VACCINE CLINIC

The Houston County School District is starting off the new year with increased safety measures for students and staff! During the clinics hosted at our schools in November and December, 553 students were vaccinated for COVID. Combined with the 1005 students vaccinated in the first round of students twelve and older, a total of 1558 students received vaccinations across the district. District employees were given the opportunity to receive the COVID booster through the partnership with Houston Healthcare and Houston County Health Department. A total of 550 boosters were administered. The Houston County Health Department will return in January to administer the second dose of the COVID vaccine to those students who started the series in December. We are excited that our employees and families have benefited from our continued partnership with the healthcare facilities in Houston County.

Transition Academy Students ServSafe Certifications





CEC Mini Grant

This month we are spotlighting our final Ellen Maltais Chapter for the Council of Exceptional Children mini grant winner for 2020-21. Ms. Renee Lee, from Perry High School, was awarded a grant based on her submission for additional resources to access the curriculum. Mrs. Heather Battle, the MID teacher, is currently using the materials with her students. The resources specifically included kinesthetic phonics cards, nonfiction comprehension cards, and narrative writing story cards. Mrs. Battle shared that her students are responding well to the resources. The narrative writing cards have assisted her students when putting a story in sequential order and have also helped those who have difficulty beginning their stories. The comprehension cards have helped students increase their fluency as well as understanding of a variety of text. Students are very excited to have the option of choosing their preferred topic for reading. One student chose inventions of the 1800's because he loves history. He was surprised to learn that the traffic light was invented before the light bulb! The reading resources have also helped Mrs. Battle's students better understand text by including skills for glossaries, indexes, charts, tables and diagrams. Students working on decoding skills have been using the kinesthetic phonics cards by touching each letter as they blend the sounds. Materials provided by the mini grant have been a great tool for students in Mrs. Battle's classroom.







Teacher Induction

On December 14th, twenty-four Houston County Special Education Teachers participated in the Special Education Teacher Induction program to learn more about High Leverage Practices (HLP). The session was the second of a two part series. High Leverage Practices were developed in partnership with the Council for Exceptional Children (CEC) and Collaboration for Effective Educator Development (CEEDARS). Special education teachers collaborated and engaged in activities to explore six additional practices. The following practices were included in the training session:

- HLP 1: Collaborate With Professionals to Increase Student Success
- HLP 2: Lead Effective Meetings With Professionals and Families
- HLP 3: Collaborate With Families to Support Student Learning and Secure Needed Services
- HLP 7: Establish a Consistent, Organized, and Respectful Learning Environment
- HLP 8: Provide Positive and Constructive Feedback to Guide Students' Behavior
- HLP 16: Use Explicit Instruction

Participants and completed self-assessments on each practice. Teachers engaged in meaningful conversations on their understanding and implementation of HLPs in their daily instructional practices. The training was facilitated by Mrs. Cindy Harkins, Dr. Karen Jones, and Mrs. Daphne Whetsel.

Student Risk Screening

The Student Risk Screening Scale-Internalizing/Externalizing Scale (SRSS-IE) was completed on students at Parkwood Elementary School and Langston Road Elementary School during November 2021. The SRSS-IE is a universal screening tool used to steer teacher-delivered low intensity supports, identify service gaps in Tier 1 efforts, and connect students with evidence based Tier 2 and Tier 3 strategies.

The Project AWARE team met with school administrative teams in December to review the data and assess how Project AWARE would be able to provide school-wide Tier 1 efforts, as well as individualized student supports.
