UPDATE ON THE SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION PROJECT:

The K-12 construction project continues to move forward at an alarming rate. If you have driven by the site recently, you surely have noticed the status of the project. The exterior brick veneer is completed and the metal roof is in the final stages of completion. As with residential construction, the interior systems are where all the action is taking place. The east wing of the building that houses the elementary grades is the most progressed portion of the project. The walls have finish paint, the ceiling grids are in place and the systems "above the grid" have been finalized and inspected. The casework in the elementary rooms and office areas is approximately 90% complete and the terrazzo flooring is in process.

The west wing is the least advanced part of the project. However, the HVAC system, electrical wiring, plumbing, and fire suppression systems are all progressing on time. Our move-in date is scheduled for Christmas Break later this year.

After moving into the new school, we will still have many challenges. Keep in mind that after the construction is completed for the new K-12 building, we will still have to demolish the existing buildings, except for the 1995/98 building that will house the spectator (varsity gym) and classrooms to be used for Preschool. This demolition process will create many difficulties with parking, as well as the drop-off and pick-up of students. We have developed a plan in response to the high volume of traffic in the morning and afternoon, but it will in no way be optimal. The entire project, including the demolition and construction of new parking areas and driveways, will not be completed until late August of 2018.

As you can see, we have many challenges behind us, but there are many more still confronting us. We ask for your continued patience as the project progresses during the next 14 months.

STAFF CHANGES:

The end of this school year marked the retirement of only one employee from our district, but we have several more staff changes:

- Ms. Diane Gwynn, a bus driver for the past 27 years, has decided to retire.
- Mr. Tyler Short has resigned as a Vocational Technology Teacher.
- Mrs. Janette Cooper has resigned as High School Spanish Teacher.
- Mrs. Kaitlyn Goble has resigned as Middle School Counselor. Ms. Shelley Ahleman, our current High School Counselor, will replace her.

- Ashley Braucksieck will be replacing Mrs. Ahleman as the High School Counselor. Mrs. Brauksieck previously served as a High School Counselor at Toledo Christian High School.
- Ms. Melissa Zenz has resigned as an Intervention Specialist. Mrs. Tracy Krueger will be moving from the Elementary to the Middle School Intervention Specialist position. Ms. Danielle Helberg has been hired as an Elementary Intervention Specialist. Ms. Helberg previously served as an Intervention Specialist with the Defiance City Schools.

1 to 1 LAPTOP INITIATIVE CONTINUES:

Last school year, our district took a huge leap forward in the use of technology by supplying all students in grades 3-12 with a ChromeBook laptop and providing the laptops and iPads, which were previously used by the grades 3-12 students, to students in grades K-2.

Whether you are keeping up with the technology trends of our current world, or not, we have to provide our students with quality instruction utilizing up-to-date technology. This is a priority for all K-12 educational entities, as well as career tech and post-high school educational and skill development programming.

We will continue to offer our staff quality professional development. Changes of this magnitude do not happen overnight and we will continue to strive to provide the most timely uses of technology in order to prepare our students for the world in which they will live.

The students took excellent care of their laptops this past year. Of course, there were the usual mishaps that occurred. In many cases, students damaged their laptop screens because they left their earbuds on the keyboard when closing the laptop or they stuffed their computer into an already overloaded book bag causing the laptop to bend, which also damaged the screen. These errors could have been alleviated by simply paying attention to the care and handling of the device. Please talk with your child periodically to encourage their due diligence with this extremely important educational tool.

Finance Office News

While the halls in the school are a lot quieter with students and staff on summer break, we are now entering our busiest time of year. Now that teacher negotiations have concluded, we have been making updates to the salary schedules, contracts, and supplemental contracts. There is a lot of work involved in preparing salary notices and uploading all of the new contract information for each employee into the State Software system. We are also a few weeks into using our new purchasing system, SCView. We successfully processed a few orders from our office, and the teachers are

now using it to enter their orders for next school year. June 30th is the end of our fiscal year, and once we have closed out the 2016-17 school year, we will be able to take the information from SCView and load it into the State Software. From there we will be able to process the purchase orders that provide students with the various items they need in the classroom – everything from crayons and glue to Scholastic magazines, workbooks, and Chromebooks. In addition to the traditional classroom supplies, we also process annual purchase orders for bus fuel, electricity, custodial supplies, water, and all other things necessary for the successful operation of our school district.

Since our May board meeting, I have received a few questions regarding our five year forecast. The five year forecast is completed each year in October and then updated in May. The forecast is divided into two sections: revenues and expenditures. Our revenues consist of local and state fundingmainly property taxes, income taxes, and state aid. Salaries, benefits, purchased services and supplies comprise our expenditures. Salaries and benefits represent over 75% of the school district's expenditures. A variety of things affect the forecast, such as state budgets, tax levies, enrollment numbers, salary increases, and insurance costs. For example, the current state budget has Liberty Center Schools forecasted to lose approximately \$260,000 each year for the next two years. He said, "Looking back on the decision to run for the position, I'm glad I did it. I think the last four years have been very productive in a number of ways and my wish is for it to continue."

He says he likes being part of a team that helps the school function and he enjoys seeing the district's students and residents benefit from the board's decisions. "You just do the best you can with the data that is available and try to make decisions that are in the best interest of the students. That's what it's all about."

When asked what he is passionate about he replied, "The older I get, it's about making a difference in people's lives. We are on this planet a short time, so let's be givers and not takers. It's easy to be impatient and bitter, but tough to be fair and equitable – believe me, I know."

Mr. Weaver would like to encourage district resident folks that if they ever have any questions about what's going on at the school, to go to monthly Board of Education meetings, talk to school staff and your elected Board members. He said, "We try to be as transparent as we can, but if we don't know the questions, we can't try to answer them. There are a great group of people at the school who work for a great school district."
