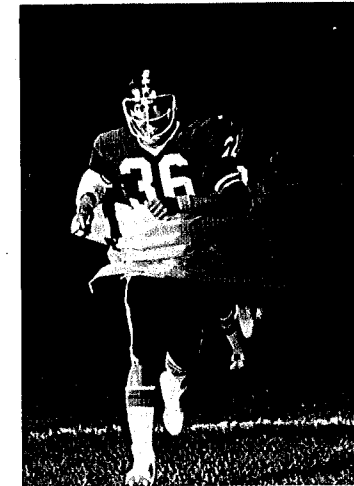
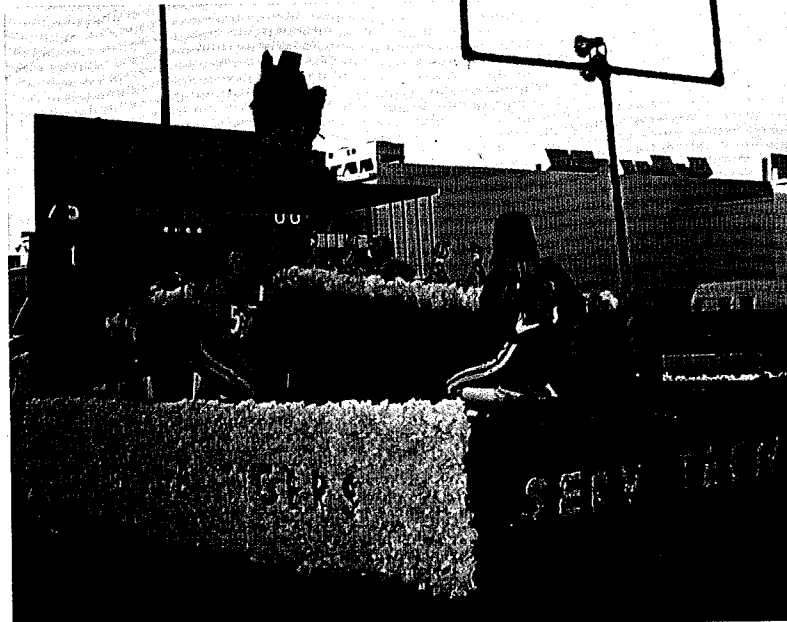
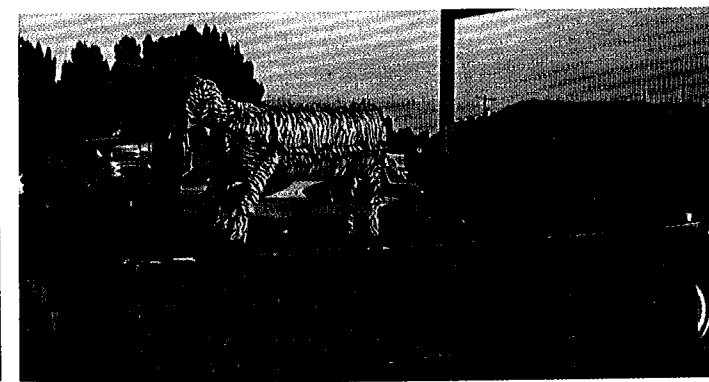

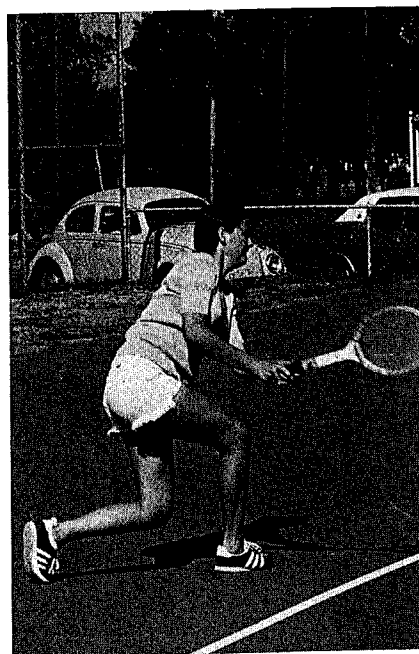




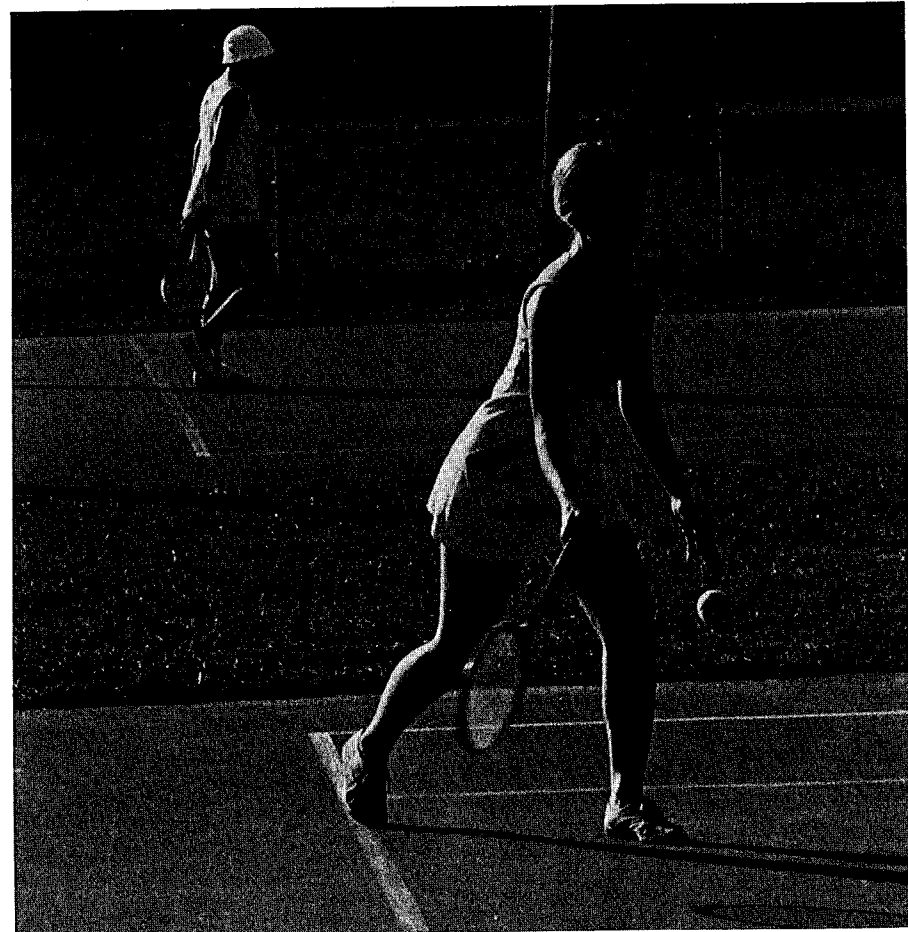
## Lake Wales Captures Third Place In County

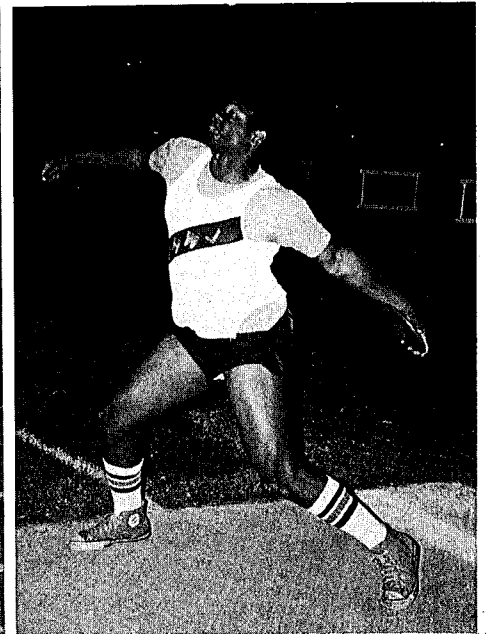
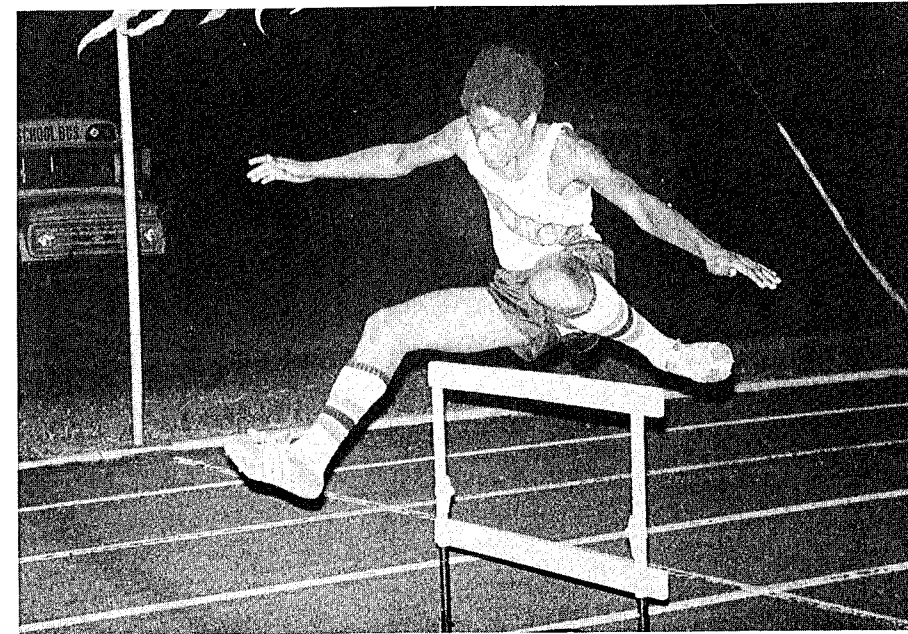

