What is A Title I School?

The purpose of Title I under ESSA is to "ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high-quality education and reach, at a minimum, proficiency on challenging state academic achievement standards and state academic assessments."

A title 1 school works to:

- ➤ Set goals for improvement
- Measure student progress and develop programs that add to classroom instruction
- ➤ Involve parents in all aspects of the program



Russell Elementary is a school-wide Title I school, therefore ALL students benefit from Title I resources.




Russell Elementary School-wide Program School-wide Goals

- Increase the percentage of students in grades K-5 reading at or above grade level by 3% measured by the Houston County Literacy Inventory. (HCLI)in grades K-2 and by the Lexile in grades 3-5.
- Increase the percentage of students scoring proficient or distinguished on math and ELA Georgia Milestones test by 3%.

What curriculum does our school use?

The Georgia Standards of Excellence provide a consistent framework to prepare students for success in college and/or the 21st century workplace.

The performance standards provide clear expectations for instruction, assessment, and student work.


The performance standards isolate and identify the skills needed to use the knowledge and skills to problem-solve, reason, communicate, and make connections with other information.

They also tell the teacher how to assess the extent to which the student knows the material or can manipulate and apply the information.

The performance standard incorporates the content standard, which simply tells the teacher what a student is expected to know (i.e., what concepts he or she is expected to master).

Houston County School District has purchased the Benchmark Advance reading system that ties into the Science of Reading legislation.

What tests will my child take?

The Georgia student assessment program is designed to measure student achievement relative to the state-mandated content standards, to identify students failing to achieve mastery of content, to provide teachers with diagnostic information, and to assist school systems in identifying strengths and weaknesses in order to establish priorities in planning educational programs.


The first six weeks kindergarten students will be given GKIDS – Readiness
