Native Americans discovered the sweet quality of sugar maple sap before written history. For hundreds, maybe even thousands of years, Native Americans would set up camp in a stand of sugar maples during the sap run. The sugar they produced was an important food for them and for the colonists, who learned the process from the Native Americans. It was only during the 1930s when maple sugar took the form we use today: syrup!

Experience first-hand the North American tradition of maple sugaring at Hunterdon County's Maple Sugaring Program. You'll take a trip through time to experience the art of the sugaring process. Along the way, you will see an early American Frontiersman taping his trees, visit a sugar "farmer" at his evaporator, and enjoy a Native American story about the discovery of maple sap.

WATERFOWL WALK

Friday, March 18, 9:00 AM to 11:00 AM, Assiscong Marsh, adults, \$3

At 24 acres in size, the Assiscong Marsh is the largest marsh in the County. It has been home or has hosted a wide variety of waterfowl and wading birds. The species list is over 200. Join Tom Sheppard, Chief Park Naturalist, for a walk along the marsh to see what may be around on this date.

SPRING AMPHIBIAN WALK

Sunday, March 27, 1:00 PM to 2:00 PM, Jugtown Mountain (408 Mine Road, Asbury 08802), ages 6 through adult, \$3 Spring is here! With spring comes spring peepers and salamanders. Come outdoors to listen and look at the many signs of spring and the new life beginning all around us. Join Park Naturalist Debra Reed for a walk to see what is happening in nature during this transition from winter to spring.

WOODCOCK WATCH

Monday, March 28, 7:15 PM to 8:15 PM, Tower Hill springhouse, ages 5 through adult, \$3, instructor Laura Bush, Principal Park Naturalist. American Woodcocks inhabit our wet fields and have one of the most fascinating courtship behaviors of any New Jersey bird. As the sun sets on warm March evenings, the males begin to call for females and then take to the sky in a dizzying dance. Come witness this spectacle for yourself! Meet at the Tower Hill springhouse (944 Mountain View Road, Asbury).

MORNING BIRD WALKS

Thursdays, 7:00 AM to 8:30 AM, ages 12 through adult, free! (pre-registration required), instructor Tom Sheppard, Chief Park Naturalist

The early morning bird walks are back. Join Tom Sheppard, Chief Park Naturalist as he looks for the spring migrants and local breeding birds around the county. WALKER & WHEELCHAIR WALK

Wednesday, April 13, 9:30 AM to 10:30 AM, Landsdown Trail, all ages, \$3 per person (buddy attends for free), instructor Laura Bush, Principal Park Naturalist. This walk is designed for those who use a wheelchair or walker but desire to spend time in nature. Join naturalist Laura Bush to explore the

Landsdown Trail, a former railroad that is now a trail with a fine gravel surface. Expect to see and hear birds, chipmunks, and the Capoolong Creek. We will move at the pace of the group, stopping periodically to learn about the natural world. If desired, please consider bringing a buddy along to assist (buddy attends for free). Please contact us in advance if you would like a buddy from Parks. We will meet at the trailhead at 113 Lower Landsdown Road, Annandale 08801 (Franklin Township). Please note, there is no restroom facility at this location.

JUGTOWN HISTORY/NATURE WALK

Monday, April 18, 9:00 AM to 11:00 AM, Jugtown Mountain Preserve, adults, \$3

Jugtown Mountain sits just north of Route 78 within the New Jersey Highlands. The property was once a mine and a ski resort. Today, it is part of a 600+ acre preserved complex. Take a walk with Tom Sheppard, Chief Park Naturalist, as he shares the property's history and talks about the local wildlife and flora.

BLUEBELLS HIKE

Friday, April 29, 9:00 AM to 11:00 AM, Bernadette Morales/Uplands, ages 8 through adult, \$3 Virginia Bluebells are one of America's favorite wildflowers. Native to our area, they bloom for a few weeks in early spring, and "hide" later in the summer. They are also deer- and critter-resistant! Explore Bernadette Morales and Uplands Reserve with naturalist Laura Bush to enjoy the bluebells, stroll along a bubbling brook, and see the ruins of the estate of Judge Large (a prosecutor in the Charles Lindberg case). This is a moderately hilly hike, about three miles in total. Meet at the parking lot of Bernadette Morales Nature Preserve, 103 Capner Street, Flemington.

BIRDING JUGTOWN MOUNTAIN

Saturday, May 14, 8:00 AM to 11:00 AM, Jugtown Mountain Nature Preserve, ages 8 through adult, \$6. At the height of spring migration, let's bird a new location, Jugtown Mountain Nature Preserve in Bethlehem Township. Principal Park Naturalist Laura Bush will guide the group through the forest habitat where Hooded Warblers, Worm-eating Warblers, and Rose-breasted Grosbeaks have been observed in the past. We will meet at the parking area, 408 Mine Road, Asbury, 08802. Expect to walk at least 1 ½ miles with a gradual slope on the return. For birders of any ability level; binoculars will be available to borrow. Please note, there are no restroom facilities at this location.

INSECT STUDY MERIT BADGE

Saturday, May 14, 2:00 PM to 3:30 PM, Echo Hill, ages 11 to 17, \$3 per scout; accompanying adult attends for free, instructor Debra Reed, Park Naturalist There are a huge number of insect species... more than 950,000! That makes them the most common animals on earth. Insects play an important role in the ecosystem. Without insects, we would have fewer birds, reptiles, amphibians, fish, and mammals because insects are an important food source. Join us to learn more about these fascinating animals while earning the insect study merit badge. This class is an introduction to the badge. Scouts will need to complete additional requirements on their own, and then meet with Debra to check their work.

