




















#### Freshmen Show Fighting Spirit

























#### Baseball Season Best in Four Years






#### Volleyball Places Second


#### Reader's Theater Visits Classes




#### Trial Involves LWHS Pupils


#### Business Education Prepares Students for Working World







Teaching students cooking and sewing was not the only accomplishment of the Home Ec. depart-ment. Skills acquired in Home Ec. can be used


when seeking work.