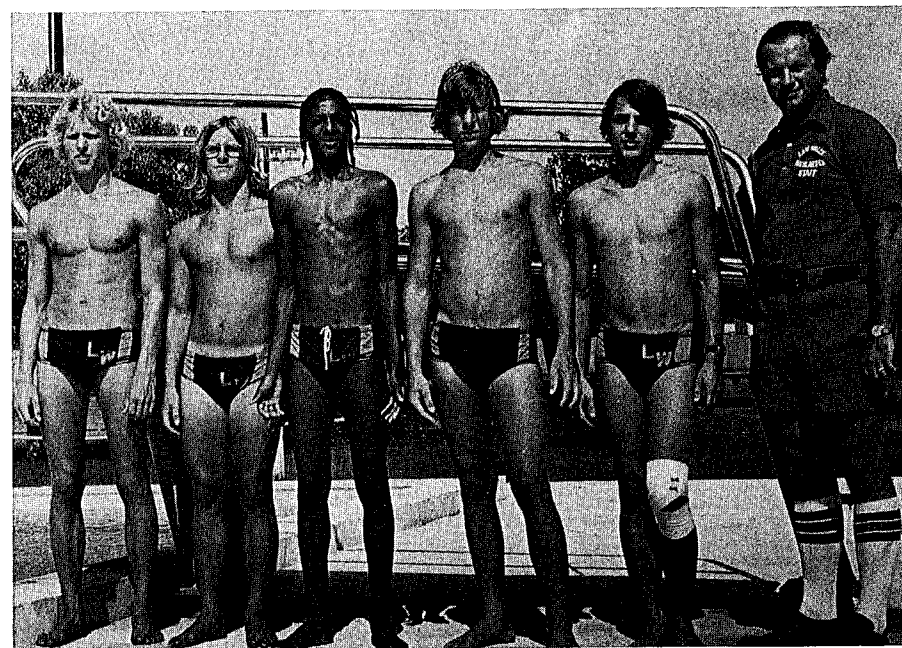

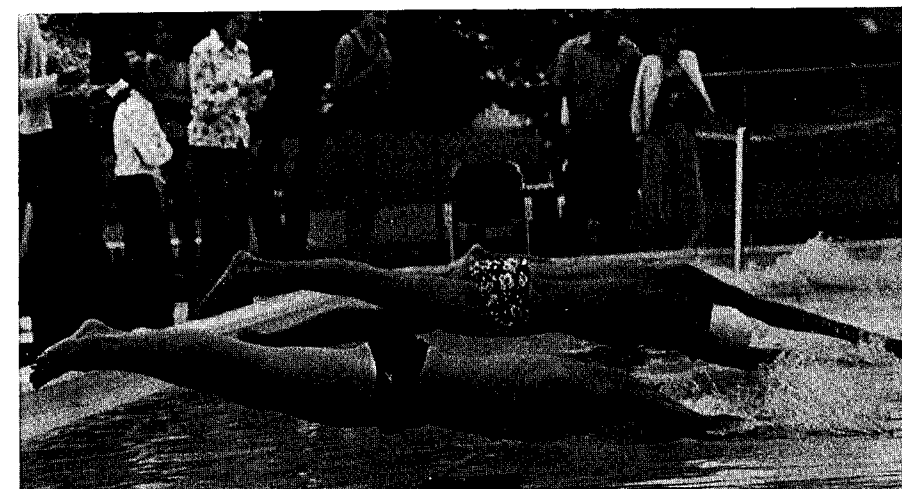
## Girls Dominate LWHS Swim Team

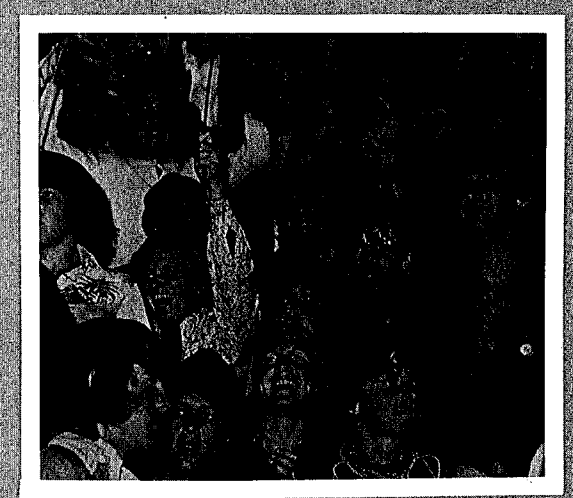

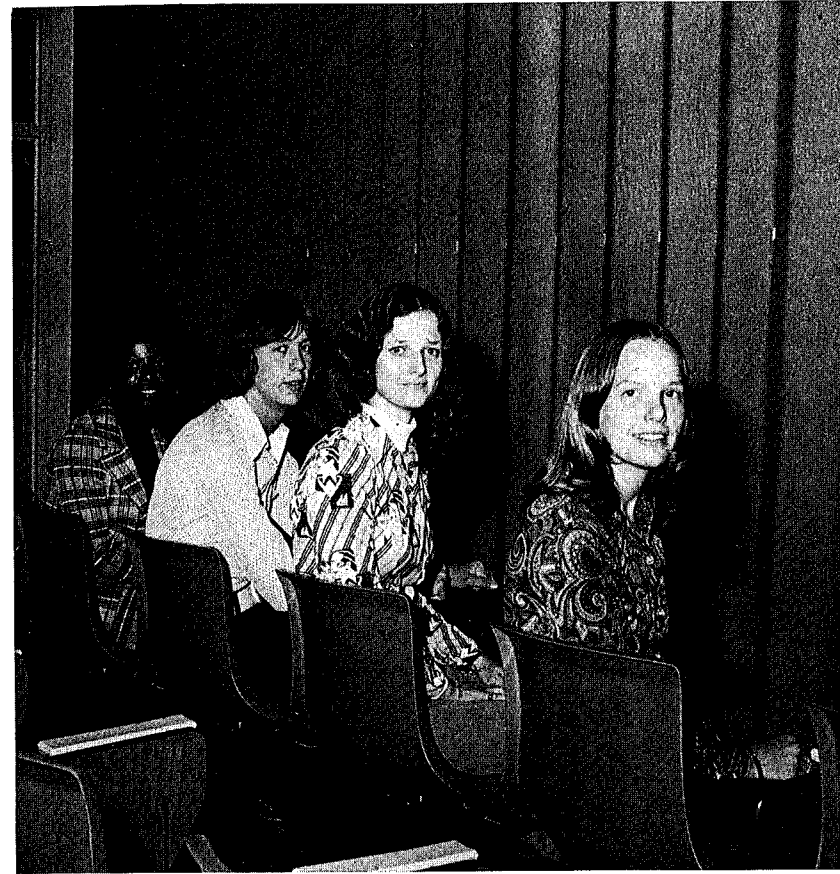


# Class of 1977

This year proved to be a challenge for everyone, especially the sophomores. Excited to join the upperclassmen and break in a new school, the sophomores were filled with pride and determination.

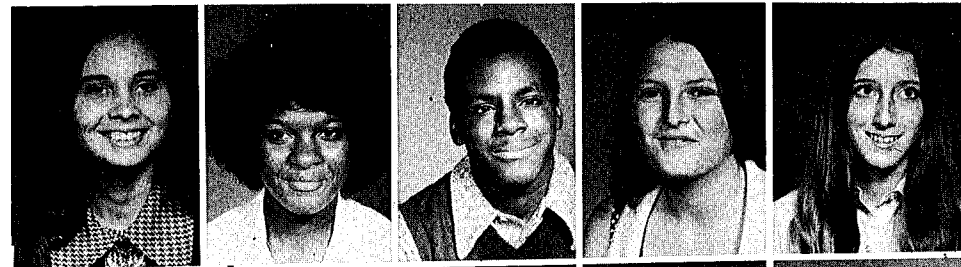

As the Juniors completed their final responsibility as a class, thoughts turned to their final year, as the class of '76—SENIORS!



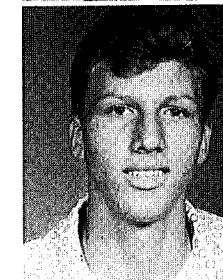

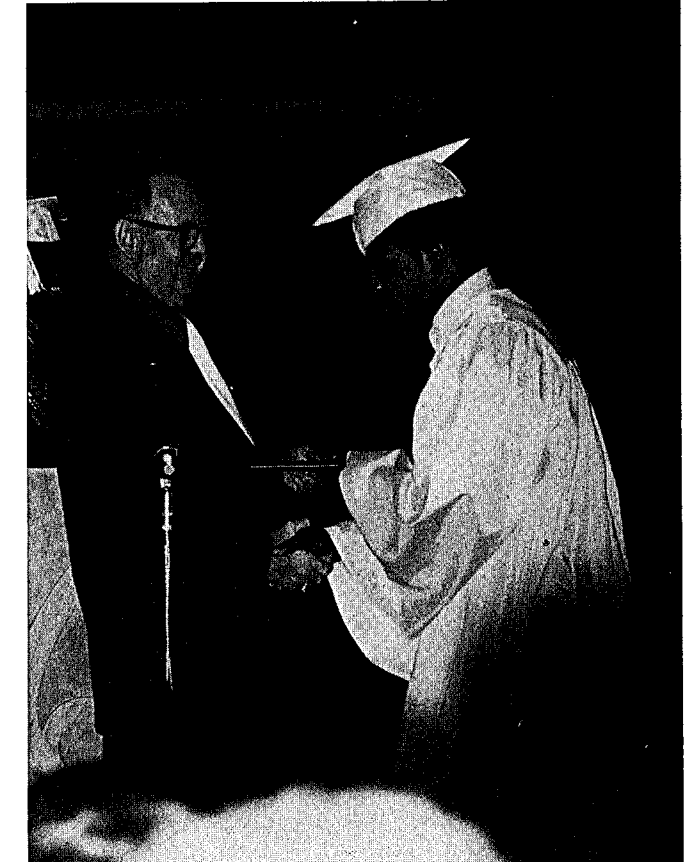
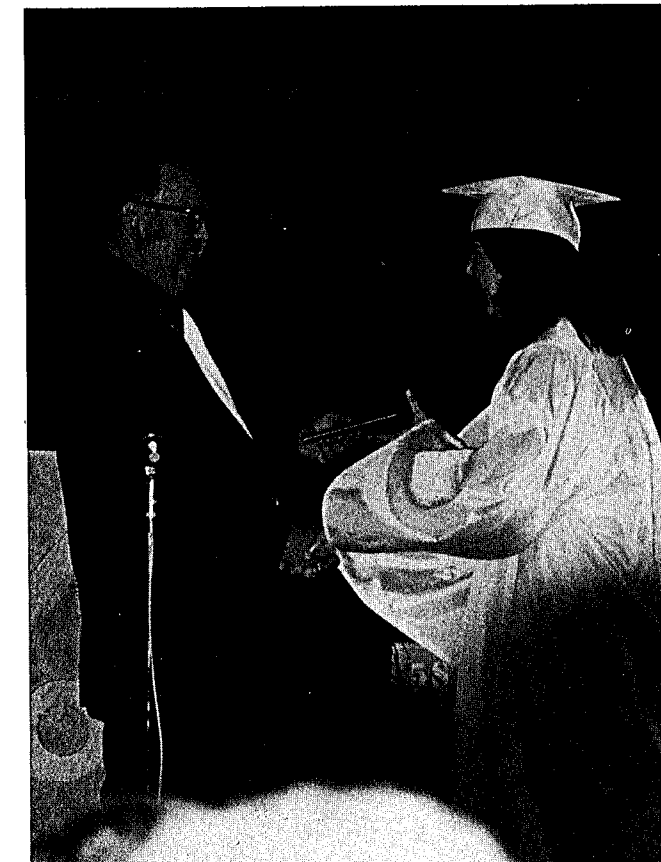


