Flowers Baking Company bid a 30 ct package for item 2 and a 24 ct package for items 4 and 5. Calculations were done by the CNP Director in order to compare the items in an equitable way. Bimbo Bakeries was still found to be the lowest bidder.

RISK ASSESSMENT AND PROJECT SUMMARY

Dr. Gardner

Thank you for reaching out to United Bat Control of Alabama.

As you are aware, the Kinterbish Junior High School in Cuba Alabama has an active bat infestation located in the cafeteria. Our inspection confirmed this activity as well.

This summary will outline an explanation of our solutions to eliminate the health hazards that bats present by:

 Locate primary entry points and safely exclude the live bat colonies. Application of Bat Proofing and Prevention materials to the current infested areas.

- Histoplasmosis Remediation:
 Provide applications of sterilizers and deodorizers into the present infested areas (post exclusion), which destroys the fungi that causes Histoplasmosis*. https://www.cdc.gov/fungal/ diseases/histoplasmosis/index.html

humeralis; Eastern Pipistrelle Pipistrellus subflavus; Free-tailed Bats (Family Molossidae): Big Free-tailed Bat Nyctinomops macrotis; Brazilian Free-tailed Bat Tadarida brasiliensis.

These bats are insectivorous and require some form of water which they use as foraging sites and sources of drinking water. Bats occur among a wide variety of wetland habitat types including

riparian, permanent and semi-permanent marsh, and seasonal wetlands. In autumn, many bats migrate to warmer climates of favorable areas to hibernate. Bats require two different roost types, day and night. Day roosts allow for resting or nursing of young; whereas, night roosts provide for rest between feeding bouts. Bats will roost in caves, trees, under tree bark, and in buildings.

Due to the location of the property and of the bat colonies, the most likely species present is the Brazilian Free-tailed Bat also known as the Mexican Free-tailed bat, Large Brown bat, and/or Small Brown bat.

Brazilian Free-tailed Bat (AKA: Mexican Free-tailed Bat) Scientific name: Tadarida brasiliensis

Weight: 11-15 grams

Wingspan: 29-35 centimeters

Distribution: The southern United States and southward through Mexico and Central America into northern South America.

Ecology and Behavior: Habitat of Brazilian free-tailed bats differs in various parts of the United States. This species is usually present in only manmade structures, it does not migrate long distances, and few colonies larger than a few hundred individuals are known. These bats often select hot attics as roosts, and young seem to be able to tolerate higher temperatures than adults. High

temperatures in roosts are essential for the rapid growth of young bats; apparently, the larger the colony, the less energy expenditure per bat to maintain a given temperature.

Whereas bats are beneficial to the ecology, when they invade our work area or living space, they pose significant health and safety risks. Many people are familiar with the possible risk of contracting rabies from contact with an infected

bat, another area of concern is histoplasmosis. Fortunately both are rare, however since they are possible health hazards we will describe them below.

Bats and Rabies

Q: Do bats get rabies?

A:Yes. Bats are mammals and are susceptible to rabies, but most do not have the disease. You cannot tell if a bat has rabies just by looking at it; rabies can be confirmed only by having the animal tested in a laboratory. To minimize the risk for rabies, it is best never to handle any bat.

Q:What should I do if I come in contact with a bat?

A: If you are bitten by a bat -- or if infectious material (such as saliva) from a bat gets into your eyes, nose, mouth, or a wound -- wash the affected area thoroughly and get medical attention immediately. Whenever possible, the bat should be captured and sent to a laboratory for rabies testing. People usually know when

they have been bitten by a bat. However, because bats have small teeth which may leave marks that are not easily seen, there are situations in which you should seek medical advice even in the absence of an obvious bite wound. For example, if you awaken and find a bat in your room, see a bat in the room of an unattended child, or see a bat near a mentally impaired or intoxicated person, seek medical advice and have the bat tested.

People cannot get rabies just from seeing a bat in an attic, in a cave, or at a distance. In addition, people cannot get rabies from having contact with bat guano (feces), blood, or urine, or from touching a bat on its fur (even though bats should never be handled)!. http://www.cdc.gov/rabies/docs/brochure- bats_and_rabies-full.pdf

Q:What should I do if I find a bat in my home?

