Dear Students, Parents, and Families,

Our Bureau of Indian Education (BIE) School plays a critical role by promoting equity in learning in our community. A community like so many Tribal communities that have been affected by the ongoing pandemic. As such, it remains our top priority to diminish risk and provide the safest educational environment possible for our students.

On September 9, 2021, the Biden-Harris Administration implemented an Executive Order on Requiring Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Vaccination for Federal Employees, including BIE employees and school faculty, to halt the spread of COVID-19 and the B.1.617.2 (Delta) Variant. The Executive Order, alongside U.S. Department of the Interior (DOI) Secretary Deb Haaland's September 2, 2021 Secretarial Order 3402, is intended to help prevent future COVID-19 variant outbreaks and to protect students and faculty at BIE-operated elementary schools, secondary schools, off-reservation boarding schools, and peripheral dormitories. The Secretarial Order requires educators to receive a COVID-19 vaccine no later than October 15, 2021 to support BIE-operated schools return to safe, in-person instruction for the 2021–2022 school year.

With this emphasis on vaccination for BIE employees and school-level faculty, also know that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends that everyone 12 years of age and older receive a COVID-19 vaccination to help protect against the virus. Widespread vaccination is a critical tool in halting the pandemic and allowing schools to provide in-person education activities. Data shows that vaccines may help keep people from spreading COVID-19 to others. Vaccines may also help keep children from serious sickness even if they catch COVID-19. Children 12 years of age and older are now eligible to receive the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine. The Federal government also continues to review other viable COVID-19 vaccinations and vaccine-eligible age groups.

As we work to provide as safe a school environment as possible this school year, please help protect your family by getting yourself and your eligible children vaccinated against COVID-19. This will help make sure all our students have the opportunity to learn in a safe and healthy environment. To support this, I have enclosed a flyer with quick access links to CDC vaccine information and the best means for locating a free COVID-19 vaccine provider near you.





#### Ghaaji' (Separation of Seasons)

In Navajo, October means summer is back-to-back with winter in the month of October. This is the month where the Navajo people would traditionally clear their fields and the harvested crops would be stored in preparation for the winter months ahead.

Reading: lessons in describing and analyzing text (classify and categorize, fact and opinion, compare and contrast, and sequence). Ensure your child continues to read independently at home and they can utilize the Tumblebooks-www.tumblebookslibrary.com online. Have your child record their reading on their reading log.

Math-lessons in fluently add and subtract multi-digit whole numbers (finding sums and differences with mental math, estimate sums and differences, add whole numbers). Ensure your child continues to practice and know the math facts in addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. One of the best ways to have your child know the facts is to practice daily. You can use games, flashcards, versatiles, and online math games. (We will provide you with some flashcards and you can use the following web link to practice.)

Science-continue lessons in Unit 3 Plants and Animals (plants reproduce, plant's life cycle, animals reproduce, and living things adapt to their environment)

Social Studies-lessons in Chapter 1 Geography of the United States (People and the Land)

Navajo Language and Culture-lesson in basic Navajo words through visual, pronunciation, practice, and saying the words focusing on number words and naming clothing.