# 1975 First To Graduate From New High School

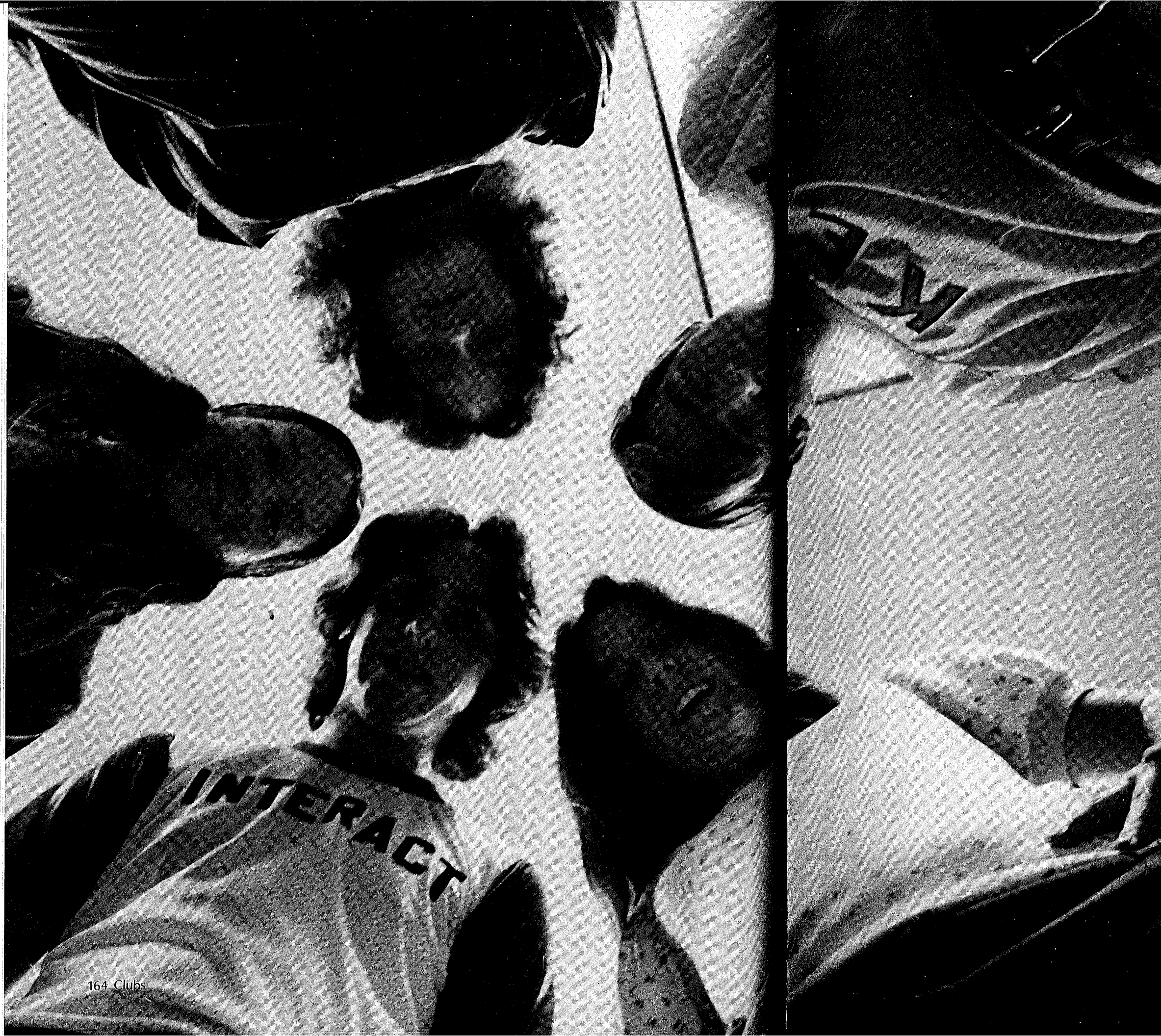

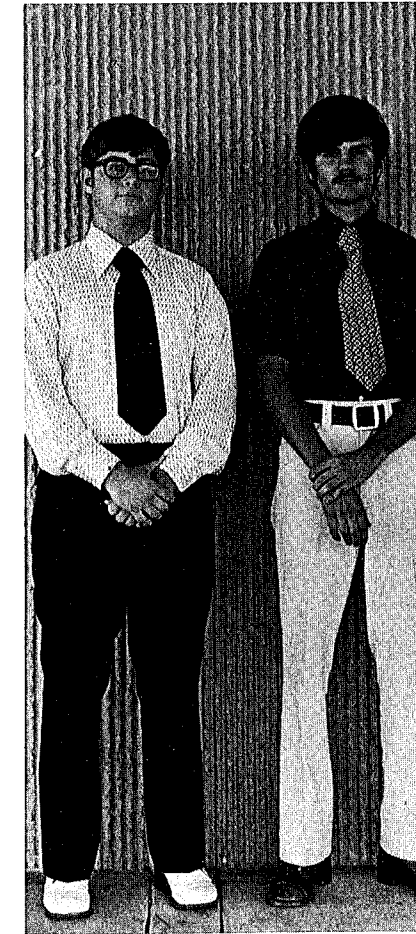
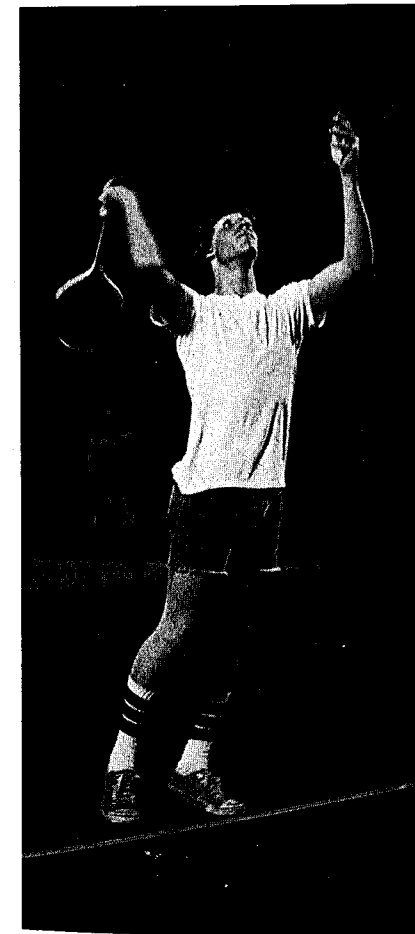
## Key Club Sweeps Downtown

