Attendance, Why It Matters

Every absence, excused or unexcused, is a learning opportunity lost and can have significant impacts on a student's success in school and life. A student who misses 18 or more days in a school year—just two days a month—for any reason is considered chronically absent. Chronically absent students are more likely to fall behind in reading and math and less

likely to graduate from high school. Addressing chronic absenteeism and developing good attendance habits is a solvable problem for which we all share responsibility.

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Third and Fourth Grade Classroom Ms. Turnquist

Hello Families,

As a class all students have now taken and passed a minimum of one AR test. These tests are quick 5 to 10 questions that students log into their computer and answer after finishing a book. This helps to check for reading comprehension. We want the students to not only be able to read a set of material but also understand what is happening. Each time your student finishes and passes an AR test they earn a ticket which gives them an opportunity for a prize on Friday. In addition all students receive a prize from the school for each 10 points they acquire. So not only is your student reading more and working on comprehension, they are getting fun prizes while they are doing it! Please make sure your student is reading a minimum of 20 minutes each night <u>and</u> getting their reading log signed.

3rd Grade

This week 3rd graders worked on recognizing and reading consonant blends in words. As a group we are also talking a lot about what it means to be on task and an active learner. Being in a multigrade classroom where there is always more than one thing happening, this can be a learning process. In math this week students started their first unit of the year on addition and subtraction strategies within 1000. These are skills the students should have learned in 2nd grade so we are just using the same skills and expanding to larger numbers, making it a smooth introduction into math for the year.

4th Grade

This week 4th graders continued to work on the difference between telling and showing in their writing. When we show in our writing it creates an image or images in the reader's mind as they read therefore making the story more interesting and making the reader want to keep reading. Next week we will take all of these skills we have been learning and start to put them into an extended writing piece. In math we began our first unit of the year talking about place value and addition/subtraction to one million. This year students are working a lot more with ThinkCentral than they have in the past so don't be surprised if you are hearing your student talking about this. This is a great way for my older students to be getting an introduction to the lesson and begin working on guided questions while I am working with the 3rd grader. Then we come together as a class and talk about the lesson more with a focus on the pieces students are struggling with.

Hello, families!

We are one week closer to being a well-oiled learning machine! Your children are taking very seriously their role as "professional students." They are using the growth mindset mantras of: "Keep on trying," and "I can do hard things."

They are working hard to "touch it, place it," so they can quickly place their learning materials and so they can take responsibility for their learning. We have successfully conducted our ELA and math learning groups. Students decided to call these groups ELA/Math "Squads." Thank you co-teacher on this, Mrs. Duren!

We are learning about water as an Earth material. We conducted our first lab to model the water cycle and observe what condensation and precipitation are. I am so very thankful to be working with such inquisitive and caring students!

We are zeroing in on using 1st/2nd learning paces. It is imperative that students are reading for 20 minutes aloud every night. PLEASE initial reading logs every night.

Hello Parents and Students,

Students have worked hard this week and are almost done with their units in ELA and their chapters in Math. This week they also finished up their district testing online or by paper.

Please look for progress reports in your envelope this week. I have included them with a parent signature page on the front for you to sign and return.

Some things to note about the format of the progress report:

Students are graded by standard acquisition. A 3 means the student demonstrated understanding of the standards being taught on that assignment. A 2 means the student is still working on mastering the standards but is well on their way.

A 1 means the student has significant progress to make to master the standards.

A 0 means the student did not turn in their assignment. (Late work has been accepted within reason) If the report says "Assigned" it means that the assignment due date has not passed.
