### Here we grow...the Probe Fair

Perry High School hosted the Probe Fair on Tuesday, October 4 in the gym. The PROBE fair gives 12th grade students an opportunity to learn more about post-secondary options after high school. The School Counselors from each high school took the students to PHS to attend the event. The goal of the Probe fair is to connect students with the right school to meet their individual needs and career goals.









The Taco Bout Technology workshop was held at the Lindsey Student Support Center on September 27. Led by Alicia Montford, this workshop was designed to help parents easily explore online district resources for learning-at-home opportunities. Highlights included navigating through the Houston County School District's website, transportation options and Infinite Campus. Participants were surprised to learn that our district website can be translated into over 100 languages. Parents also explored digital educational apps used in the classroom including Splash Math, XtraMath, and Storyline Online for reading. They were able to view lists of Lexile leveled reading books assigned to their child. Parents were introduced to Khan Academy to find activities which included step-by-step videos showing parents and students how to work out math problems. 


## TEACHER SPOTLIGHT

Our teacher spotlight this month goes to Michelle Starley at Mossy Creek Middle School. She is another CEC mini grant winner. The grant provided funding to purchase classroom novels with varying lexile levels for her students. Her goal is to increase students' love for books through independent reading opportunities. Students participate in a book club that meets three times per week. Students discuss various components of each novel during the book club meetings. This grant has enhanced her classroom library by allowing students to choose novels of interest, which has increased their motivation to read. Mrs. Starley has recognized an increase in comprehension and analytical skills among her students through the book club discussions. She also shared her excitement with noticing an increasing number of students reading during their free time. Thank you, Michelle Starley, for being a dedicated teacher!









Project AWARE Houston, in collaboration with the District and School Effectiveness office, collected 13,247 Universal Behavior Screeners for Elementary/Primary grade students during September 2022. The Student Risk Screening Scale-Internalizing and Externalizing (SRSS-IE) is a universal behavioral screening tool completed by teachers. Behavior screeners are a proactive way for teachers to identify behaviors in the classroom that may be obstacles to learning. It is a brief 1-page screening tool, which teachers use to rate students on a 0-3 Likert Scale based on how often they display specific behaviors. The screener results fell into three areas: No indication of concern slightly raised, and elevated categories. Below are an overview of the SRSS-IE Universal **Behavior Screening Results**


THE FUTURE STARTS NOW.

## **Youth Mental Health**


The Project Aware team presented at the third session of the Special Education Teacher Induction Professional Development series held on October 18th. The District's Handle with Care initiative was reviewed, and Project AWARE provided an overview of anxiety, depression, Attention-Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder, and trauma. Signs of student mental health challenges were provided as well as a 3-step intervention to build healthier relationships to promote student wellness. Discussions on educator burnout, mental health self-assessment, and available resources were held.


