Preparing and Enhancing Student Knowledge at the STEW

What does it take to help students learn or enhance their understanding? Two things for sure are the use of manipulatives and real-life situations. Relevance is important to learning. The teachers are helping students to make connections to the standards and elements.

In the fourth grade, students are learning the phases of the moon. The students and Mrs. Williams were able to identify each phase with the use of oreo cookies. The students enjoyed creating each phase and recording information in their science journals. After learning and making a connection, the students were to eat their products.

In the third grade, students are learning about fractions. Students created the manipulative using construction paper. Creating their representation of the fractal parts help the students to make a real-life connection. Evidence-based resources were used to assess students' understanding and to enhance their knowledge.

As we move into the second half of the academic year, our students have successfully completed their mid-year assessments. Students in grades K-11 recently took the Reading and Math NWEA MAP Universal Screeners, while students in grades K-3 also completed the Acadience Assessments. These assessments provide valuable insight into student progress and help guide instructional decisions.

To ensure continuous monitoring of student understanding, teachers will utilize Progress Learning to develop monthly assessments aligned with the standards taught. These assessments will help track student growth and identify areas needing reinforcement.

Looking ahead, the Georgia Milestones Assessment System (GMAS) is quickly approaching. High school students will take the GMAS End-of-Course (EOC) exams from April 21 - 25, 2025, while students in grades 3-8 will take the GMAS End-of-Grade (EOG) exams from April 28 - May 5, 2025. Additionally, high school students and middle school science students have completed their mid-year benchmark assessments. These benchmarks provide teachers with essential data to tailor instruction and focus on areas where students need additional support in preparation for the upcoming Georgia Milestones.

We encourage all students to continue putting forth their best effort and to take advantage of the resources available to them. Families can support their students by reinforcing study habits at home, encouraging regular reading, and ensuring they get plenty of rest leading up to testing days.

The Stewart County School System is working to ensure high-quality instruction and meaningful learning experiences for all students. Our educators are actively engaged in professional development and innovative teaching practices to enhance student achievement. On January 6, 2025, teachers participated in a professional learning course on differentiation, conducted by the Georgia Department of Education (GaDOE). This training equipped educators with strategies to meet the diverse needs of all learners in the classroom. Additionally, they are engaging in Math Learning Plans professional learning led by Mrs. Angie Brunson from Chatt-Flint RESA, which provides teachers with effective strategies and resources to support mathematics instruction and ensure students master essential math concepts.

To foster collaboration between schools and families, Stewart County Schools host Curriculum Nights in conjunction with the Stewart County Parent Knight Conversations on the last Thursday of each month. These events offer fun and engaging activities for students and parents, along with important updates on how families can support their children's learning at home. A special Literacy Night is scheduled for February 27, 2025, where families will have the opportunity to explore reading activities, gain literacy resources, and learn strategies to support reading at home.

On March 19, 2025, Stewart County Schools will hold Student Digital Learning Day. On this day, students will complete assignments virtually, enhancing their digital literacy skills, while teachers will participate in professional learning sessions designed to improve instructional effectiveness and integrate innovative teaching strategies into their classrooms.

Through these initiatives, Stewart County School System continues to prioritize student success by supporting teachers, engaging families, and fostering an enriched learning environment. Stay tuned for more updates as we work together to enhance curriculum and instruction for all students!

It is with great pleasure to announce that we have received (2) 2025-year model school buses to add to our school bus fleet. We are in the process of updating our school bus fleet as we maintain safe transportation for our students. As CDL holders, our bus drivers are required to submit random drug and alcohol testing with a third-party tester every quarter. As another layer of safety, our bus drivers are also registered with the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) Drug and Alcohol Clearinghouse Query. This guery of the FMCSA Commercial Driver's License Drug and Alcohol Clearinghouse will consist of and determine whether drug or alcohol violation information about the Bus Driver exists in the Clearinghouse. Our Annual Underground Storage Registration Certificate was renewed for another year which allows us to purchase and store fuel with the compliance of the Environmental Protection Division (EPD).