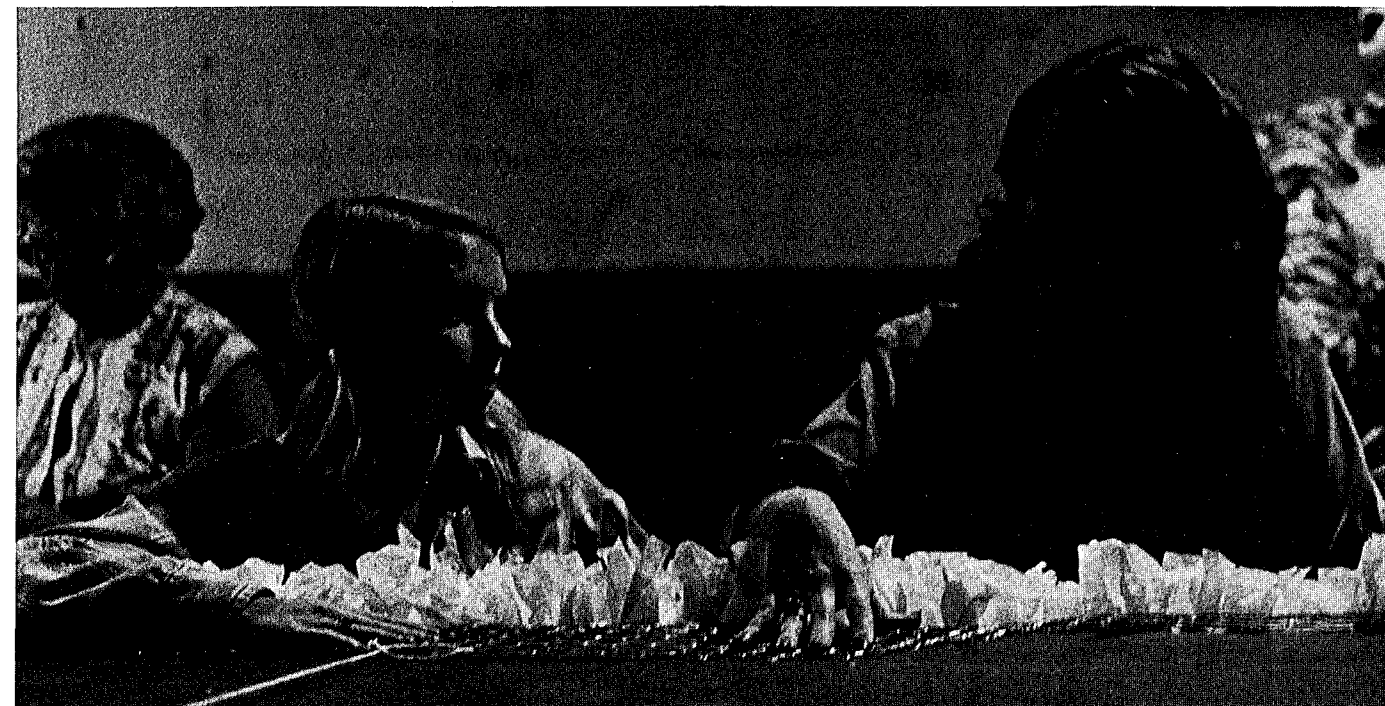

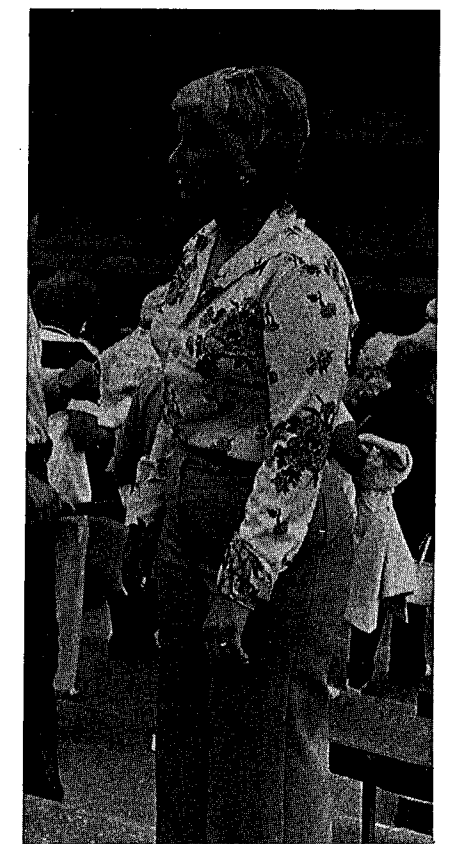


## Doug Hoening Selected As Sweetheart

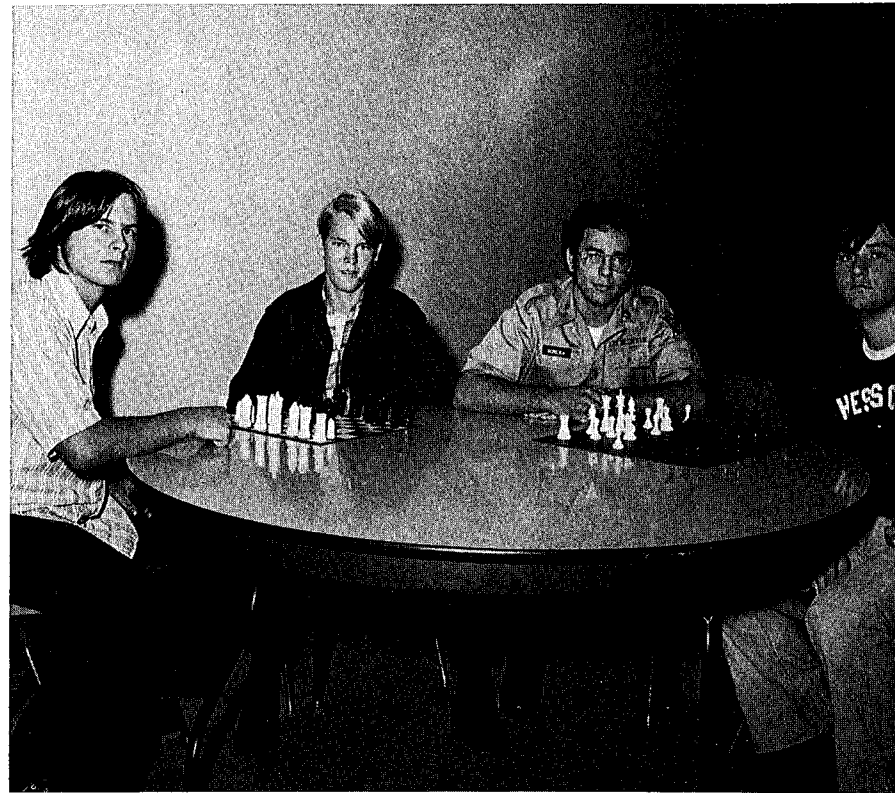
## Chess Club

For the second consecutive year, Jan Goff received the Outstanding President's Award. Sophomore Greg Leeper was honored with the award for outstanding member.

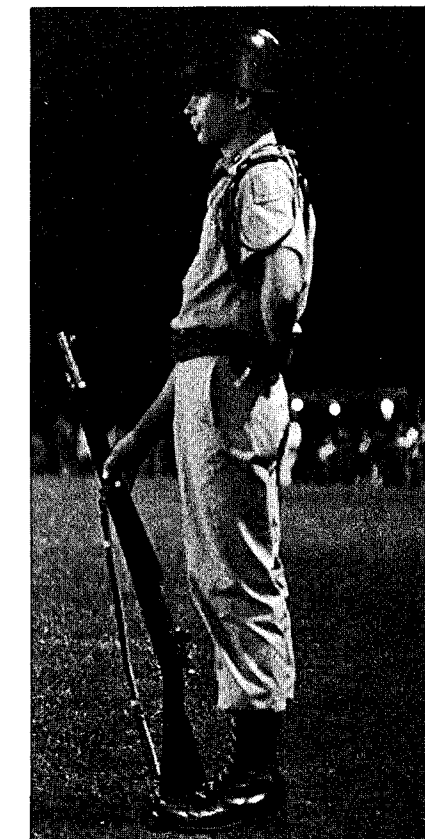
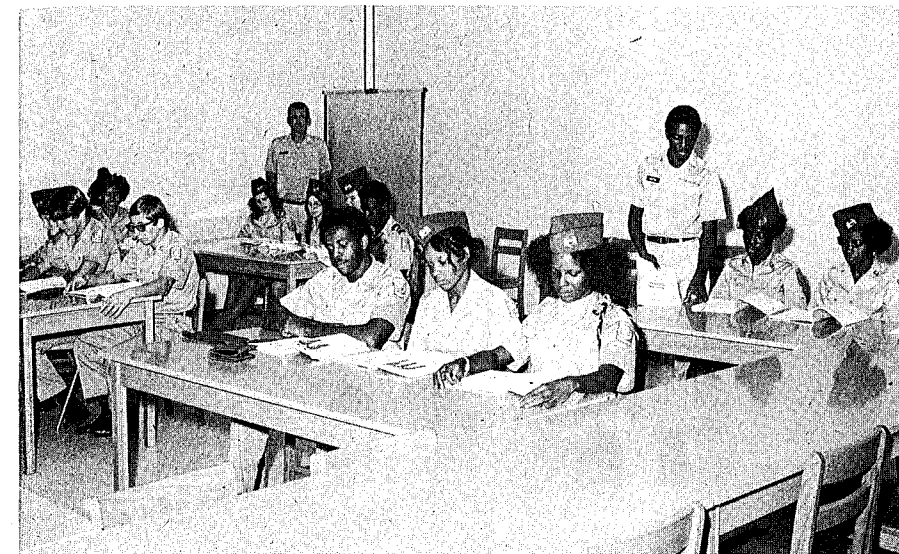
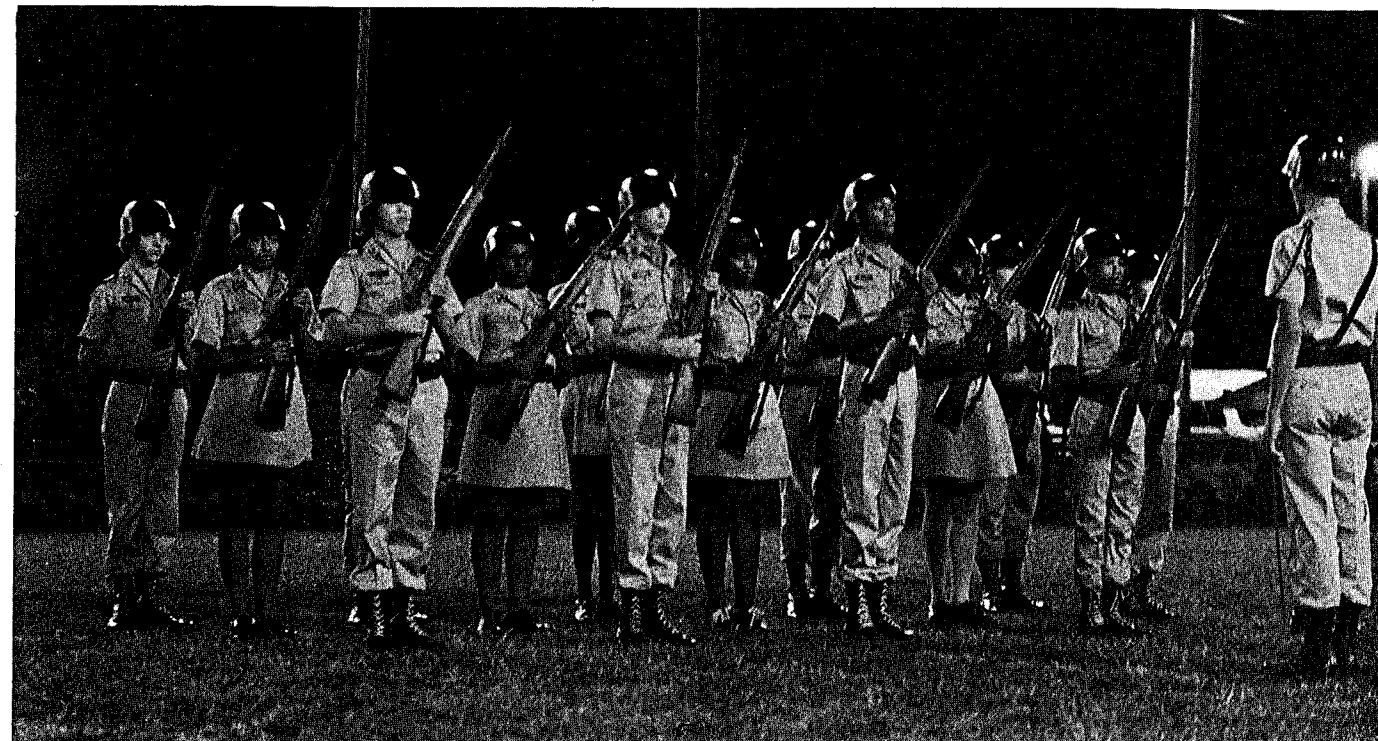