A: If you see a bat in your home and you are sure no human or pet exposure has occurred, confine the bat to a room by closing all doors and windows leading out of the room except those to the outside. The bat will probably leave soon. If not,

it can be caught, as described below, and released outdoors away from people and pets. However, if there is any question of exposure, leave the bat alone and call animal control or a wildlife conservation agency for assistance. If professional assistance is unavailable, use precautions to capture the bat safely, as described below.

What you will need:

Leather work gloves (put them on) Small box or coffee can

Piece of cardboard & tape

When the bat lands, approach it slowly and place a box or coffee can over it. Slide the cardboard under the container to trap the bat inside. Tape the cardboard to the container securely. Contact your health department or animal control authority to make arrangements for rabies testing.

Q: How can I tell if a bat has rabies?

A: Rabies can be confirmed only in a laboratory. However, any bat that is active by day, is found in a place where bats are not usually seen (for example

in rooms in your home or on the lawn), or is unable to fly, is far more likely than others to be rabid. Such bats are often the most easily approached. Therefore, it is best never to handle any bat. The bat droppings, called guano, pose a lesser known, but also a very serious health risk. These droppings harbor a fungus which, when it becomes airborne can be inhaled, thereby exposing the person to a bacterial lung infection called "Histoplasmosis." In places where there is considerable foot traffic or activity, the possibility of exposure increases. All of this presents the need for a thorough, professional, and reliable solution to these problems.

Bats and Histoplasmosis

Histoplasmosis is an infectious disease caused by inhaling the spores of a fungus called Histoplasma capsulatum.

H. capsulatum grows in soils throughout the world. In the United States, the fungus is endemic and the proportion of people infected by H. capsulatum is higher in central and eastern states. The fungus seems to grow best in soils having a high nitrogen

content, especially those enriched with bird manure or bat droppings. The organism can be carried on the wings, feet, and beaks of birds or bats and infect soil under roosting sites or manure accumulations inside or outside buildings. Habitats of pigeons and bats, and poultry houses with dirt floors have also been found contaminated by H. capsulatum. Unlike birds, bats can become infected with H. capsulatum and consequently can excrete the organism in their droppings. (For more information please download: http:// www.cdc.gov/niosh/docs/2005-109/pdfs/ 2005-109.pdf)

Histoplasmosis primarily affects a person's lungs, and its symptoms vary greatly. The vast majority of infected people are asymptomatic (have no apparent ill effects), or they experience symptoms so mild they do not seek medical attention and may not even realize that their illness was histoplasmosis. If symptoms do occur, they will usually start within 3 to 17 days after exposure, with an average of 10 days. Histoplasmosis can appear as a mild, flu-like respiratory illness and has a combination of symptoms, including malaise (a general ill feeling), fever, chest pain, dry or

nonproductive cough, headache, loss of appetite, shortness of breath, joint and muscle pains, chills, and hoarseness.

A chest X-ray of a person with acute pulmonary histoplasmosis will commonly show a patchy pneumonitis, which eventually calcifies. Chronic lung disease due to histoplasmosis resembles tuberculosis and can worsen over months or years. Special antifungal medications are needed to arrest the disease. The most severe and rarest form of this disease is disseminated histoplasmosis, which involves spreading of the fungus to other organs outside the lungs. Disseminated histoplasmosis is fatal if untreated, but death can also occur in some patients even when medical treatment is received. People with weakened immune systems are at the greatest risk for developing severe and disseminated histoplasmosis. Included in this high-risk group are persons with acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS) or cancer and persons receiving cancer chemotherapy; high-dose, long-term steroid therapy; or other immuno-suppressive drugs.

A person who has had histoplasmosis can experience reinfection after re-exposure to H. capsulatum. Persons with immunity to H. capsulatum who become reinfected will usually experience a heightened inflammatory response, but they will have a less severe illness of shorter duration than what resulted from the primary infection.

Not to be confused with reinfection, reactivation of latent (inactive) histoplasmosis can occur in elderly and immunocompromised individuals years after infection by H.

capsulatum. The metabolic activity of dormant yeasts and the methods that enable a microorganism to escape elimination by a host's immune system are unknown.

To reiterate, rabies and histoplasmosis are both rare but we mention it here as our policy is Safety First.
