Discipline Policy

There are four major purposes for the discipline policy at Calhoun County High School: (1) to teach students to be safe and responsible; (2) to encourage acceptable behavior; (3) to teach discipline for lifelong learning in such a way to maintain students' dignity; and (4) to initiate the Red Flag System.

Rules and regulations are necessary to maintain good order, discipline, and to promote a healthy educational climate. Students will be held responsible for their actions.



Tardy Policy

- No student is to be admitted to class after the tardy bell.
- No teacher or nurse can write a pass for a student who is late.
- The only people who can legally get a student admitted to class are the guidance counselors or an administrator.
- A late bus pass from the cafeteria will get a student admitted to class, only if that student's bus was late.
- The tardy student reports to ISS for the period. Students are expected to request all make up work missed due to the tardy.



END-OF-COURSE EXAMINATION

What is EOCEP?

The <u>Education Accountability Act</u> of 1998 requires the development of end-of-course examinations in gateway or benchmark courses for grades nine through twelve. Examinations, which will count **20%** of the students' final grades Algebra I, English II, Biology; and United States History.



Parents and students are required to meet with school counselors to complete an Individual Graduation Plan (IGP), which will result in the selection of a career path and possible courses for next year. It is important for parents to be a part of this process. Parent and student signatures are required on the Individual Graduation Plan, (IGP) form.

Graduation Requirements

Students must meet all graduation requirements by the end of the senior year in order to participate in the graduation ceremony. Students are required to attend the accredited high school issuing their high school diploma for at least the semester immediately preceding graduation.

CCHS EARLY COLLEGE PROGRAM

THE EARLY COLLEGE PROGRAM

At Calhoun County High School, students may earn their high school diploma and earn college credits from Orangeburg-Calhoun Technical College at the same time. This is termed Dual Credit with Dual Enrollment.

CCHS graduates earned college credit hours which are transferrable to most every college and university in South Carolina. While most high school graduates enter college taking introductory college freshmen courses, some dual credit graduates start college as sophomores, saving up to two years of university tuition costs.

Students who qualify must have a weighted cumulative grade point average (GPA) of at least 2.8 (on a 4.0 scale). They must also meet placement criteria published by Orangeburg- Calhoun Technical College in order to enroll in college programs. College courses taken while at CCHS are of no initial cost to the student's family; however, students and parents sign an agreement to pay a fee of \$400.00 for any course where a "D" or "F" is earned.

While most high school graduates enter college taking introductory college freshmen courses, some dual credit graduates start college as sophomores, saving up to two years of university tuition costs.

What is the Early College Program?

The primary advantage of the Early College Program is the opportunity for students to earn transferrable college credits while also earning their standard high school diploma. One of our biggest advantages is that students take courses on the OC-Tech campus. CCHS does not allow students to pursue developmental courses as a dual credit option.

Who is allowed to attend?

CCHS serves students in the Calhoun County designated attendance area and who meet entrance criteria.

Career and Technical Education (CTE)

Career and Technical Education (CTE) is the practice of teaching specific career skills to students in middle school, high school, and post-secondary institutions.

Calhoun County High School offers a plethora of CTE courses via our campus (**Project Lead The Way-Pre-Engineering, Marketing Communications, and Business Administration**) and through our strong partnerships with Orangeburg-Technology Center and Orangeburg-Calhoun Technical College.



South Carolina Attendance Policy

In accordance with State Department of Education regulations, students must attend at least 170 of 180 school days in order to earn credit during the academic year. Except in cases of extended illness, certified by a physician's statement, no credit may be granted when students have not met these attendance requirements. Students are allowed additional absences for school sponsored activities such as field trips and workshops.



Counseling Services

The Calhoun County High School Counseling Department provides many services outside the structured counseling program that will assist you and your family. Services may be initiated by students, parents, and/or school personnel as needed.

How Do I Make an Appointment with My Counselor?

A student who needs to see his/her counselor may schedule an appointment with the Guidance Secretary. Your counselor is also available before and after school to provide information. Parents may also meet with your

counselor by calling to make an appointment. Parents are encouraged to call the counselor at any time.

Counselors assist with:

- A. Academic Counseling Students often have problems in their classes because of study habits, teacher expectations, grading system, and time management. Your counselor may assist you in finding solutions to many of these problems.
- B. *Career Counseling* Although the structures counseling program at Calhoun County High School includes career investigation and information, students may request additional personal assistance in career planning.
- C. **Personal Counseling** When students are faced with conflicts or crisis in their lives, they have an opportunity to meet with counselors who are skilled and experienced in helping others understand their choices.
- D. *Testing* Throughout your four years at Calhoun County High School, you will be offered the opportunity to take several tests. Each test has a purpose and can be very useful in helping your counselor, your parents, and you make your education more meaningful. Information about the tests will be given to you in meetings with your counselor. Test dates are published by the counseling department and presented during the morning announcements.
- E. *Homework Assignments* If you are absent from school for three or more days, your parents may request your homework assignments by contacting the counseling office.
- F. **Referral Services** Your school district provides many supportive services that may be recommended by a counselor. Supportive personnel employed by the school district include the school nurse, social worker, mental health counselor, GearUp counselor, psychologist, and speech therapist. You may request use of these services through your counselor.
