Albert B. Kelly, Gateway's President And CEO, Receives Prestigious Lyndon Baines Johnson Leadership Award

Albert B. Kelly, CCAP, Gateway's President, CEO, and founder received the prestigious National Lyndon Baines Johnson Leadership Award at the National Community Action Partnership's Annual Convention on August 29 in Seattle.

Kelly accepted the award at the convention's Awards Gala which more than 1,800 people attended. With approximately 1,100 Community Action Agencies in the country, being selected for this award was highly competitive.

"It's not about me, it's about what we have done together at Gateway," Kelly said as he accepted the award. "In my time in Community Action, I thank the people who inspired me and helped me become the Lyndon Baines Johnson Award winner. I thank you very much. It's an honor to accept this award among people who work so hard to make America a better place to live."

This award recognizes Community Action practitioners whose expertise on what works to promote greater economic opportunity for children and families is known and respected at the national, state, and local levels. These practitioners have led their Community Action Agency in connecting numerous children and families to greater opportunities, transforming their lives, and making their communities a better place to live.

Albert B. Kelly's dedication to making communities better places to live has been manifested in numerous ways in his 37 years in Community Action, making him a deserving recipient of the National Lyndon Baines Johnson Leadership Award. Kelly has led Gateway CAP in serving our communities in the following areas: the creation of affordable housing and senior housing, food distribution to those in need particularly during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, building an urban farm in the middle of the City of Bridgeton to provide food and jobs, a leader in economic development to help create jobs where employment is needed, the founder of the Cumberland County Black Hall of Fame, and several programs to help youth including being the founder of the Bridgeton (NJ) Police Athletic League. These are just some of his achievements. Kelly has won numerous awards recognizing his service to the community and has been appointed to or volunteered for various community boards designed to strengthen our communities and help families.

One area that fuels his passion to serve is the plight of the homeless. Kelly co-founded the Cumberland County Code Blue Coalition, creating a program that provides a warm shelter for many homeless men and women when temperatures drop below freezing. Kelly led an effort to create a "tiny homes" transitional housing facility to assist those reentering society after incarceration and are at risk of homelessness. Working in partnership with The Kintock Group (a reentry entity), the Reentry Coalition of New Jersey, and the New Jersey State Parole Board, Gateway produced a tiny homes reentry village adjacent to Kintock's Bridgeton location. The site consists of six 100-square-foot tiny houses and a community room and was developed for individuals transitioning out of the criminal justice system. It promises to be an effort that will be duplicated around the state as New Jersey turns to innovative approaches to assist those seeking to turn their lives around after incarceration.

Welcoming The First Day Of School!



Get the Lead Out!



Studies have found inhaling or consuming lead is extremely harmful, especially to children and pregnant women.

How We Help:

Cumberland, Gloucester and Salem residents who suspect lead LEAD REMEDIATION & ABATEMENT PROGRAM contamination can now receive assistance through New Jersey's Lead-Remediation & Abatement Program.

> This program educates residents about the dangers of lead poisoning, shares information about lead remediation and helps those who fear or may have confirmed lead contamination in their homes.

Program Offerings:

Eligible Cumberland, Gloucester and Salem residents can receive:

- Preliminary lead testing to determine if lead is present
- Lead inspection and risk assessment of your home
- Remediation of lead-based paint hazards via interim controls (i.e. painting, cleaning, repairs, etc.)

If lead is detected, residents may be eligible for help and guidance on how to properly remediate any lead-based paint hazards.


Eligibility:

Cumberland, Gloucester and Salem counties are currently accepting applications to the Lead-Remediation & Abatement Program.

Applicants must meet certain property and income eligibility guidelines:

- **Income Guidelines**
 - ♦ Participants should be low— to moderate—income homeowners or tenants
 - The homeowners/occupants and/or the tenant household's gross should not exceed 80% of the Area Median Income in their respective home counties
- **Property Guidelines**
 - Oconsists of one (1) or four (4) units
 - ♦ Built prior to 1978
 - Must have a presence of lead-based paint hazards

PLEASE NOTE: Documentation is also needed to verify that the above guidelines are met.

Saquemos el Plomo!



Los estudios han encontrado que inhalar o consumir plomo es extremadamente dañino, especialmente para los niños y las mujeres embarazadas.

Cómo ayudamos:

Los residentes que sospechan la contaminación por plomo ahora pueden recibir asistencia a través del *Programa de rehabilitación y reducción del plomo en el hogar de Nueva Jersey* (Lead-Remediation & Abatement Program).

Este programa informa a los residentes de Cumberland, Gloucester y Salem sobre los peligros del envenenamiento por plomo, comparte información sobre la remediación del plomo y ayuda a quienes temen o que puedan haber confirmado la contaminación por plomo en sus hogares.

Ofertas del programa:

Los residents elegibles de Cumberland, Gloucester y Salem pueden recibir:

- Pruebas preliminares de plomo para determinar si hay plomo
- Inspección de plomo y evaluación de riesgos de su hogar
- Remediación de riesgos de pintura a base de plomo a través de controles provisionales (es decir, pintura, limpieza, reparaciones, etc.

Si se detecta plomo, los residentes pueden ser elegibles para recibir ayuda y orientación sobre cómo remediar adecuadamente cualquier peligro de pintura a base de plomo.

Elegibilidad:

Cumberland, Gloucester y Salem actualmente esta aceptando solicitudes para el programa de rehabilitacion y reduccion del plomo (Lead-Remediation & Abatement Program).

Los solicitantes deben cumplir con ciertas pautas de eligibilidad de propiedad e ingresos:

Pautas para los ingresos

- Los participantes deben ser propietarios o inquilinos con ingresos bajos a moderados
- El Ingreso bruto del hogar del ocupante propietario de la vivienda y/o del inquilino no debe exceder el 80% del ingreso medio del área en los respectivos condados de

viviendas

Pautas para la propiedad

- Debe consistir en una (1) a cuatro (4) unidades
- Construida(s) antes de 1978
- Debe(n) tener riesgos de pintura a base de plomo

POR FAVOR, RECUERDE: También se necesita documentación para verificar que se cumplan las pautas anteriores.



Breast Cancer Awareness Month







October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month

Everyone has breast tissue, don't forget to look and feel your breasts/pecs regularly by conducting a breast self-exam.

Signs to look out for:

- A lump or unusual thickening in the breast or underarm area
- A change in color or rash on the skin of the breast
- Unusual nipple discharge
- Swelling of all or part of the breast area
- A change in size or shape of the breast
- Itchy, sore or scaling of the nipple
- Dimpling on breast skin or nipple turning inward
- Breast or nipple pain that does not go away

Consult your physician if you experience any of the above symptoms of breast cancer and/or if you have any questions or concerns.

Breast Cancer Awareness Month is a time for survivors and their loved ones to celebrate relationships and kinship. It serves as a period dedicated to raising awareness about breast cancer, emphasizing the significance of research, early detection, and prevention.

Additionally, it stands as a somber reflection on the lives lost to this disease, with over 43,000 expected to pass in the U.S. this year alone, almost entirely to metastatic disease.