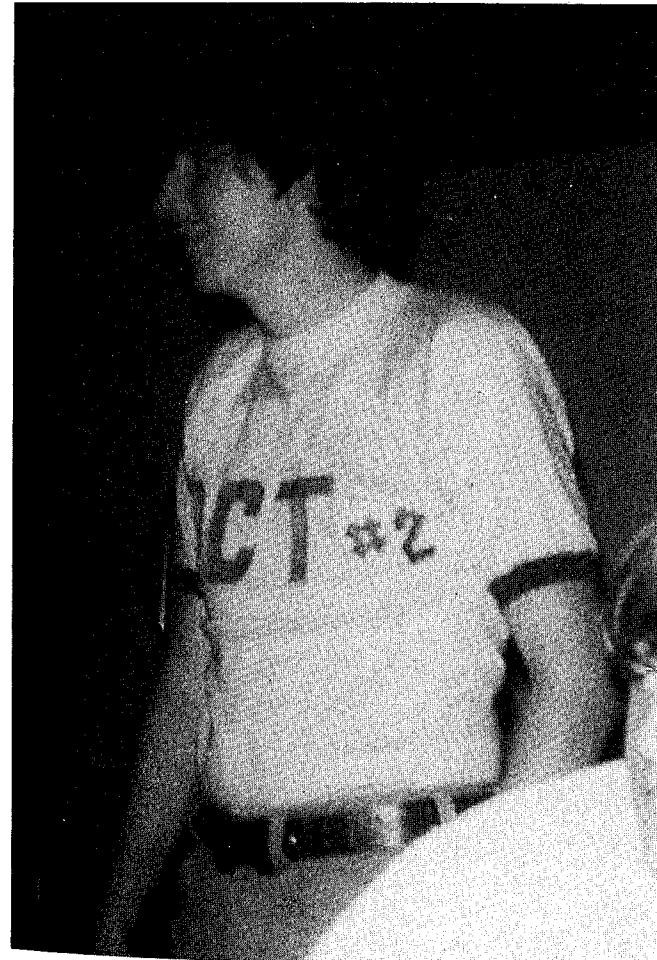
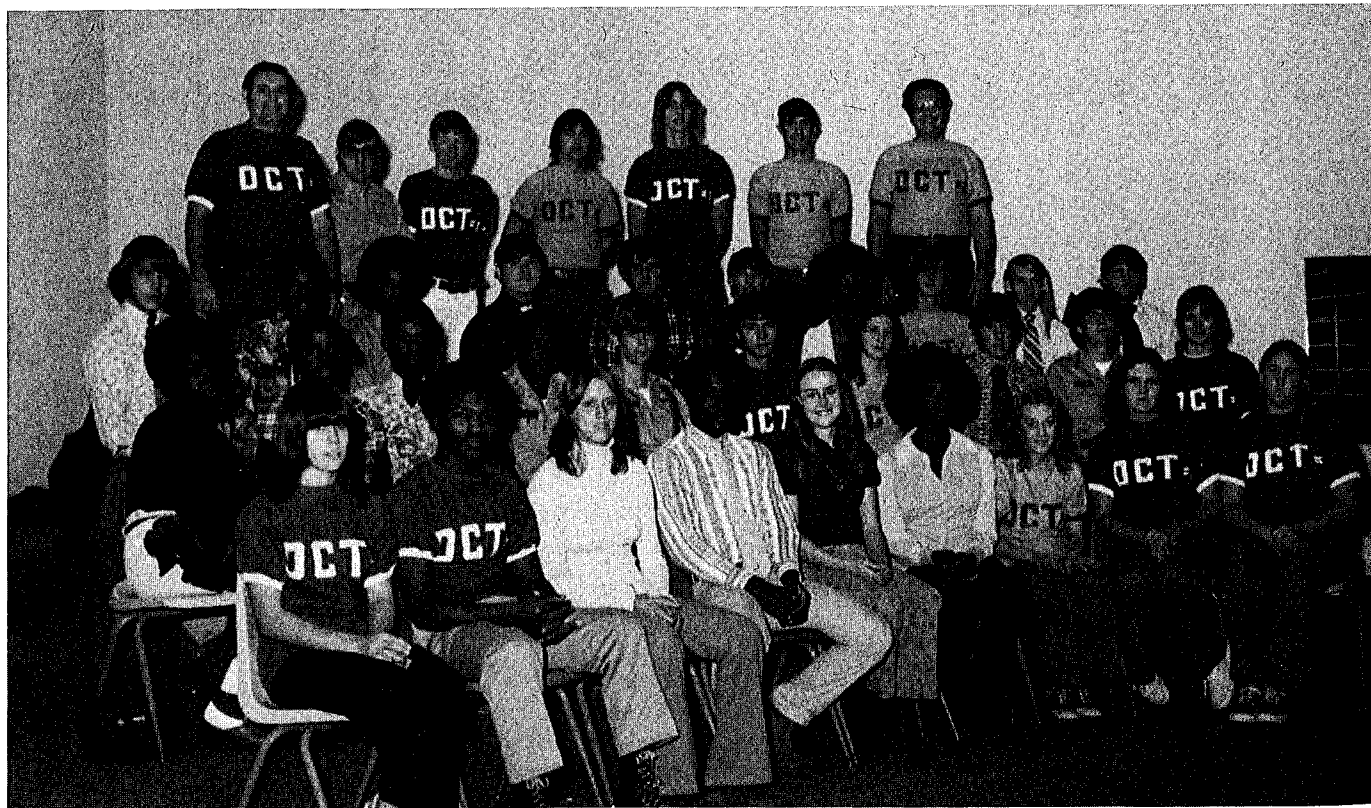
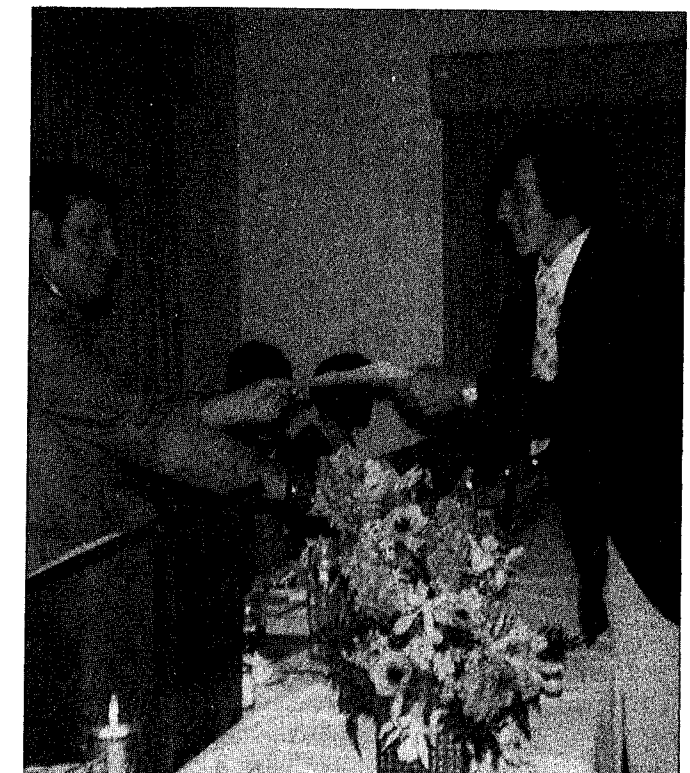
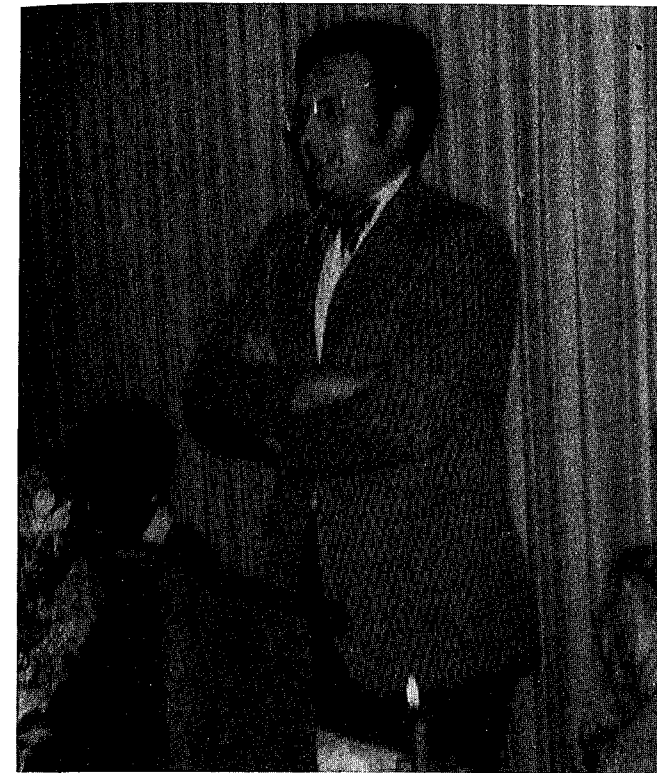
## David Schofield Wins Tricycle Race

