Children's House 2

Children's House 2 has been enjoying the patio season this spring. On pizza day, we ate our pizza slices on the patio before heading off to recess. The children declared it "the best day ever!". We also recently took out a new collection of world flags mid-morning and it was also declared to be the "best day ever!". We're glad to hear that "best days" aren't contingent on the rare pizza-forlunch-day.

On one especially sunny and warm day, we extended recess into the afternoon work cycle. We moved tables and chairs onto the patio so that children could choose between things like the sandbox, jump rope, and play structure or reading books, building the trinomial cube, practicing numerals and preparing a snack for themselves. We love seeing children choose what would be truly regulating and interesting to them when presented with an array of freedoms.



Another afternoon highlight has been reading the sequel to *The Wild Robot, The Wild Robot Escapes.* We've also introduced individual boxes of legos for children to build with as they are listening. As I've mentioned, I love reading *The Wild Robot* series and was worried children wouldn't be as engaged with the presence of legos. Contrary to my worry, the children are equally, if not more, engaged. As I'm reading they sometimes add spontaneous, subtle sound effect (*The airship buzzed through the sky...* "buzzz, buzzz"), gasp at dramatic turn of events (*Roz boarded the airship*) and are quick to offer their speculations ("I think Brightbill will come find Roz).

Children have been working on many different projects over the past month including creating diagrams of ocean animals, illustrating food webs, bird watching around the school yard, and making some beautiful weavings on wooden looms. We finished reading the wonderful adventure of *The Enchantress Returns* by




Lower Elementary Pond