Federal Funding Programs for K-12

The federal government provides support for K-12 education through specific grant programs administered by the states to school districts. Federal dollars supplement state resources by narrowing funding gaps for at-risk students through programs such as Title I grants under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) and Part B grants under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). Federal funds made up \$119 billion or roughly 14 percent of total education funding during the 2022 fiscal year. That amount has doubled from pre-pandemic levels (\$58 billion in 2019) partially due to legislation enacted in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, which provided emergency relief funding to address the impact that COVID-19 had on elementary and secondary schools.

Title I ESEA

Title I grants provide funds to school districts serving large shares of low-income students. It is the largest grant program of ESEA, totaling \$15 billion during the 2022 fiscal year. Those funds are allocated through four formulas that are based on the number of eligible students and several provisions, including a state's target level of funding per student. Eligible students include children ages 5 to 17 in:

- 1. low-income families:
- 2. institutions for neglected or delinquent children or in foster homes; and
- 3. families receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families payments.

The Technology Department has been dedicated to enhancing our security measures, collaborating closely with Centegix Security to stay at the forefront of Rapid Incident Response Safety Solutions. Additionally, our school system has been awarded a grant from the Federal Communications Commission to participate in the FCC's Schools and Libraries Cybersecurity Pilot Program. This three-year initiative will provide valuable support and help offset the costs of eligible cybersecurity services and equipment. Furthermore, we are actively planning for upcoming testing and system updates to ensure our infrastructure remains secure and resilient.

There have been some changes on the state level that will impact how literacy is implemented in English Language Arts (ELA) classrooms. Teachers at Stewart County Schools are being trained to implement these changes so that they can prepare students to become proficient readers.

One of the changes is the new standards. The teachers in Stewart County have been and will continue to have professional learning on the new ELA standards adopted by the state of Georgia. The 2024–2025 School Year will be the last year students will be instructed on the Georgia Standards of Excellence in English/Language Arts (ELA) across all grade levels K-12. Starting the 2025 – 2026 School Year, new standards, Georgia's K-12 English Language Arts (ELA): Foundational Skills, Language, Texts, and Practices Standards will be implemented in classrooms.

Another change is through the Georgia Early Literacy Act. All teachers who teach Kindergarten – 3rd grade students are receiving training in structured literacy and the science of reading as mandated by the Georgia Department of Education. This training will help teachers fully understand why students have certain deficits in reading and provide the necessary instruction and interventions to help them through researched-based strategies and resources.

SCHOOL NURSE

Welcome back, students and families! I hope everyone had a restful and refreshing break. As we settle back into our school routines, it is important to stay healthy and prepared for the changing seasons. With spring just around the corner, many students may start experiencing seasonal allergies. Common symptoms include: sneezing, runny nose, itchy eyes, and congestion. To help manage allergies, please encourage your child to wash their hands and face after being outdoors, keep classroom windows closed on high-pollen days, and take any prescribed allergy medications as directed. If your child has severe allergies and needs medication during school hours, be sure to update the nurse's office with the appropriate documentation.

Additionally, we want to remind parents and guardians that our annual scoliosis screening for middle school students is coming up. Scoliosis is a curvature of the spine that can develop during growth spurts, and early detection is key for effective treatment. The screening is a quick, non-invasive check conducted by trained professionals. If you prefer to have your child opt out, please send in a written exemption to the school nurse before the screening date. If you have any questions about allergies, scoliosis screenings, or any other health concerns, feel free to reach out to the nurse's office. MENTAL HEALTH



The main goal of the faculty and staff of the Stewart County School District is to ensure that our scholars achieve academic success and to do so, we must also take care of their social and emotional needs. We offer counseling services for our students through the Georgia Apex Program and the services are provided by the New Horizon Behavioral Health Center. The Georgia Apex Program (Apex), funded by the Georgia Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Disabilities (DBHDD), strives to build capacity and increase access to mental health services for school-aged youth, Pre-Kindergarten to 12th grade, throughout the state.

Apex recognizes schools as a natural environment for identification and intervention and aims to reduce the number of youth with unmet mental health needs.

The program promotes collaboration between community mental heal<mark>th providers and schools to provide school-based services and support, including training for school staff, to facilitate the right care at the right time for children, young adults, and families.</mark>


Media Specialis