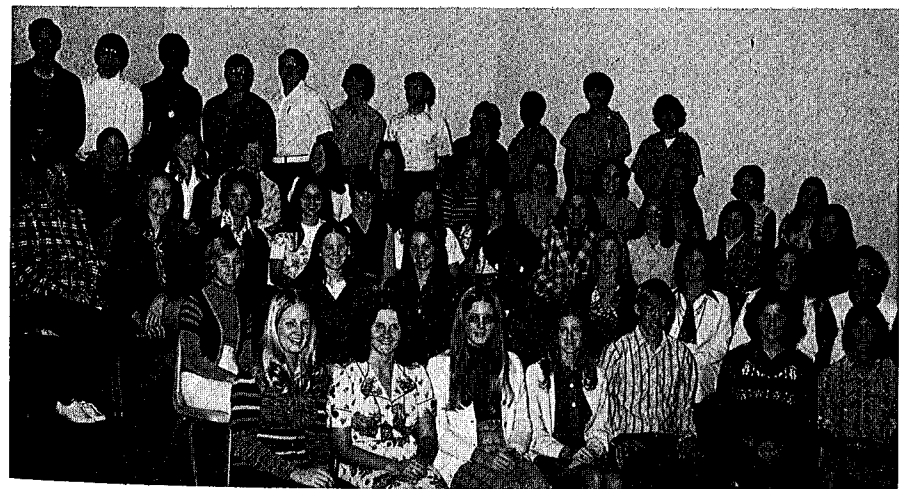
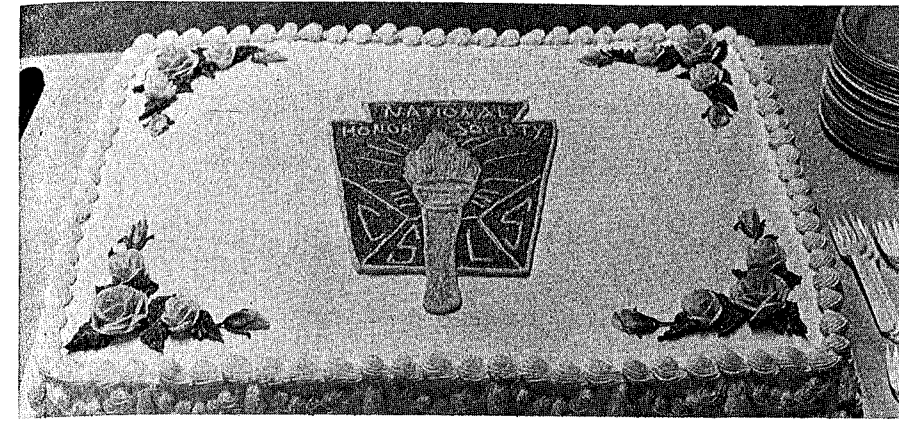
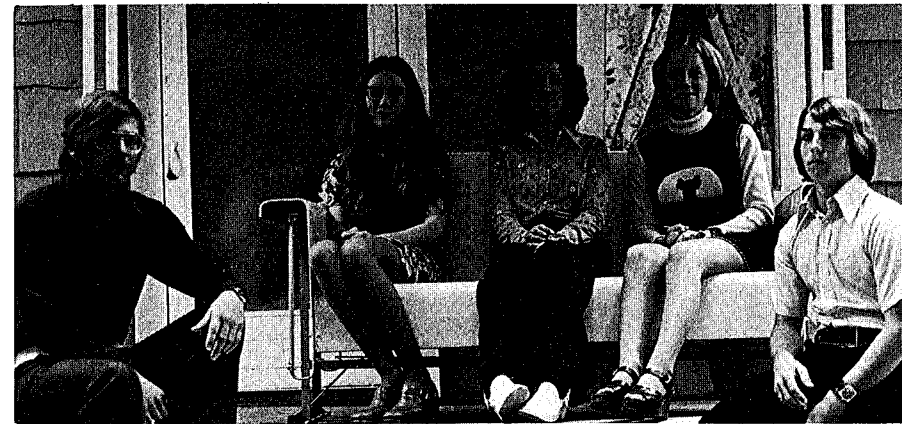




## Audiences React To Actors' Portrayal Of Character, Emotion

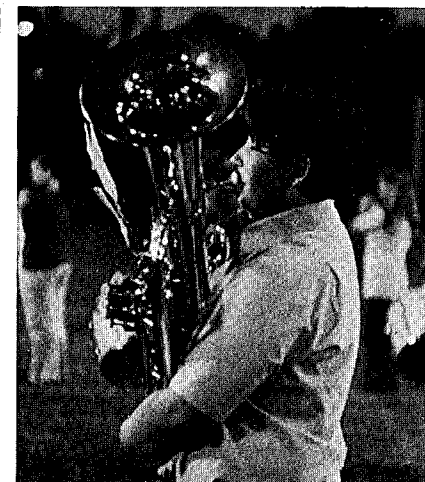
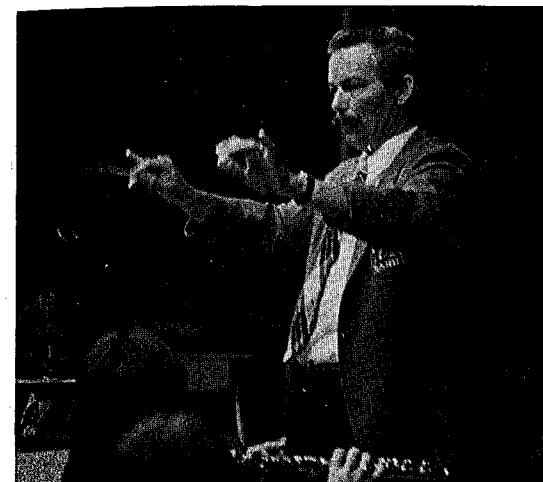
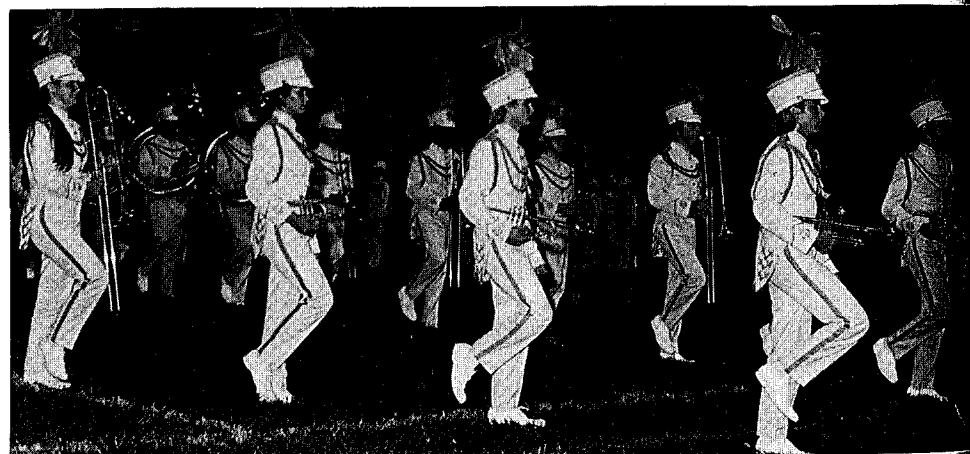


# Highlanders March In Macy's Parade

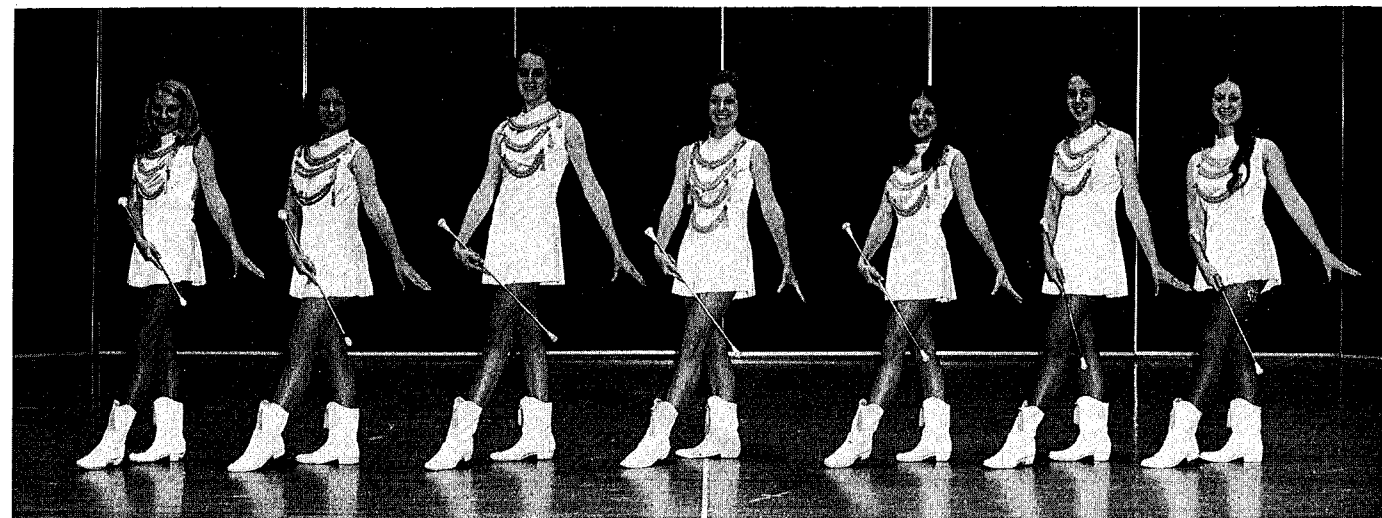
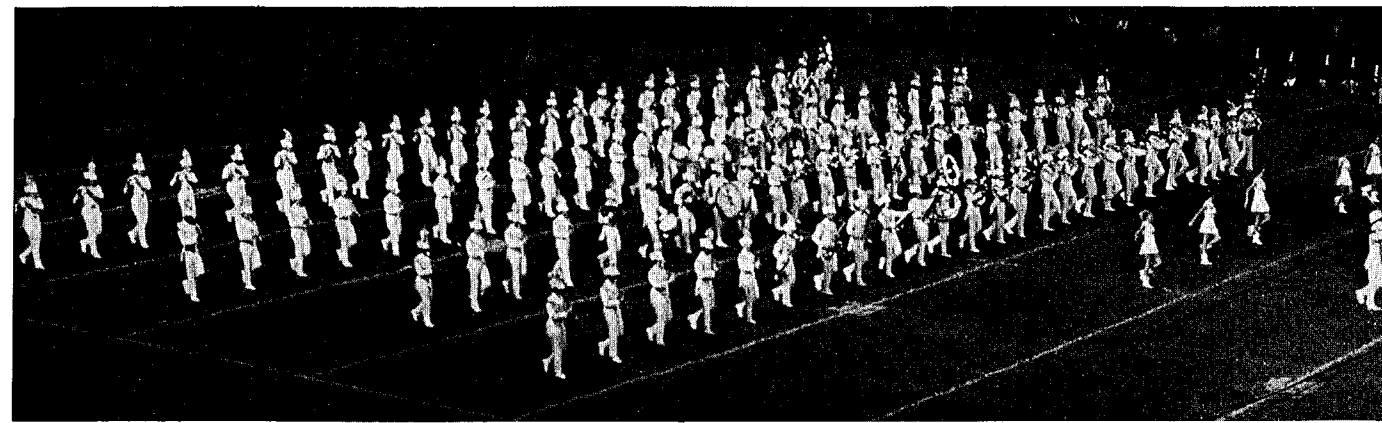

To uphold their Pride in Performance the Highlanders practiced hard and "wood shedded" their music. The results were the many excellent concerts performed.

