<u>Course Description:</u> This course is dedicated to the study of economics. It is an in depth examination of fundamental concepts, microeconomics, macroeconomics, international economics, and personal finance. In each area students are introduced to major concepts and themes concerning that aspect of economics.

**Availability for Extra Help:** I will be available before or after school *by appointment*, depending on the schedule for the week. Extra help is encouraged and will be available if needed.

### **Grading Policy:**

Your overall grade is determined by a semester average and a final exam.

- The semester average is rolling, continuing throughout the duration of the semester, comprising 80% of your final grade.
- The Final Exam makes up 20% of your grade.
- Your semester average is calculated in the following categories:
  - o 50% Tests/ Major Projects/Current Events (Midterm/Final counts as two test grades)
  - o 30% Projects/Quizzes
  - o 20% Daily Work/ Homework

I **do not drop** grades, nor do I assign **individual** extra credit assignments. However, there will be numerous extra credit opportunities for all members of the class throughout the semester.

<u>Late Work Policy</u>: Certain projects and homework assignments may be turned in one day late, but 20 points will be automatically deducted from the grade. For an assignment that is submitted two days late, an additional 10 points will be deducted. On the third day, an additional 10 points will be taken from the assignment grade. Any assignment submitted after three days will receive a grade of 0. Any work that is graded during class and handed back to students **cannot** be turned in late!!

Make-Up Work: After an absence it is the responsibility of the student to check with the teacher to find out the assignments missed. Failure to ask for missed work does not excuse the student from the assignment. Work missed due to an excused absence must be made up within three days. This does not include major projects, research papers, etc., where the deadline has been posted in advance. Failure to make arrangements within the allotted time will result in a zero for all work missed. Work missed during an unexcused absence cannot be made up. Unexcused absences will result in an automatic zero (0)! If you miss the day of a test, be prepared to take a make-up test the day you return to school, after school not during school hours. Missed projects must be made up at the teacher's convenience.

**Required Assignments:** Throughout the semester we will look at a variety of assessments to adequately gauge the mastery of the Economics Standards. We will also have 1 summative test per unit, along with a weekly quiz (or more).

## **Classroom Rules:**

- 2. Be prepared Bring all required materials to class with you to class every day.
- 3. Absolutely no cell phone and/or smart watch use in class unless authorized by the teacher. Students will place cell phones in the phone basket upon entering the classroom. Phones that are not in the basket and are seen during class will be confiscated and turned in to the office.
