Dear Parents/Guardians

Head lice are constantly present throughout any community and anyone can get head lice. When people come together in one location, such as a school, head lice transfer is possible. We, the school system, are trying to prevent the spread of lice in our schools through being proactive and with education.

AN OUNCE OF PREVENTION GOES A LONG WAY

Help remind your child to not share hats, hooded sweatshirts, and combs or brushes. Lice can transfer when children put their heads together. Having short hair or keeping long hair braided or tied up can help.

While we are working to eliminate head lice, please inspect your child's hair weekly. Lice can usually be found near the back of the neck and around the ears. If lice is found on one child, it's a good idea to inspect everyone in your family

Head lice can be treated with special shampoos. A quality nit comb is among the best tools. If a child has nits, hair should be sectioned and combed daily. The comb should be passed through detergent water. Dawn liquid is recommended-just a squirt in a tub of warm water. The detergent kills the lice. When done, drain the water and clean the comb.

Nits are sacks on a hair shaft that contain an egg. If the nit is 3/8 of an inch from the scalp, there is no egg in it. It is hard to kill eggs because of the protective sack. That is why it is important to use a nit comb every evening for 10 days on every family member who has lice.

Other tips are to keep the back of upholstered furniture vacuumed. Sheets, bedding, coats can be washed in warm water with detergent. Lice don't live more than 2 days away from a human body, so anything that may contain lice can be isolated for 2 days, or tossed in the dryer on warm heat. Lice don't like heat. Blow drying hair has been reported as helpful.

Welcome back, Explorers! It was so nice to have everyone back! We sure hit the door running! Your students are working so hard to be successful, professional students!

As we are working and moving in the upcoming weeks, it would be very helpful if students with long hair would consider pulling their locks back with a hair tie each day. This will allow for freer movement and focus for art, pe, recess play, and science.

Speaking of science, students built on previous ideas of matter. This week students reviewed that matter makes everything. We also reviewed that matter has mass, takes up space, and has properties specific to the type of matter. Students also studied three states of matter: solid, liquid, and gas.

In addition to first grader's new unit study on fables and second grader's study on realistic fiction, explorers dove into writing and the writing process this week.

First graders are making groups of tens and ones as they interact with counting and modeling numbers. Second graders are applying their knowledge of 2-digit subtraction to solve two step story problems!
