District Priorities and Purpose

Frankston ISD's **RIPICS** Plan (Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan) has been created to meet the requirements for the ESSER III grant. The plan is designed to be flexible as governing authorities and/or health officials update us on present situations of the environmental conditions affecting our protocols for safety.

Meaningful Consultation

Stakeholder input will be obtained every six months and used to update the RIPICS and Use of Funds plans for ARP ESSER III through the end of the grant project period.

Stakeholders include:

- students, families, school and district administrators (including special education administrators), teachers, principals, school leaders, other educators, and school staff.
- to the extent present in or served by the LEA tribes, civil rights organizations (including disability rights organizations).
- stakeholders representing the interests of children with disabilities, English language learners, children experiencing homelessness, children in foster care, migrant students, children who are incarcerated, military-connected students, and other underserved students.

Topics of concern to be addressed are special populations, mental health services, lost instructional time, improving air quality, purchasing educational technology, and repairing/improving school facilities to reduce the risk of virus transmission and exposure to environmental health hazards.

Frankston ISD has and will continue to engage in meaningful consultation with stakeholders and give the public an opportunity to provide input in the development of its plan for the uses of ARP ESSER III funds to be utilized for safely opening and operating in-person learning according to CDC guidance. The funds will address the academic impact of lost instructional time through the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning and extended day. Frankston ISD ensures that the interventions to be implemented will respond to the academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs of all students, and particularly those students disproportionately impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, including students from low-income families, students of color, English learners, children with disabilities, students experiencing homelessness, children in foster care, military-connected students, and migratory students.

Universal and correct wearing of masks	 Students & staff have the <u>option</u> to wear a mask or face shield. <u>Face Coverings</u> Masks and face coverings are optional for students, staff and visitors in district facilities, school buses, and school events. We would encourage students and staff to take whatever precautions they feel comfortable with considering Covid. As of July 29, 2021, per GA-38 school systems cannot require students or staff to wear masks.

ہوجے Facilities and Physical Distancing	 Modifying facilities and requiring physical distancing is enforced to the greatest extent possible through the following actions: spacing of furniture. use of plexiglass dividers. greater access to open air areas or outside areas.
Handwashing and Respiratory Etiquette	 Handwashing & Sanitizer Schools will have hand sanitizer in classrooms, in the cafeteria, and in common areas throughout the campus. Students and staff will utilize hand washing areas and sanitizer during the day. Students will be reminded to wash hands on a regular basis. Staff will have access to disinfectant wipes to sanitize high touch surfaces and shared objects regularly. Respiratory Etiquette Students, teachers, staff, and campus visitors will be encouraged to cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue, and if not available, covered in their elbows. Used tissues should be thrown in the trash. Hands should be washed immediately with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, or hand sanitizer should be used.
Cleaning and Maintaining Healthy Facilities	 <u>Cleaning</u> Frankston ISD will continue to clean classrooms, restrooms, and other common areas daily. <u>Deep Cleaning and Disinfection Protocol</u> Deep cleaning is triggered when an active employee or student is identified as positive for COVID-19 based on testing. Deep cleaning will be performed as soon as the confirmation of a positive test, as practical. While the scope of deep cleaning is presumed to be the full site, sites may reduce the area to be deep cleaned if there is sufficient rationale to do so. We will close off areas that were heavily used by the individual with the lab-confirmed case (student, teacher, or staff) until the non-porous surfaces in those areas can be disinfected, unless more than 24 hours have already passed since that person was on campus.

