

Hello Families,

Can you believe that we have only two more months of school to go? It sure is moving fast. Happy May! In April we studied CONTAINERS. Children had the opportunity to use their hands to manipulate the tops of some containers. The children did very well twisting off caps and releasing bin hinges.

We increased counting skills as we counted objects to place them in small and big containers, to see which held more objects. We practiced counting out five objects from each container.

Exploring Soil was our STEAM activity in which we had a chance to pour, fill and dump soil with our container. The moisture helped us with our question about what happens when soil gets wet. It makes mud. We looked at the foot prints of the unfortunate individual who stepped off the sidewalk and left foot prints in the mud. We asked them what happened to make that footprint in the soil. Some children explored the wet soil while on the playground. In May, our concentrated study is ROCKS. We have become GEOLOGISTS, as we have already looked at soil and we will now explore different types of rocks we can find in our community. Children will gain language skills to help describe different types of rocks: SMOOTH, BIG, BUMPY, HEAVY, and ROUGH. Children will have opportunities to sort out rocks. I saved rocks from the rock hunt we did previously in the month of February, but should you find interesting rocks, I hope that you will bring them in and share with the class.

As part of our cultural experiences, we will have the children plant various seeds that were donated by Amy Garcia. We are excited to see who has a green thumb.

STEAM Worms. What is a worm? How can they help with gardens? Do worms bite? We will discuss these questions and many others the children may have regarding worms.

We wish everyone a wonderful month of May. It will be busy with transition, graduations and other celebrations. Be Safe.

Creative Curriculum- For the month of April our theme was containers. The children were able to see and play with different container shapes and sizes. They were also able to put small toys into the different containers.

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Achievements/goals- Our friends are working hard at potty training. We continue to work on sharing and taking turns with others in the classroom and using our words to communicate our needs to friends and teachers.

That is where we have them place the rocks that they pick up. In our study, we will observe the many different textures of a rock, using the words: Smooth, rough, big, small. There will also be an opportunity to collect rocks for us to add some color to them. Be on the lookout for our colorful rocks.

Turguoise Springs

Conscious Discipline: Power of Acceptance. Giving and receiving empathy, kindness, and compassion without feeling a sense of sacrifice. Sustaining relationships with communication skills that draw you closer to people and help you feel understood rather than distant and judged. When we use the Power of Acceptance with children, we validate their inner world. We send the message "I see you; I hear you". We respond to the child as they are, not as we believe they should be. -The book of Conscious Discipline

Cultural Lifeways: Children will learn the process of planting, from placing the soil into a pot, then the seeds, and adding water, also exposing the sun to what we are planting. We will have discussions about the uses of the items that we plant. The vocabulary we will learn in language class is: Planting, field, farmer, water, shovel, rake, parched corn, blue corn mush, grinding stone, and corn meal. Colors of the month: black and white.

Goals / Milestones: J.B. and J.V. have been working on potty training and being our classroom role models. I. G. and J. V. have made some big progress in walking into the classroom during drop off time in the mornings. J.V., E.S., and J.B. have been using more words such as: Please, thank you and you're welcome. A.L. and J.B. give great hugs. K.T. is our newest addition and is learning the daily routine with little to no separation issues. Watching everyone grow and do something new has been very exciting to see or hear.

Paguate April / Mau Hello, Familiar



We hope your Easter lunches were delicious and that you found a lot of eggs. The clan lunch exchange went well at DEC, we had a chance to meet the Early Head Start children and took home a nutritious bag, basket, or bucket filled with food and prizes. Thank you all for your participation!

During April, we learned about gardening and how to take care of baby plants. The books we engaged in were, The Enormous Potato, The Carrot Seed, and Rainbow Garden. We sorted the toy foods into vegetables and fruits, then also by color. Our families encouraged their child's curiosity by creating a Dream Garden Collage and by planting a seed (one excited child brought his tomato seedling to school to share with his friends). To help aid with our study, children were able to plant onions and cilantro in to "Root Viewer" to see how seeds begin to grow. They were introduced to the scientific concept of "photosynthesis": the process that leaves can produce the plant's food from sunlight and gas exchange when carbon dioxide enters the leaf while oxygen is released. As the plants grow, we will measure them and make a prediction of how many and how large or small the plant will get.

The children have been learning to spell out their names after their daily sign-in and have, guite naturally, begun to see "their letters" in environmental print. This organic discovery will help us when we go to the zoo for our field trip this month. Further information will be sent home with a permission slip.

