


Teachers: Andrea Lucario & Sandra Lewis

December Happenings:

Creative Curriculum The theme is Paper. Children will explore a variety of textured paper, and learn how paper is used. Children will use their fine motor skills to paint, and hold markers, crayons, and chalks to make marks, and or jab on paper. Children will tear and crumple up paper, unwrap gift boxes, and use their whole body to crawl through cardboard box tunnels, and stack a variety of different sized boxes.


Conscious Discipline: The Power of Love- we will learn to see the best in others, especially during conflicts and will continue our S.T.A.R. breathing (Smile, Take a deep breath, and Relax).

Cultural Lifeways: Children will create music using rattles, drums, and other instruments provided, while we sing the good morning song, nursery rhyme songs and while we listen to traditional songs. Children will learn the names of traditional foods in Keres.

S.T.E.A.M.: Sounds of our natural world. Children will listen to a variety of sounds and will learn that we listen with our ears and identify we have two ears during indoor and outdoor play.

Events: Nutrition Activity (in classroom)

Color of the Month: Green





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Last Month's Highlights

Creative Curriculum: The children learned that bags are made to carry items of different sizes, school backpacks carry our classroom notes and reading books, and that we use plastic bags for trash.

Conscious Discipline: We sing our "Good Morning Song" to welcome everyone and get our day started. We do daily stretches, to get our bodies ready for activities we do throughout the day.

Cultural Lifeways: We explored how we plant, what is needed to plant in order to have a good harvest, why we plant, what we harvest, and what hunting means to our community. We also learned the names of certain vegetables and animals in the Laguna Language.

STEAM: We learned about the colors in nature: orange, brown, yellow, red, and green.

Visitors Events: New York Classroom teachers would like to thank parents and family members who were able to join us here at the center for November events and activities.

December Happenings:

Creative Curriculum: The theme is Paper: where paper comes from, what can be made with paper, and how paper is used indoors and outdoors.

We will learn three of our senses: listening (how paper sounds when crumpled, or torn), touching (different textures of paper), and seeing (torn paper or paper cut into different shapes).

Conscious Discipline: The Power of Love: kindness, respect and sharing.

Cultural Lifeways:

- Music- different types of music and where music is heard
- Traditional foods for different times of the year, special occasions, where traditional foods are seen, and who makes traditional foods

Color of the Month: Green

STEAM: Sounds of our natural world: Where natural sounds are heard, and if they are calm, loud, quiet, etc.

Nutrition Activity: Blue Corn Drink.

Blue corn is a nutritious whole grain, and is high in fiber and antioxidants.

Birthdays/Celebrations


We would like to wish L.C. a very Happy Birthday!

Parent Tips: Practice patience, step back and take

a moment to acknowledge and celebrate when your child has shown growth or achieved an accomplishment, big or small. This is an important moment for your child, especially when they share it with you. This helps your child to keep going and motivates them to learn more.



Upcoming Classroom Events:

As we feel and see the weather change, please dress your child according to the weather. In our classroom, we are still learning how to dress ourselves, so remember to let your child try to dress themselves. This builds their self-confidence, and is also a way to help with their fine motor skills (use of smaller muscles, specifically those in the hand and wrist to grasp; eye-hand coordination) and gross motor skills (use of larger muscles, specifically for balance and coordination).

PATIENCE, is our biggest helper. We want to carry out tasks for our children, especially, when in a hurry. Please remember that, if we want our children to learn a task, role modeling is an excellent tool. Teachers are here to assist them as well. Parents and guardians are a child's first teachers at home.









December Happenings:

Creative Curriculum—Children will learn about how paper is made, look at different types of paper, the uses of paper, and what is done with paper once we are done with it. Children will touch, feel and compare the different textures of paper.

Conscious Discipline: The Power of Intention. We will sing songs and recite rhymes during transition times (cleaning up, getting ready for lunch, waking up from nap time, etc.). If needed, children are given the opportunity to sit in the safe place and are given breathing exercises, utilized for calming down or preparing them to join the group again.

Cultural Lifeways:

- Music looking at and listening to different musical instruments
- Traditional foods- seeing and tasting traditional foods for this time of year

STEAM: Sounds of Nature; Children will listen to different sounds of nature and try to recognize them.

Visitors / Events: Winter Programs

Last Month's Highlights

Creative Curriculum: Children looked at different sizes, parts and types of bags, and the many uses of bags.

Conscious Discipline: Children were shown to take a few, deep breaths when becoming upset in order to calm themselves, while sitting in calm down area. Children and teachers continue to practice various breathing techniques. Children were given a choice to share their emotions and/or share what they can do differently when reacting to something that upset them.

Cultural Lifeways: Children learned, in Keres, words for different animals we hunt. When shown images, children were able to say the names of the animals in Keres.

STEAM: Children explored different trees, ones that grow in our community and some that do not, and the benefits that of trees.



November Highlights

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Creative Curriculum: Our themes have been combined with PHS: They were bags and trees; though, more focus has been with trees. Although we have tried to separate the two curriculums, the younger children followed along with the older children and have stayed during our morning meetings to join in our discussions.

Conscious Discipline: Children are learning how to use their "Big Voice"—which is an assertive voice that children can use to help others know how to treat them. We want children to use their words to say how they feel, rather than their hands (pushing and/or hitting) to show how they feel.

Cultural Lifeways: Children and teachers are learning the names of bear, turkey, and antelope.

STEAM: Your children enjoyed visiting and learning about trees! The lesson was extended to create a forest in our classroom. Children created their own special tree.