 Improving Ventilation	 Frankston ISD plans to upgrade HVAC units district-wide in the fall of 2021, utilizing ESSER III funds. Additional measures include: opening of doors, when feasible. opening of windows, when feasible. frequent replacement of filters. use of fans, and/or air purifiers.
	<u>Contact Tracing</u> will be coordinated and performed with the state and local health departments. <u>Notification of a Positive Case at School</u> :
Contact Tracing	 Frankston ISD will notify all teachers, staff, and families of all students in a school if a lab-confirmed COVID-19 case is identified among students, teachers or staff who participate in any on-campus activities. The notification will be available on the FISD website on the COVID Dashboard. <u>FISD COVID Dashboard</u> Any close contacts will receive a call from the campus nurse if exposed to someone positive for COVID-19 at school. Parents may opt to keep their student at home during the recommended stay-at-home period of 10 days.
	 Isolation and Quarantine for Positive Lab-Confirmed Covid 19: The district will follow CDC guidance and other governing authorities for length of isolation for students and staff. A 24-hour period free of fever without medication has passed. Symptoms have significantly improved (coughing/breathing/shortness of breath). At least 10 days have passed since symptoms first occurred. If you have symptoms that could be COVID-19 and do not get evaluated by a medical professional or tested for COVID-19, it is assumed that you have COVID-19 and may not return to work until the three criteria listed above have been met. If you want to return sooner, you must (a) obtain a medical professional's note clearing the individual based on an alternate diagnosis, or (b) receive a negative lab-confirmed test. If there are no symptoms with a positive test, must stay home for 10 days from date of test. DSHS Readmission Criteria

Close Contact	Close Contact If staff members believe they have had close contact to someone with COVID-19 but are not currently sick, they should monitor their health for the above symptoms during the 14 days after the last day they were in close contact with the individual with COVID-19. For staff who meet the close contact threshold with a COVID-19 positive individual, if these staff continue to work on campus, rapid testing must be performed at the start of the day, at least once every day until the end of day 10. If a parent believes that they or the child has had close contact to someone with COVID-19 but are not currently sick, they should monitor their health for the above symptoms during the 14 days after the last day they were in close contact with the individual with COVID-19. All household contacts of a positive COVID case must be excluded from on campus activity until they reach the CDC release from quarantine criteria, or are fully vaccinated, or continue to test negative every other day during the quarantine period. Exceptions for Close Contact: Individuals who have positive antibodies may return with no symptoms. Individuals who are fully vaccinated may return with no symptoms.
Diagnostic and Screening Testing	 Staff will pre-screen for COVID-19 symptoms every day prior to entering the school. Parents must ensure they will not send a child to school on campus (or on a bus) if the child has COVID-19 symptoms or is lab-confirmed with COVID-19. Teachers will monitor students and refer them to the nurse if symptoms are present.

Continuity of Services	To ensure the continuity of educational services, students with a lab confirmed positive diagnosis of COVID-19 or a confirmed exposure will receive instruction through different modalities. <u>Teachers may use</u> : • Remote conferencing • Microsoft TEAMS, • educational software, and • other resources for students. Remote learning resources can be located on our district website at: <u>https://www.frankstonisd.net</u> . The campus principal and teachers will communicate remote learning resources as needed. The school will provide technology, as needed, for
	the student to complete schoolwork. Contact the campus if you need assistance with technology.

Students' and Staff Social, Emotional, Mental Health Needs	 Staff Support Frankston ISD provides support for staff in the following ways: May allow flexible scheduling to accommodate quarantines due to COVID-19. Provides professional development to support new modes of instructional delivery. Provides a retention stipend to encourage staff to stay and grow in the district. Student Support Social-emotional learning activities are embedded into instructional strategies to provide an inclusive learning environment for all students. Counselors are available for all students if they need additional support and counseling. Counselors coordinate available resources within the school system and from community agencies to provide referral information to families and students.

Information and resources are provided to parents and families in coordination with the local health department. Protocol for COVID-19 Symptomatic Individuals: Stay home and seek medical advice from a physician. Students with symptoms will be sent to the nurse, and the nurse will determine of the child should be sent home. The student will stay in isolation and must be picked up as soon as possible. Submit a medical professional's note to return to school. Contact tracing (isolation/quarantine) as instructed by CDC guidance.