BLOOD MOON AT HOFFMAN PARK

Sunday, May 15, 10:30 PM to 2:00 AM, Hoffman Park, adults, \$6

A "Blood Moon" occurs when the Moon is in a total lunar eclipse. While the moon will not actually disappear, the view will still be striking as the usually whitish moon becomes a reddish-brown. Join Tom Sheppard, Chief Park Naturalist for this celestial event. A telescope will be on site to view other evening features as well as some close-ups of the moon itself.

NIGHT HIKE

Tuesday, May 17, 8:00 PM to 9:00 PM, Arboretum, ages 8 through adult, \$3, instructor Debra Reed, Park Naturalist. Night hiking can be glorious with starry skies, moonlit vistas, and insect serenades.



Come explore the park during the night and see the beautiful twilight while surrounded by nature. Under the light of the moon, we will listen to spring insects and learn about the adaptations of nocturnal animals. We will also learn about the phases of the moon.

BIRD STUDY SCOUTING MERIT BADGE

Friday, May 20, 4:00 PM to 6:00 PM, Echo Hill, ages 11 to 17, \$3 per scout; accompanying adult attends for free, instructor Laura Bush, Principal Park Naturalist.

The majority of the two hours will be spent on preparing our field notebooks, and identifying birds by sight and sound (requirements 5 & 6). We will also go over how to use binoculars and field guides (requirements 3 & 4, but scouts will have to be tested on this at a later date). Please bring a notebook and pencil, and binoculars if you have them (also available to borrow). Scouts will need to schedule an additional meeting time after they have completed the other requirements on their own.

SPRING ACTIVITY BOX

Pick up at Arboretum, ages 4 to 8, \$20 per box. Enjoy self-paced instruction and fun on the topics of Birds, Wildflowers, Frogs, Insects, and Caring for the Earth. Explore with a short introductory video online, an outdoor component like a scavenger hunt or walk, a game or activity, and a craft. All instructions and specialty materials will be included. Some projects will require basic materials found around the home. To sign up, please return our registration form with payment. We will then contact you to pick up your Spring Activity Box from the Arboretum. These boxes will make one of each project, and are meant to be used by one child. Some included activities will lend themselves to an entire family or group participating. These are the same activities as in the 2021 Spring Activity Box.

Learn, create, play games, and explore! Our popular nature clubs will introduce your child to many exciting nature topics. Other fun hands-on activities include science experiments, games, and craft projects. The children will be able to observe the surprising changes in nature from week to week as we progress through the season. Through our explorations, children will also improve their attention to detail as we observe the colors, shapes, textures, and sounds of the natural world. Please be sure to dress your child for the outdoors so they will be able to enjoy our time. We strongly recommend old clothes and sneakers/boots that can get dirty. Children must be accompanied by an adult for both sessions.

HOMESCHOOL: ROCKS & MINERALS

Wednesday, March 9, 1:00 PM to 2:00 PM, Deer Path Park Cedars Pavilion, ages 7 and up, \$3 per child; accompanying adult attends for free, instructor Tom Sheppard, Chief Park Naturalist.

Rocks and minerals make up the inorganic part of our environment. Come and learn what the differences are between rocks and minerals. We will examine the rock cycle, perform some quick experiments, and identify some mystery minerals.

HOMESCHOOL: FIELD INSECT STUDY

We will examine what makes up an insect and discuss the roles that they play in the environment. Students will then have the opportunity to collect and examine live insects from our meadow.

RAPTORS THROUGH A PHOTOGRAPHER'S EYE

Tuesday, March 8, 7:00 PM to 8:00 PM, adults, free, guest instructor Bob Reith, Photographer Bob Reith is a wildlife photographer who returns with a program on raptors, including eagles, osprey, hawks, owls, harriers, falcons, and vultures. All are reckoned to be avian predators, which for the most part hunt fish, small mammals, other birds, and dead remains. This time of year, raptors have recently begun the annual mating process. Bob will share photos from his vast collection, most of which were taken in northern New Jersey, with others from New York, Connecticut, Maryland, and Missouri where he now resides.

CO-EXISTING WITH COYOTES

Coyotes have now been part of our County's population for several years.

SMALL MARKET BASKET

2 Thursdays, March 24 and 31, 6:30 PM to 8:30 PM, adults, \$25 Instructor Liz Braidwood-Fulmer, Recreation Program Coordinator Experience level: Beginner

Make a rectangular basket, 12" long x 6" wide x 9 1/2" tall, with a D handle. On day two, we will embellish the basket with a surface curl design and a wrapped handle. **Tools you supply:** scissors, bucket of warm water (to soak reed in), tuck tool or small

flathead screwdriver (about ¼" wide, thin head), 10 mini clamps or clothespins, spray

bottle (filled with warm water, 2 weights such as large books, and a darning/dull needle that will take waxed linen.





The base of this basket is a six-sided star created using ½" flat reed that becomes the spokes. The sides are woven with three sets of three rod wale chasing.

Tools you supply: scissors, bucket of warm water (to soak reed in), tuck tool or small flathead screwdriver (about ¼" wide, thin head), 10 mini clamps or clothespins, spray bottle (filled with warm water) and a darning/dull needle that will take waxed linen.