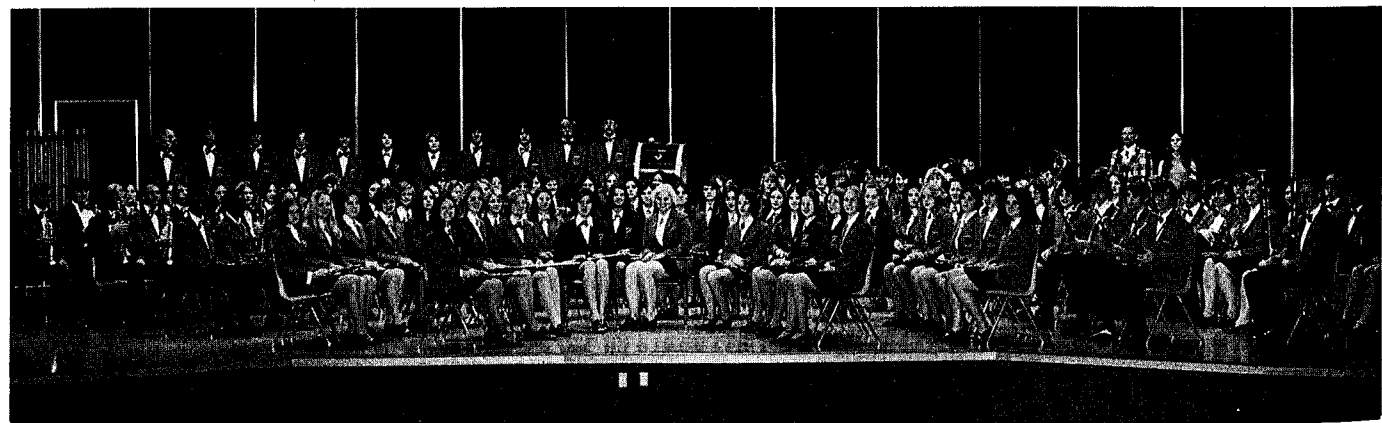

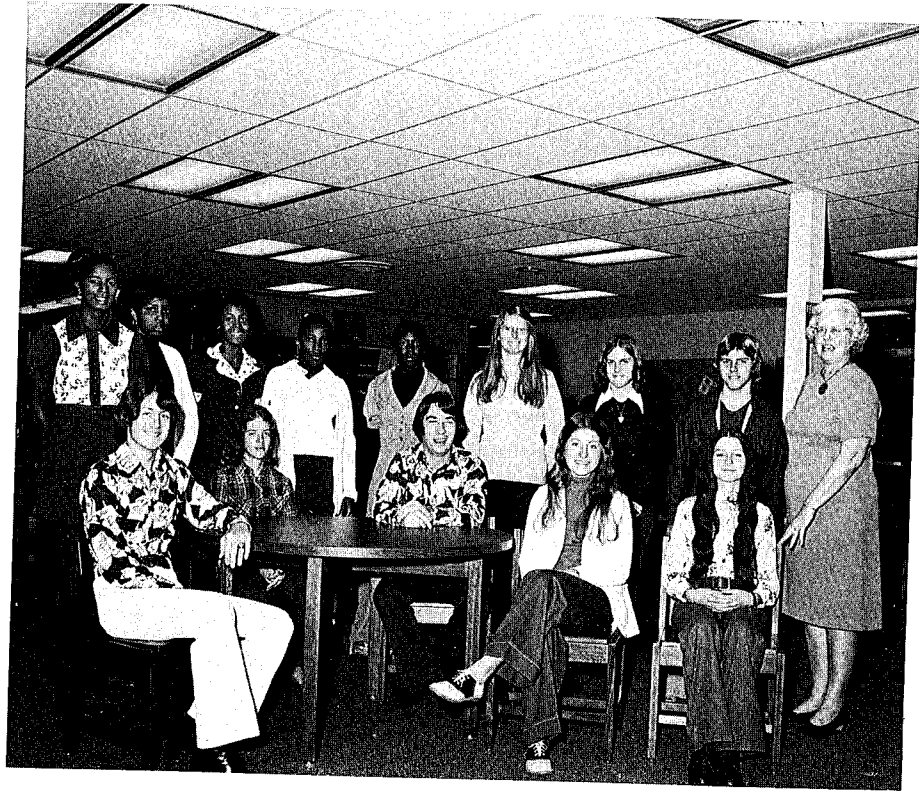
Library Council began the school year by selling the traditional Scottish tams. They contributed to the annual homecoming parade by entering a float, entitled "Tame the Tigers."

