Learning math facts: Ensure your child continues to practice and know the math facts in addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. One of the best ways to have your child know the facts is to practice daily. You can use games, flashcards, and online math games to assist with practicing math facts.

Science-continue lessons in Unit 2 Animal Parts and How They Function and How Senses Work.

Social Studies-continue lessons in Chapter 1 Land and Regions in the United States; Weather and Climate; Regions and Resources; People and the Land.

5th Grade:

Reading-continue lessons in Unit 2 reading realistic fiction and informational text with comprehension strategies in the following: making inferences and cause and effect. Then will move forward to lessons in Unit 3.

Math-continue lessons in Topic 3 consisting of the following: Critique Reasoning, review Topic 3 and complete Topic 3 assessment. Then will move forward to Topic 4 lessons.

Science-completing lessons in Unit 2 Matter Has Many Properties. Then will move to lessons in Matter Can Change.

Social Studies-continue lessons in Chapter 1 American Indian Culture, and American Indian Government and Economy. Then will review Chapter 1 and complete Chapter 1 assessment.

Independent reading at home: Ensure your child reads independently at home. Have your child record the stories he or she has read on their reading log.

Learning math facts: Ensure your child continues to practice and know the math facts in addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. Greetings Students/Parents,

First of all, thank you to the parents who took time out of their busy schedules to attend our Parent Teacher Conferences. The students did extremely well, taking charge of their parent teacher conference power point presentations sharing their grades and test scores. Great Job Students!!

There are many great things happening in Math and Social Studies. Each day we are covering various standards, skills, strategies, and topics. Thus far, we have covered several concepts and skills in Math:

- **♣** 6th grade: Integer Concepts, Rational Number Concepts, Fraction Decimals, Practicing Fraction Operations (+, -, x, ÷), and Fluency with Adding and Subtracting Decimal Numbers.
- **7**th grade: Identify and Represent Proportional Relationships and Proportional Reasoning with Precents.
- **8** 8th grade: Transformations and Congruences, Transformation and Similarity, and Solving Linear Equations.

In Social Studies, we have covered several modules in each grade: These modules include:

- 6th grade: Uncovering the Past, 450 BC-Present, The Stone Ages and Early Culture 5 million BC-5000BC, and currently on The Fertile Crescent, Mesopotamia, and the Persian Empire, 7000-480 BC.
- 4 7th grade: A Geographer's World and currently on The Physical World
- **8** 8th grade: America, Africa, and Europe before 1500, Beginnings-AD 1500 and currently on New Empires in the Americas, 1400-1700.

Students receive homework as needed for Math but have small projects to complete for Social Studies each week. I hope to cover a lesson a week in Social Studies so students, please complete all lessons in a timely manner. Parents, please encourage your child to attend school daily because they have a difficult time catching up once they fall behind. All students with perfect attendance each month are also rewarded with small parties or activities with Ms. Begay.



Dear Middle School ELA Families,

November is best known for Thanksgiving, Veterans Day, and an Autumn Break from school. Did you know that it is packed with a **plethora** of special days of celebration? You can celebrate National Cliche Day, King Tut Day, International Tongue Twister Day, and our favorite - Pumpkin Pie Day! Find out what events Red Rock Day School has scheduled this month, and celebrating, in the school calendar, menu chart, sports events, and in this month's newsletter!

Students here at RRDS take tests throughout the year. **Summative** assessments are tests that happen once a year. Such test is the Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC), and AZMerit adopted by the Arizona State Board of Education in November 2014 as a new statewide assessment (now called AzM2). Throughout the month of April, all the 3rd-6th grade students take the ELA Reading, Writing and Math tests from AzM2. In addition, the 5th grade students take the AzSCI (Science) test. WIDA is another **summative** test given at RRDS to advance academic language development and academic achievement for students who are culturally and linguistically diverse through high quality standards, research, assessments, and professional learning for educators.

BOOST YOUR LEARNING

Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA) is the foremost student academic progress monitoring assessment given at RRDS. The i-Ready is not only given 3 times a year, formatively, but it compiles lesson for students to work on for remediation, to relearn skills and concepts lost during the COVID 19 pandemic, forgotten, or did not internalize. To boost student learning RRDS provides several interactive on-line opportunities for students to work on. In addition, the Farmington Library allows students to check out more than 10 books. Students can do everything to improve your learning in all subject areas to prepare for the next upcoming test.

Exceptional Student Program:

Let's welcome November! The leaves are changing color and the fall flowers are blooming. It's all very beautiful.

