AUBURNDALE September 29, 1950

Displaying promising line power, the spirited Lake Wales team trounced Auburndale 30 to 12 in the opening game of the season. Morrow made numerous gains throughout the game and scored on a 38 yard run and a line buck. The locals' first score came when Jones drove over on a four yard drive. Smith crossed the visitors' goal in the third quarter and Brown climaxed the Highlander scoring as he powered over the middle of the line. Captain Allen, Burgess, and Holmes turned in a good account as they blocked several punts and gobbled up fumbles.



SEBRING October 6, 1950

Lake Wales notched their second straight victory at the expense of the Sebring Blue Streaks 26 to 7, but in the process Kingswood Sprott broke his leg and Pete Jones went out with a leg injury. The Walesmen got their first score via the air route on a pass from Burgess to Pooser, and Jones accounted for the second after he scampered 48 yards to the 11 inch mark. Wilkinson got into the scoring column when he recovered a fumble in the end zone. Burgess also tallied after he changed to fullback and plowed through the line.





25-0 MULBERRY October 13, 1950


Led by Burgess, the Highlanders remped over Mulberry 25 to 0 to take undisputed first place in the Ridge Conference. Morrow and Brown set up the Walesmen's first and final touchdowns with long runs with Burgess supplying the goal line punch. Later in the second quarter Brown bored through the line for a T.D., with the aid of beautiful blocking in the forward wall, and scored the only extra point of the game on an end run. Richards wasn't to be left out of the scoring either as he flashed over the goal on a 12 yard dash.

Running up against their first tough competition, Lake Wales was toppled from the unbeaten ranks by Kissimmee 25 to 0. The Kowboys ran up their score when Burgess and Smith tried to get the Highlanders back into the ball game with long, towering passes which were intercepted and turned into touchdowns. One of the bright spots of the game was a 70 yard drive with Smith passing to Drawdy for long gains. The drive was stopped short of the goal when the Kowboys intercepted a pass. Brown and Morrow were hampered with injuries which held the Lake Wales offense back.

AVON PARK October 20, 1950



A crowd of 3,800 saw an aroused Lake Wales blast their way to a 38 to 6 victory over Avon Park. Morrow and Brown led the touchdown surge with two scores and Richards and Shields each tallied once to continue the parade. Burgess and Brown ran for the extra points. One of Morrow's touchdowns was a 25 yard jaunt around end, and Brown's went 48 yards through a gaping hole. In the line, Allen, Holmes, Wilkinson, and Whidden made outstanding defensive plays throughout the game. Alexander, Arendsen, and Pooser were the ends given credit for smearing the end runs.

27-6 FROSTPROOF October 27, 1950

Displaying a powerful first half offensive show, the Highlanders continued their mastery of Frostproof with a 27 to 6 drubbing. Lake Wales scored their first two touchdowns early in the game when Frostproof fumbled twice, and the two final tallies were the result of long drives. Brown and Morrow were in the driver's seat for the Walesmen with two scores each; Shields was the kicking specialist as he split the uprights for three extra points. Cooper continued to play well at defensive halfback and H. Hattaway, Hickman, and Cox showed promising ability in the line.


Winter Haven gains ground as Allen and Jones close in for the tackle.

Lake Wales took a surprising first half lead with Burgess and Morrow scoring on runs of 40 and 19 yards respectively. Shields chalked up the final marker which put the game on ice. Kathleen tallied their lone T.D. in the first half but were unable to penetrate the Highlander's strong defense. Jones and Burgess were shifted to defensive ends to stop Kathleen's offensive threat. Lasseter, Wilson, and Skinner were outstanding in the line.

HAINES CITY November 23, 1950

A spirited Lake Wales almost took the stinger out of the Hornets as they battled to a 13 to 13 tie. Zimmerman started the locals' first touchdown march with a 31 yard run with Smith passing to Morrow in the end zone to climax the drive. In the third quarter Haines City rallied for a touchdown, but the jubilant Walesmen roared back with Burgess plowing through the center of the line, and dragging three Hornets over the goal for the Highlanders' last score.