Visitors / Events: Thanks to our families for meeting with us at our parent-teacher conferences. It is always nice to share information and stories with you on your children's development. Da-wa-eh!

December Happenings:

Creative Curriculum Our themes this month are Light and Paper. We will utilize the winter holiday to extend the children's learning with experiences they may have in their personal lives. The light study can include lights on the Christmas tree or house. The paper study can include wrapping paper as they see their presents under the Christmas tree. The possibilities are endless!

Conscious Discipline: Children will learn from the Power of Love. It focuses on choosing to see the best in others by using skills of positive intent. We will choose to see kindness and record acts of kindness on a paper heart and add it onto the childrens' tree.

Last Month's Highlights

Creative Curriculum: November's theme was clothes. We counted buttons, zippers, and pockets, and talked about the different colors on our friends' clothing.

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Conscious Discipline: We learned how to calm ourselves down by using Stop, Take a deep breath, and Relax (STAR), breathing in and out slowly! Children really got the hang of this type of breathing, especially after movements and dancing, and it's a fun way to self- regulate our breathing.

Cultural Lifeways: Children learned to say corn, squash, pumpkin, chili and watermelon in Keres!

STEAM: Our outdoor activity involved looking for things in nature such as flowers, plants, rocks, sand, and twigs! The children all took a bag of sand or rocks home. Parents probably found some of the items in their child's backpack.

<u>Visitors /Events</u>: Children all wore their moccasins on Rock your Moc's Day. We also took a field trip to the pumpkin patch, where the children picked out a pumpkin, and participated in the scavenger hunt.

We had a visit from Smokey the Bear. The children were really excited to shake his hand and have their picture taken with him.

We had a visitor show us how to make traditional pies. The children all took one home to enjoy, along with a recipe.

STEAM: Sounds of our natural world. The children will listen for sounds in nature that can be described, compared, and classified on the basis of their characteristics.














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Last Month's Highlights

Creative Curriculum: Children explored physical properties of bags by observing their size, color, and textures. Children had hands on exploration of a piece of luggage and different types of bags. Conscious Discipline: Intention. Teacher modeled breathing techniques during different times of the day such as coming in from the playground and for nap time to calm and regulate our breathing and bodies.

Cultural Lifeways: Hunting. Each child picked an animal and used their writing and drawing skills to decorate it, and used the Keres word for the animals.

STEAM: Exploring Trees. When outdoors, children picked up leaves, counted, and threw them in the air. Children crushed leaves into pieces, and collected twigs for the classroom.

Visitors / Events: Children met Smokey the Bear. Thank you for participating in the Fall Festival.

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As the Disabilities Services Coordinator for Laguna Division of Early Childhood, here are a few highlights I would like to share about the special services area:

- All children are fully included in every learning opportunity
- We value that family is the expert on their child
 - The Laguna Division of Early Childhood maintains strong collaborative partnerships with 1. The Native American Professional Parent Resources (NAPPR) and La Vida Felicidad who provide services to children up to the age of 3. These services are regulated by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) Part C.
 - 2. Grants Cibola County Schools Special Services provides services to children ages 3 or older. These services are regulated by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) Part B.
- Implementation of the Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) for children birth to age 3, are through NAPPR, and La Vida Felicidad

Implementation of the IEP (Individualized Education Plan) for children ages 3 to 5 or older are through Grants Cibola County Schools Special Services. Parents may refer at any time.

TIPS: These at-home activities are designed to help your child with speech and language skills:

- *For infants and toddlers up to 2 yrs.- Talk to your baby a lot as you go about your daily activities: Example: "mommy is pouring the milk into the glass", "daddy is buckling your seat belt." Maintain eye contact with child.
- *For children 2- 3 yrs.- Naming objects: When you are dressing your child, name pieces of clothing. Let your child find each thing you name and say the name back to you, "What are you holding?" Use complete sentences, "you are holding a red ball, can you say that now?"
- *For children older than 3 yrs. Descriptive naming by using 3–5-word sentences. Activity: put common objects into a bag. Ask your child to take them out one at a time and tell you something about each one, "what color it is, what do you do with it?"
- Another activity: Parent models language: "I picked an apple, it is a fruit, it is red and you eat an apple." "Your turn to tell me what you picked." Child uses a complete sentence to talk about their "pick." For example, child: "I picked a ball it is blue, you throw it."

REMEMBER: Talk with your child - Play with your child- Enjoy your child!

I hope you all had a wonderful Thanksgiving break filled with many blessings! As we are moving into the colder months of the year we are seeing more illnesses on the rise, such as the common cold, Flu, and COVID. A friendly reminder to get your Flu, COVID and pneumonia vaccines to best protect yourself and your family from potential serious outcomes. Another friendly reminder to please keep your children home if they are not feeling well. A child who is ill is more comfortable at home where they can rest, and when kept home, they avoid spreading the illness to the other children in their

Everyday preventative actions

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- * While sick, limit contact with others as much as possible to keep from infecting them.
- * Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw it in the trash after you use it and wash your hands.
- * Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth. Germs spread this way.
- * Clean and disinfect surfaces and objects that may be contaminated with germs that can cause respiratory illnesses like Flu.
- * CDC recommends that you (or your child) stay home for at least 24 hours after fever is gone except to get medical care or for other necessities. Fever should be gone without the use of a fever-reducing medicine.

Everyday preventive actions can help slow the spread of germs that can cause many different illnesses and may offer some protection.


