- Open compound words are separated by a space.
 (ex. crossing guard)
- Hyphenated compound words are separated by a hyphen. (ex. top-notch)

A **suffix** is one or more letters added to the end of a root or base word.

-ment means "act or process of"

(ex. - announcement = the act of announcing something)

-al/-ial means "relating to" or "like"

(ex. - factual = relating to the facts)

Suffix **-able/-ible** means "can be done" or "fit for"

(ex. - believable = can believe)

Latin Root **port** means "to carry"

(ex. - export = to carry from or across)

- A sentence fragment does not express a complete thought. It is missing a subject or a predicate.
- A run-on sentence is missing punctuation and a conjunction between two independent clauses.

<u>Text Features - Photographs</u>

Illustrations and photographs show or give readers information that goes beyond what the text explains. Photographs are real images, illustrations are drawings.

Grammar - Plural Nouns

To make most plural nouns, just add -s to the end of the word.

- If the nouns ends in a consonant and a y, change the y to i and add -es.
- If the noun ends in ch, sh, s, ss, x, or z, add -es.
- if the noun ends in f or fe, the f often changes to v before adding -es
- Irregular plurals do not follow these rules. They must be memorized. The word may stay the same, change completely, or the spelling is altered.

 - (ex. They work at the movie theater.)
