Coming back to school is a *huge* life experience for your child each year, and *especially for* the children who are transitioning to a new school and/or a new learning environment. Each and every day, your child is dedicating all of their energy toward learning how to live, learn, work, and operate in a community with 30 other students and several adults! Being "present" for all of the new social, emotional, and academic experiences requires a *lot* of mental and emotional energy. It is typical for Upper Elementary children to be especially wiped out and experiencing big emotions when they come home. Many children fall asleep in the classroom during our silent reading time as a result of working so hard! You and your child might find that going to bed a bit earlier and not being on electronics for at least an hour before bedtime is helpful.

Even though it's still the beginning of the year, we have quite a few big projects. *Timeline of My Life* is one, which was a project carried over from last year. For this assignment, 5th and 6th years show photos from their life so far and write about each. Once they finish their timeline, they share the work on their birthday. Next, students of all grade levels have worked on an All About Me essay. This assignment is for Mara to get to know more about us. One student named Connor says that he has enjoyed this project because it helped him explain his feelings. A second big project, called *Story of the Universe*, ties into one of Forest's Read Aloud books about how the universe and all of its creatures were created through the Big Bang. For this project, 5th and 6th years look through a selected article plus the Read Aloud book and create a presentation about the story of the universe. During Read Aloud every afternoon, we hear stories that tell about the creation of the universe and the Earth from all different cultures. One student, Safi, has enjoyed this project

because of the science that goes along with it, "We'll get to do some experiments!" Safi is also looking forward to a project the students will start later in the year called *Minnesota to the World*.

As a whole group,



we've also had good conversations about fixed and growth mindsets, freedoms and responsibilities, and circles of control and influence. Our readaloud book right now is *Restart* by Gordon Korman We have been talking about inferences and predictions a lot as we make our way through this one.