This month we will explore Insects: what they are, where we can find them, their different characteristics, and their place in our lives. As always, the study will have children explore through learning opportunities and play, conversation, and research on the Internet.

All areas of developmental learning will be included in our daily routines and practices.

Activities regarding insects will be sent home during the month. We look forward to your help and creations!

April was a busy month with our theme of Gardening. The children have been helping out with tilling the soil, planting seeds, and monitoring the plants as they grow. We are trying to see what kind of fruits, vegetables, and flowers we can plant. We want to plant strawberries and blueberries as well as the traditional watermelon and cilantro. We are also at the latter stage of the alphabet, ending April with the letter V. We have had some creative arts from the children that are fantastic. Creativity is a great tool for a child, as it helps with expanded thinking, or as we say, "thinking outside the box". I always stress that there is no wrong answer in preschool, only creativity. Your children are doing a wonderful job.

We celebrated April with the Easter Holiday. Everyone has their different ways of celebrating. We brought our traditional Easter celebration to the classroom. The children learned about the different clans and the clan system. The children were amazed when they found out what their big and little clans were and each other's clans. They found out who are moms and dads, brothers and sisters. It was certainly profound and amusing.

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The month of May is going to bring us many activities that will be outdoors. Our curriculum focus will be Insects. We will explore what insects are, where they live, what they eat, and how some are important to our environment. And, of course, those insects we regard as pests.

For our traditional activity, we will be introducing and learning the process of planting corn and the uses of corn. With our customs and traditions, we will instruct the children how corn is important to our society. There are many uses in our community for corn and around our country.

May is also the month where we will be preparing for our field trip. Ms. Yvonne and I sat with the teachers from the Village Classroom and discussed what we would like for our children and their families to experience. It was decided that we will venture on the NM Rail Runner Train on May 28, 2025. We are so used to seeing a train go by our homes almost on a daily basis, we wanted the children to experience, at least one time, a train ride. Notes were sent home with the children with details to follow. We are all excited and looking forward to this trip.

As we get closer to the end of the school year, once again we would like to remind families to continue reading to your children. There are many ways to read to your children including while you are traveling. Environmental print is all around us with signs and billboards. Include a book while you are in your vehicle. Devices are convenient, but reading to your child increases vocabulary, print awareness, literacy skills, and also bonding with your child. When you do read to your child, please don't forget to log it in on your reading log. In-kind is still being recorded.

We hope that all our families enjoy the warm weather we will be experiencing. Please remember that open toe shoes are not allowed here at school due to safety reasons. With this warm weather, the children will be playing outdoors more, and debris will get into open toe shoes very easily. Closed toe sneakers are highly recommended. - Some children are getting the hang of simple math, such as addition and subtraction! AWESOME!
- About 85% of the children know their initials; 15% are still learning.

Altogether, every single one has come a long way with tremendous progress! Good job! 😊

- PLEASE send your child to school every day unless they are sick or have appointments. Soon, we will begin to practice for the transition ceremony in June. We are excited to celebrate your child and their accomplishments.

Greetings from Seama Room. Our creative curriculum theme focused on seeds. We observed different seeds and their growth process. While learning about clans, we received help from our language teacher to help children identify their clans in the Laguna language. This month, our focus will be "getting ready for kindergarten". Can you believe it? We are near the end. Every child in Seama Room will be transitioning to kindergarten. We have been working hard in all learning domains. We have seen so much growth, and we see the confidence they have in their education and socialemotional skills. Children will have the opportunity to visit Laguna Elementary School, the kindergarten classroom and teachers. They will become familiar with a new environment. This month, we will have more conversations about new school environments. We want all children to have a smooth transition and be prepared for the next chapter in life. SUMMER SAFETY TIPS

Health Ail

Look for signs of exhaustion

Cases of heat stroke spike during the summer months and this can be life threatening in children. Prior to heat stroke, kids often show milder symptoms such as heat cramps and heat exhaustion. Make sure children take water breaks and wear lightweight clothing when playing outside.

Check for car safety

Make sure your child's car seat is properly installed before hitting the road. Never leave your child unattended in a car. The temperature inside a car rises quickly and a few minutes can make a difference.

Protect skin from the sun

Apply sunscreen with SPF 30 or higher whenever your child is going outdoors. Reapply every 3 hours or immediately after your child has been in or splashed by water. Wear hats and sunglasses to protect skin and eyes.