## Scuggs Wins State Office

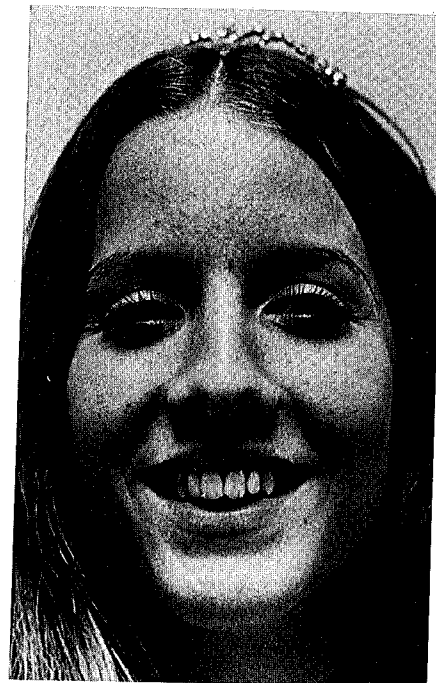

## Candy Strippers Render Services To Hospital

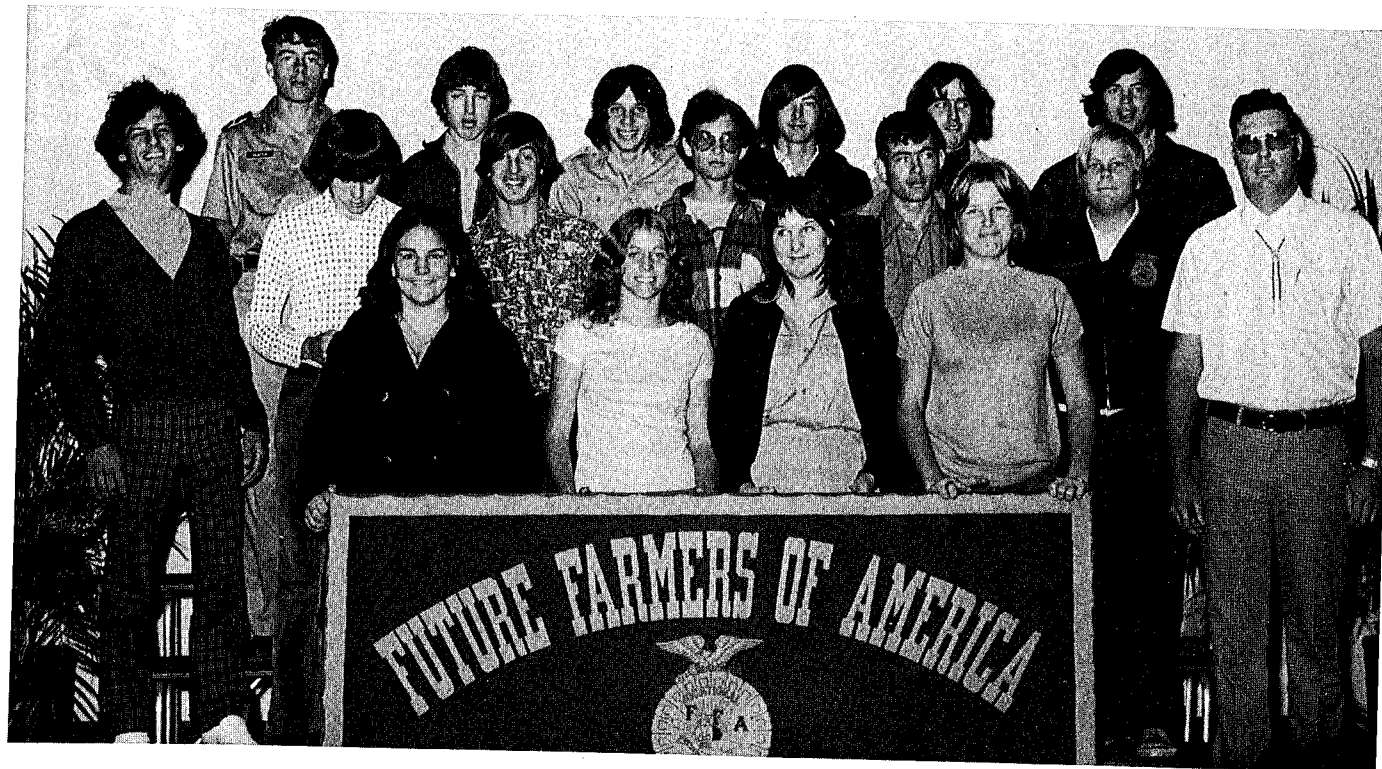

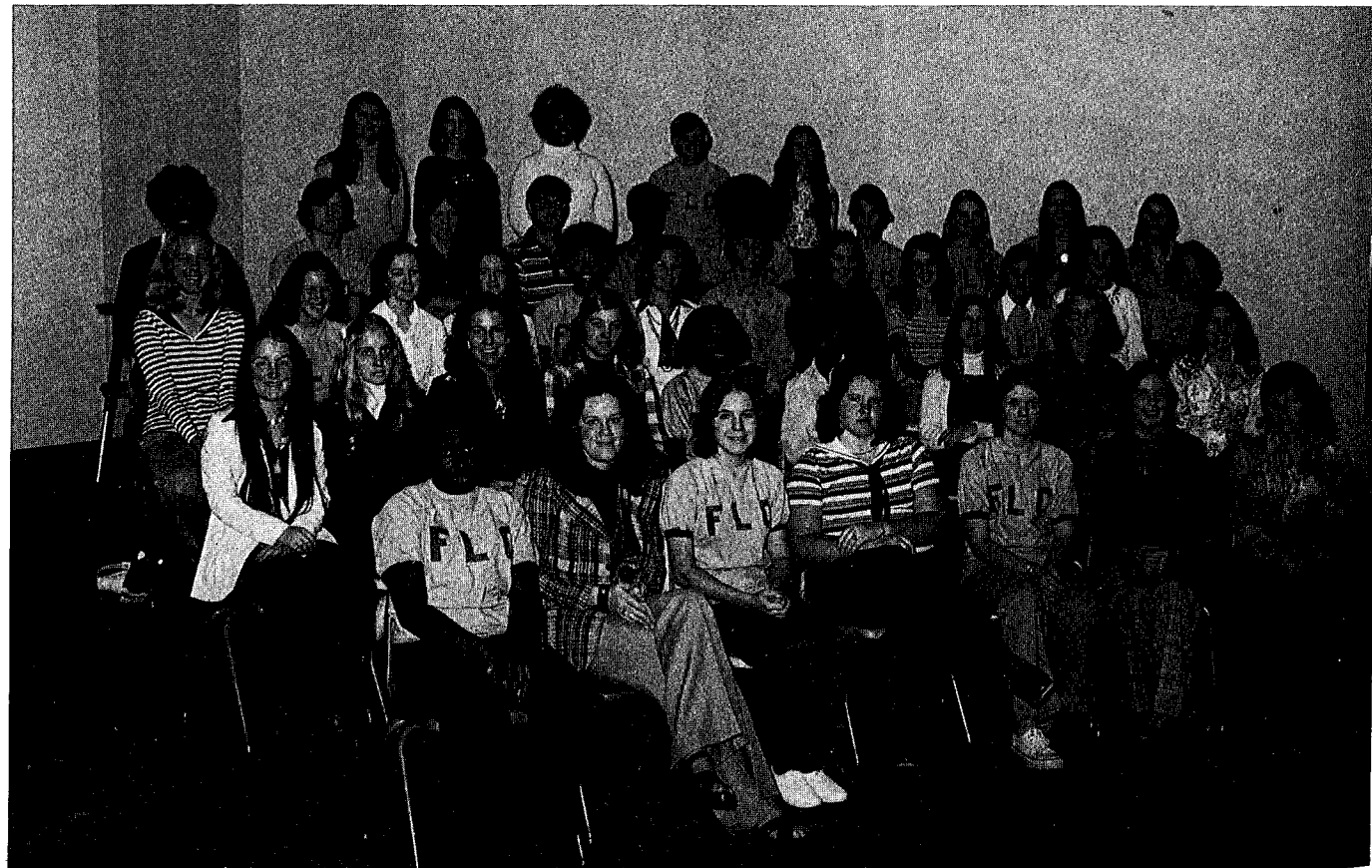
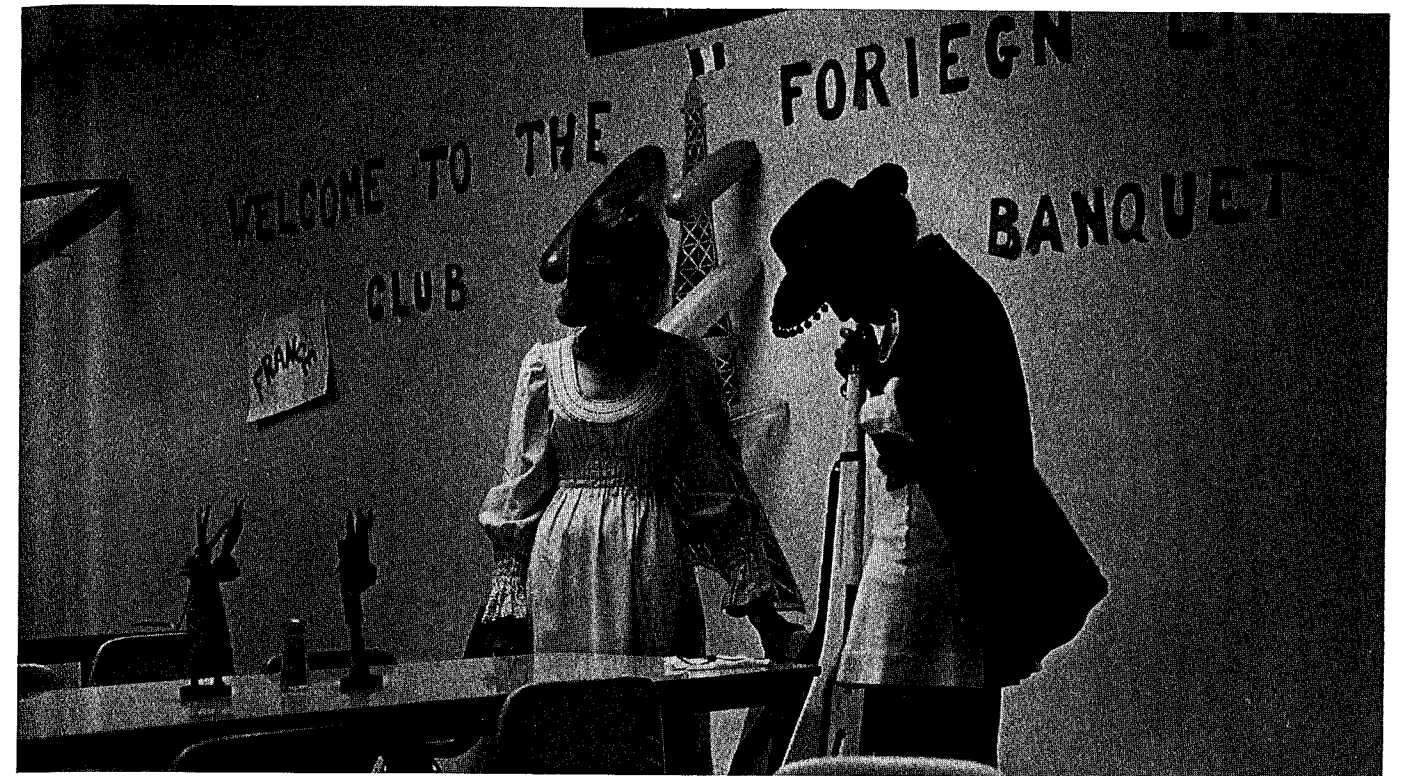
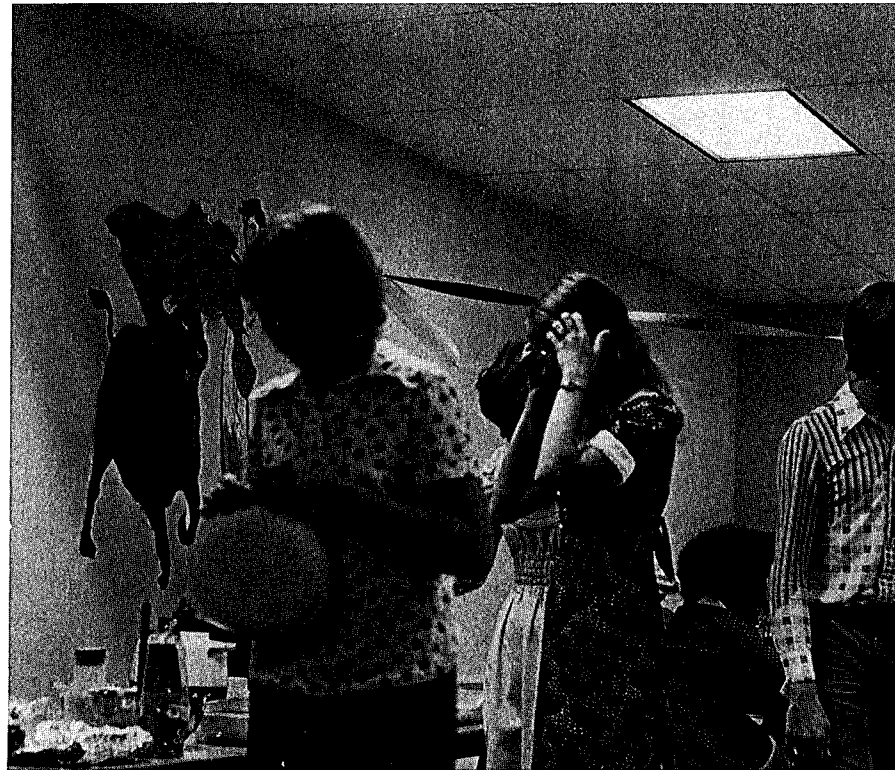




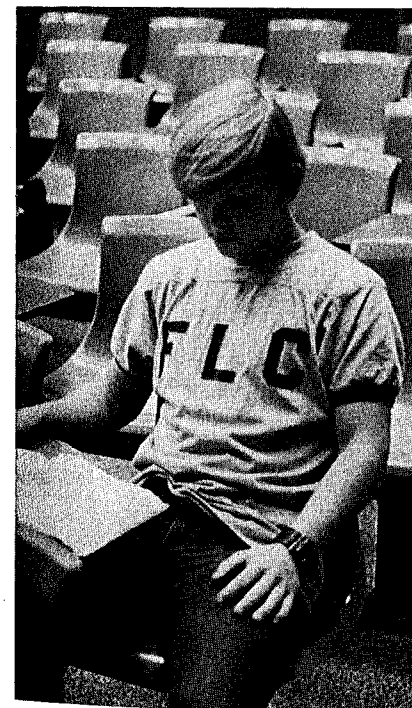
## FLC Holds Can Food Drive
