

by Dave Pelzer




Mollie's Recommendation:

Superintendent's Newsletter

NEWS FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE

Welcome to the first quarterly newsletter from the Superintendent's Office! Since we no longer have the Hooker Advance to report on school news, I thought this would be a good way to inform and update the Hooker School Community on events and projects.

First and foremost, the staff at Hooker Schools are blessed to have parents and a community that supports our students in such a great way. We appreciate the way of life that the Oklahoma Panhandle still supports and we feel blessed that the values remain steadfast in our small town.

As we start off this school year, I would like to inform you of the many academic, activity, and maintenance projects that have been in progress and are near completion or completed.

- Security grants from the State of Oklahoma have allowed us to update fire alarms, camera systems, install a controlled access system for all of our buildings, and install ballistic window tint to help improve safety for all our students and staff.
- The Oklahoma Redbud School Funding grant funded by medical marijuana tax revenue allowed us to purchase one new route bus this past school year.
- After two years of working with OSIG Insurance we were able to make significant repairs to our roofs with the funds from the insurance claim.
- Federal Government reimbursements from Child Nutrition have allowed us to provide another year of free breakfast and lunch for our students.
- We have continued to work on academic alignment through professional development for our teachers, along with updating curriculum and technology to provide the best possible education for our students. This includes purchasing supplemental instructional programs and over two hundred desktop and laptop computers for the benefit of all students.
- After many setbacks, we have continued to press forward with the completion of a Greenhouse f or our students. At this point, we are waiting for approval from the State Fire Marshall to complete the project.
- Through community partnerships/donations we have also made improvements to our FFA farm, purchased a new scoreboard for our softball field, and an inflatable run-through for our football team.
- We applied for a received a fifteen thousand dollar Oklahoma Local Food for Schools Grant from the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry to purchase local beef for our cafeteria.

There have been numerous improvements and continued maintenance to our facilities and transportation fleet to ensure safety for our students and staff to show the pride we have in being a Hooker Bulldog!