The Student Assistance Team (SAT) is an important step in identifying a student who may have a suspected disability. Disabilities range from moderate to severe and may include a speech delay or a need in one or more academic areas. When a student is observed to have a possible need, they go through the Student Assistance Team (SAT) process. The SAT is a school-based group of people who provides additional support to students who are experiencing academic or behavioral difficulties. These students are often having trouble in the general education classroom and are performing below and sometimes above expectations. The SAT team gathers data and recommends intervention supports that may help the student perform better If the student does not show progress, the SAT team may consider a referral for an initial evaluation for Special Education. These evaluations may determine a need for an individual education plan (IEP).

I hope these mini explanations of Special Education is helpful in informative. If you have any questions, please <u>come</u> and ask me. I'm usually always available.

A few reminders from Red Rock Day School bus drivers

First, thank you to all the parents for your support and patience while RRDS has only 2 bus drivers completing the bus routes. (Run times may vary, until Mrs. Katherine Smith returns, then we will notify you and adjustments will be made).

Next, if your child or children will <u>not</u> be riding the school bus on a particular day or if there is any change in their schedule, please call the school at 928-653-4456, then the front office will inform the bus drivers of the changes.

If you have any questions about the bus schedule, please call or text the bus driver. (These are the routes, until Mrs. Smith returns).

BUS STOP AND BUS SAFETY REMINDERS:

- Be on time 5 minutes before scheduled bus stop.
- Dress for the winter weather (Wear clothing that is safe, visible, and warm).
- Accept a ride only if your parents or school employees have approved.
- Be alert to driveways, parked cars, or turning cars.
- Know the danger zone: walk at least 10 giant steps away from the bus.
- Form a single line and use handrail to board the bus.
- After boarding the bus, move directly to your seat, and sit facing forward.
- Carry your belongings in a bookbag or backpack.
- Keep bus aisle clear and keep arms, legs, and head inside the bus.
- Speak quietly and talk to the bus driver only in emergencies.
- · Respect all riders and the bus driver.

Most importantly, we want everyone to be safe. You must stop for a school bus with flashing red lights at least 20 feet in front or 20 feet behind the bus. You may not pass the bus. In addition, to the red lights you will see the stop sign extended from the bus which means children are in the process of boarding or exiting the bus. It is critical that you stop in these situations because children sometimes are required to cross the road in front of the bus.





Navajo Culture Class:

Navajo New Year brings new Blessings

The New Year for the Diné begins in the month of October or **Ghaaii**, which translates to "Separation of Seasons." This is the time the warm summer gradually joins the cold winter. This is evident by harvest and food storage by the Dine people. Further, the hibernation of insects, reptiles, bears, and even plants and trees as they seek safety in the womb of mother earth.



Red Rock Day School was blessed with a new princess on October 2, 2023. The newly crowned Red Rock Day School Princess is Taylor Roe. Taylor is in the 4th grade. Her two attendants are Jayden Meka Begay and DrNean Nakai.

Taylor says, "Shí éi Bit'ahnii nishlí dóó Tódich'nii bashishchiin. Shinálí asdzáá éí Táchii'nii nihlí. Shinálí hastii éí Ta'neeszahnii nihlí.' She is the daughter of Terry and Sherry Roe of Red Valley, Arizona.

Our school participated in the 2023 Northern Navajo Fair Exhibit competition. Both RRDS and Cove Day School combined efforts in decorating the exhibit booth and showcasing "our" student work. All student entries received 1st, 2nd, or 3rd place awards. Both schools were recognized as **Best of Show**.

The month of November or Nilch'its'osi, which translates to "Month of the Breeze." For the Navajos winter has begun, so traditional winter ceremonies, sacred songs and stories are taught. Since the nights are long, families can sit around in cozy, warm hogans and learn about Navajo culture.

November is Native American Heritage Month, and the time to celebrate diverse cultures, traditions, histories, and contributions of Native people. For this important month, the Navajo Language and Culture classes will begin the study of The Navajo Long Walk, the contribution of Navajo Code Talkers on World War II and honoring them on Veterans' Day, and the celebration of events related to this important month. Let's participate in Roc Your Mocs on November 15th. I encourage your children to show their unique Navajo cultural identity by wearing their traditional clothes to school this month.

We have been reading short stories written by Navajo authors focusing on the **Navajo Sound**System: *Vowels and Consonants*. At each class meeting, we spend a few minutes on naming colors, numbers, day of the week, date, and school news in Dine Bizaad for cognitive reinforcement. There is so much to learn in limited time, so I ask kindly that you continue to teach your children teachings of the hogan in our precious Dine Bizaad. Thank you for visiting the classroom during Parent Teacher Conference.
