Below is the text of Dockweiler's speech at the Harvest Concert.

I have been asked to present the Hall of Faith Award tonight on behalf of the Nebraska Christian Schools Board of Directors. This award has been presented most years since 1983. One of the goals the board had when they created this award was to honor individuals who have had a long supportive association with Nebraska Christian Schools. The couple we are honoring tonight certainly meets that criteria.

My first awareness of this couple came when a colleague of mine shared his admiration for the behavior of their oldest daughter. John Ellefson found it impressive that this kindergarten child consistently thanked her bus driver each time she got off the bus. In the 32 years since then, this couple's oldest daughter and her three siblings have all graduated from Nebraska Christian Schools. As a side note, and I don't know if it's related or not, the practice of thanking a bus driver when you exit the bus has almost become a tradition around here.

Like most parents of students at Nebraska Christian, this couple was heavily involved in the events and activities that their kids were a part of. More than that, they seemed to really enjoy it. They helped set up and clean up for a lot of events and attended their children's activities. At one point, she got involved in the speech program as both

It is cold today, but I am in a warm place. What is happening outside my

window has very little impact on me right now. I feel the same way about the financial situation at Nebraska Christian Schools. The gift income numbers are lagging behind our budgeted amount. We currently have \$153,595 of the \$572,550 needed to meet the budget we set for the 2019-2020 fiscal year, which ends June 30. We are short, but we are in a secure place. Obviously, if the weather stayed this cold indefinitely, I would have reason to be concerned.

The same is true for our current shortfall in budgeted gift income. Having observed the hand of God over the last 50 plus winters, I have reason to believe that the weather will not stay this cold indefinitely. And, having watched God provide from my position in the business office of Nebraska Christian Schools for nearly 25 years, I have good reason to believe that God has a plan to meet our financial needs, as well. Indeed, part of the reason that we are able to function more than half way through the school year with barely a quarter of the budgeted gift income, is because God has so graciously blessed us in previous years. We are grateful to God and to each of you who have had a part in that.

Just a quick word about the preservation projects and recent construction, because it would seem a prudent thing to look at cutting back on those as the budget appears to be getting tight. So far, the expense of those projects has been covered entirely by designated gifts from the Nebraska Christian Schools Foundation and from payments from our insurance company. We are blessed to be in that position. Needed repairs for existing buildings could be paid from general funds if necessary, but the Ad Building Preservation Project and the Phase 2A construction project have been and will continue to be funded by gifts given specifically for those purposes.

Obviously, we could see a long cold snap yet this winter. God could also ask us to operate on less money than we have currently budgeted for. He is God. He can do whatever He wants to, and we will do our best to be faithful with whatever he provides.

Gym Building Addition in Use!



We are grateful to announce that, through the Lord's provision through many of you, the first part of Phase

2A is nearing completion and is already in use! The new entryway, ADA restrooms, and an additional commons area with concessions have been completed, and all that remains is some exterior work. This is such a wonderful addition to our current gymnasium, and we are grateful that we have been able to use it throughout our winter sports season. This much-needed update benefits both our students and guests to our campus.

As dollars permit, we look forward to moving on with the remainder

of Phase 2A, which includes a new kitchen and dining area. We would ask you to pray that the Lord will move hearts to give towards this next building project. To complete all of Phase 2A, our goal is to raise 1.9 million dollars. We are currently at \$435,000. We cannot express how much we appreciate the faithfulness and generosity of so many of our supporters.



its historical ambience and value.



Festival Ushers in Christmas Season by Jody Heuermann, Festival Director

The Nebraska Christian Festival of Lessons and Carols, entitled "Voices of Angels," ushered in the most wonderful time of the year by presenting the entire Gospel of Jesus Christ in a beautiful setting. 140 teenage and adult voices, 40 orchestra members, 32 children's voices, a world renowned organist and pianist, and an international conductor all combined to make the 14th presentation of Nebraska Christian's Festival of Lessons and Carols one of the best yet.

The Festival of Lessons and Carols is a service of Scripture and song that dates to the late 19th century. It was first held on Christmas Eve in 1918 at King's College, Cambridge, England. The nine Scripture lessons are each followed by songs and hymns, always beginning with the hymn "Once in Royal David's City." Through Scripture and song, participants are taken through Creation, the birth of Christ, the life of Christ, the crucifixion, the resurrection, and the return of Jesus to earth. Wherever the service is heard and however it is adapted, whether the music is provided by choir or congregation, the pattern and strength of the service, as Dean Milner-White pointed out, derive from the lessons and not the music. "The main theme is the development of the loving purposes of God..." seen "through the windows and words of the Bible." The center of the service is still found by those who "go in heart and mind" and who consent to follow where the story leads.

This event was directed once again by Maestro Eric Dale Knapp, who is a native Nebraskan. Maestro Knapp has enjoyed much success in the music field. He has conducted concerts all over the world, and in many prestigious venues including Carnegie Hall in New York City, the Sydney Opera House, Shanghai's Oriental Arts Center, the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels in Los Angeles, Dvorak Hall in Prague, Vienna's famed Musikverein, and Southwark Cathedral in London. We are very fortunate that Maestro Knapp desires to direct this performance in rural Nebraska to give our community a world-class musical experience.

Linda Sweetman-Waters from New Jersey provided accompaniment on the organ and piano throughout the evening. She is also a professional musician who has performed in New York City at Carnegie Hall, Saint Patrick's Cathedral, Weill Recital Hall, Lincoln Center's Bruno Walter Auditorium Merkin Hall and WQXR's "Listening Room," and the Williamsburg Symphonia in Williamsburg, Virginia. Linda has dazzled audiences with her keyboard talents both in the United States and abroad.

The artistic merit of this event is unparalleled in rural Nebraska at this time. The program is designed to give students who would not otherwise be exposed to this caliber of event a chance to participate in a first-rate program without having to travel hours from home and incur

personal travel expenses. Over the course of several years, local educators have seen the value of having their students participate in an event like this. We are very pleased to be able to provide this opportunity for local Nebraska students and musicians. We continue to promote music education and fine arts as a necessity in rural Nebraska schools.

This year's choir was made up of students from Nebraska Christian Schools, High Plains High School, Heartland Lutheran High School, and Silver Lake High School. We were blessed to have several area adult singers and musicians in the performance as well as our elementary students from grades 3-6. It was

certainly a great honor and blessing for these musicians to perform under the direction of Maestro Knapp with the audience singing and worshipping around the Advent wreath.

This production is planned and worked on throughout the entire year. We are very blessed to have people who believe in this ministry who step up to help in numerous ways behind the scenes. It also takes financial support to present such a professional event, and we are thankful for the ones who help in this way.