Avoid bug bites

As the weather warms up, bugs come out in full force. To avoid bug bites, apply insect repellent before spending time outside. Avoid scented soaps and lotions and cover arms and legs as much as possible.

Drink enough water

Kids are more prone to dehydration than adults, risk increases as temperatures rise.

Friendly Reminders:


1. If your child is not feeling well, they will be more comfortable at home. Please call the school if you will be keeping your child home to prevent the spread of illness.

- 2. Adhere to the 5 MPH school speed zone while on DEC campus.
- 3. Do not leave your vehicle running unattended.
- 4. Do not leave children alone in a vehicle.
- 5. No outside food or drink on campus. Thank you for helping us to protect children with food allergies.
- 6. Sign your child in/out at the front office if it is outside the hour of school start/end time.
- 7. Ensure all children are secured in a safety restraint system while being transported in a vehicle.

Once you have completed your child's application, the following documents will also need to be submitted:

1) Child's Birth Certificate,

2) Proof of Income (2024 1040 Tax Form, 2024 W-2),

3) Current well child check, and 4) Current immunization record.

These documents can be emailed to me at <u>me.sarracino@lagunaed.net</u>, faxed to the school to 505.796.6909, or they can be dropped off at the front office with Maddie or Iris.

Keep in mind there is a process each student's application goes through.

1)Once the application is received online, it is entered into the system for the upcoming school year.

2)The child's name and age are sent to the selection committee for placement into a classroom.

3)After the selection process has been completed, the parents are contacted and notified of their child's classroom and teachers.

4)The student's name, parents' names and contact information is shared with their teachers to schedule the initial home visit.

5)Teachers will make contact with the parents to schedule the initial home visit.

6)Once the initial home visit is complete, the Family Services Provider will reach out to the family to conduct Parent Orientation and/or Bus Orientation (if the child is 3 years old or older) and set the start date for the child to begin school.

7)During the initial home visit, if there are any additional steps necessary to be taken (i.e., special care plan,) these concerns will be brought to the attention of our Health Aide Ms. Angelica Baca.

Selection and placement for the upcoming school year will begin in June. Parents will be notified of their child's classroom and teachers at this time and initial home visits will start toward the end of June. If you are unable to schedule your initial home visit during this time, additional dates and times will be available in July and the first week in August. Teachers will be in contact with further information.

Parent orientation will also be scheduled the first week in August. Once the details have been finalized, the information will be shared with DEC families.

EHS- HOME BASED TEACHER

Early Head Start Home-Based Families

The home-based program serves children ages six months to under three years old. I meet with each family once a week, for one hour and a half.

The children have grown so much in ALL areas of Development such as: Social and emotional

Understanding and responding to communication from others Communicating needs and wants non-verbally, and by using language Using increasingly complex language in conversation with others Understanding an increasing number of words used in communication with others Holding books, turning pages, pointing at pictures, making sounds or saying words Making marks on paper and using them to represent objects or action Exploring people and objects to understand self, others, and objects Using a variety of strategies in solving problems Imitating sounds, words, gestures, actions

Language development is enhanced with the Laguna language and culture curriculum. I would like to give a BIG THANK YOU to the parents, for inviting me into their homes. 

CAUTION

Animal Plague Awareness



Plague is a bacterial disease in wildlife that pets can be exposed to by eating an infected animal or through bites of infected fleas," said Dr. Erin Phipps, state public health veterinarian. "Humans can also contract it through flea bites but also risk getting plague through direct contact with infected animals, including rodents, wildlife and pets."

Path of a plague

In nature The plague bacterium is transmitted by infected fileas and cycles naturally among wild rodents. At home

Occasionally infections in rodents increase, causing an outbreak. Humans and domestic animals bitten by infected fleas are at risk.



Cats become very ill and cough infectious droplets.

Dogs are less likely to get sick but can carry infected fleas.

Humans are infected by flea bites or handling infected animals.

Plague symptoms in cats and dogs are fever, lethargy and loss of appetite. There may be a swelling in the lymph node under the jaw.

Preventive Measures

- Not leaving pet food and water where rodents and wildlife can get to it.
- Putting hay, wood, and compost piles as far as possible from your home.
 - Getting any sick pets examined promptly by a veterinarian.
- Contacting your medical provider about any unexplained illness involving a sudden
 and severe fever.
- Talking to your veterinarian about using an appropriate flea control product on your pets.
 - Preventing pets from roaming and hunting.
- Cleaning up areas near the home where rodents could live, such as woodpiles, brush piles, junk and abandoned vehicles.
