PASTOR'S COLUMN

Dear Parishioners of St. Therese,

As we come to the close of our Parish Centennial Year, I wish to express my heartfelt gratitude to all those who made this year memorable, especially Fr. Stephen Watson and the Centennial Committee! It was wonderful to see the 230 people at our Gala of Roses last night. I look forward to seeing more of you at the Organ Concert tonight (Sunday) at 7:30 p.m.

We now enter a new centenary celebration. Along with the Universal Church's Jubilee Year of 2025, this coming year we Carmelites are also celebrating 100 years since St. Therese's canonization! So, to begin this special year, let us begin with Therese herself and her famous "Act of Oblation to Merciful Love."

Introduction to the Text:

We are starting this new cycle with a prayer that you probably know well; it is long and also full of rich teachings. We know that in October, 1894, St. Therese discovered the key elements that were essential to her "Little Way": childhood and mercy. At the end of 1895, in her Manuscript A, St. Therese returns to the illumination of June 9th, 1895 (which—according to her sister Geneviève—occurred during the Eucharist). She abandoned herself in the secret of her heart during the Mass of June 9th, but she already knew that this grace was not for her alone.

Shortly after her Oblation to Merciful Love, St. Therese was to draw in her sister, Marie of the Sacred Heart. Some months later, it was to be "her" novice, Sister Marie of the Trinity, who would make her Oblation, on December 1st, 1895. Questions and objections from the first disciples, and particularly her own

spiritual experience, which was constantly evolving, led Therese to clarify the content and meaning of her offering. For that, it would be interesting to reread her dialogue of September, 1896, with Sister Marie of the Sacred Heart. Spiritual childhood and oblation to Merciful Love are henceforth inextricably linked in her doctrine.

This Act of Oblation, pronounced on Sunday, June 9th, the Feast of the Holy Trinity that year, certainly accentuated the strongly Trinitarian nature of the prayer. Concerning the term "Victim of Holocaust," Therese had received extensive religious instruction and knew the different forms of sacrifice in the Old Testament. This term comes from Wisdom 3:6, found in Celine's scripture notebook, copied for Therese.

Concerning the term "Merciful Love," this is the first time Therese uses it. It refers each time to the merciful love of Jesus. Therese's oblation, however personal for her, was made as part of the Church, in that communion of saints which delighted her with joy and hope. In 1896-1897, Therese had to incorporate into her Oblation to Merciful Love a dimension of pain that was not foreseen at the start. The morning of June 9th, 1895, she was carried by joy alone. We know how, at first, Sister Marie of the Sacred Heart refused the Oblation as a victim of love out of fear of suffering.



New Centennial Statue!

Dear Parishioners of St. Therese,

You've probably noticed the bare front corner at Alhambra Road and El Molino Street. This area has been cleared to prepare for a glorious five-foot tall marble statue of St. Therese, which was donated by a generous benefactor in honor of our Centennial Year as a parish.

It is a replica of the statue outside of the Carmelite Monastery in Lisieux, France; it will stand atop a three-foot high granite pedestal. Surrounding the statue will be a new rose garden complete with a bench for meditation. Let us remember to thank God and pray for our benefactors! —Fr. Peter Mary



Together we will invite Jesus to help us love Him more, encourage others to love Him more, and become empowered to share the truth about the "Source and Summit" of our Faith.





Claimed as Beloved: The Baptism of Jesus



The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord marks the conclusion of the Christmas season and the beginning of Jesus' public ministry. This Sunday's readings highlight the identity and mission of Christ as the beloved Son of God and the servant who brings justice and salvation to the world.

In Isaiah 42:1-4, 6-7, we hear of the servant chosen by God, upon whom the Spirit rests. This servant is called to bring justice with gentleness and to be a light for the nations, opening the eyes of the blind and setting captives free. This prophecy points to Jesus, whose baptism reveals Him as the fulfillment of these promises. The psalm echoes this revelation, proclaiming the majesty of God's voice over the waters, affirming His glory and power.

The second reading from Acts (10:34-38) reminds us that Jesus' mission is universal. St. Peter declares that God shows no partiality, and that Jesus, anointed by the Holy Spirit, went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil. This underscores the inclusivity of Christ's message and the baptism that invites all into His family.

Finally, in the Gospel of Luke (3:15-16, 21-22), we witness the powerful moment of Jesus' baptism. As He emerges from the waters, the heavens open, the Spirit descends like a dove, and the Father's voice proclaims, "You are my beloved Son; with You I am well pleased." This divine affirmation reveals Jesus' identity and mission, and it serves as an invitation for us to reflect on our own baptism. Through our baptism, we are claimed as beloved children of God and called to participate in Christ's mission to bring justice, healing, and hope to the world.

As we celebrate this feast, let us renew our baptismal promises and ask for the grace to live out our calling as children of God, empowered by the Holy Spirit to share the light and love of Christ with all.


CENTENNIAL FINALE: ORGAN CONCERT TONIGHT!

On another occasion: Jesus: "Do you know how much My Soul suffers because souls are lost? May our hands gather in unity."



The Epiphany Proclamation for 2025

While Christmas Day and other important feast days are fixed in the liturgical calendar each year, many of the important feasts of the Church year, such as Easter, are moveable, based upon the cycle of the lunar calendar each year. Therefore, the date for the celebration of Easter changes every year. As established by the Council of Nicaea in 325 AD, Easter Sunday falls on the first Sunday after the “Paschal Full Moon,” which varies between March 22 and April 25 (the “Paschal Full Moon” is the first full moon after the Autumn equinox (southern hemisphere).

In ancient times, before calendars were common, most people did not know the dates for the upcoming liturgical year and their associated sacred holidays. In those times, on Epiphany Sunday each year, the moveable dates for the approaching year were “proclaimed” to the gathered assembly after the Gospel in this way:

“Dear brothers and sisters, the glory of the Lord has shone upon us, and shall ever be manifest among us, until the day of His return. Through the rhythms of times and seasons, let us celebrate the mysteries of salvation. Let us recall the year’s culmination, the Easter Triduum of the Lord: His last supper, His crucifixion, His burial, and His rising celebrated between the evening of the 17th Day of April and the evening of the 19th Day of April—Easter Sunday being on the 20th Day of April this year.

“Each Easter—as on each Sunday—the Holy Church makes present the great and saving deed by which Christ has forever conquered sin and death. From Easter are reckoned all the days we keep holy. Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, will occur on the 5th Day of March, thus making March 4th the last day of Ordinary Time before Lent.

“The Ascension of the Lord will be commemorated on Sunday, the 1st Day of June. Pentecost, the joyful conclusion of the season of Easter, will be celebrated on the 8th Day of June. And this year, the First Sunday of Advent will be on the 30th Day of November. Likewise, the pilgrim Church proclaims the passover of Christ in the feasts of the Holy Mother of God, in the feasts of the Apostles and Saints, and in the commemoration of the faithful departed.”

To Jesus Christ, who was, who is, and who is to come, Lord of time and history, be endless praise, for ever and ever. Amen.
