FREE THURSDAY MORNING BIRD WALKS

for adults, pre-registration required, Tom Sheppard, Chief Park Naturalist

Let's look for fall migrants and resident birds around the county. We will use both eyes and ears to determine which birds are around us, as well as to observe other signs of the fall season. This may be your last chance until spring to see some of these species.

IN-PERSON HOMESCHOOL PROGRAMS

Classes led by instructor Tom Sheppard, Chief Park Naturalist Children must be accompanied by an adult & pre-registration is required.



EVERGREEN TREES

Wednesday, September 14, 1:00 PM to 2:00 PM, Arboretum, ages 7 and up, \$3 per child; accompanying adult attends for free.

We will walk around the Arboretum to focus on the evergreen trees and note the features that make them distinct from broadleaf trees. This will enable us to identify individual species. Please dress for the weather conditions, as we will be outside the entire time.

DECIDUOUS TREES

Wednesday, October 12, 1:00 PM to 2:00 PM, Arboretum, ages 7 and up, \$3 per child; accompanying adult attends for free

The group will walk around the Arboretum and focus on the trees that are dropping their leaves. We will discuss why leaves change color and the reason for the falling leaves. How to identify the species without their leaves will be studied. Students may collect a fallen leaf from each specimen if they wish to press them as a follow-up activity.

ANIMAL EVIDENCE HIKE

Wednesday, November 9, 1:00 PM to 2:00 PM, Arboretum, ages 7 and up, \$3 per child; accompanying adult attends for free.

We will wrap up this series with a final walk around the Arboretum to look for evidence that our wild fauna is around us, even if we do not see them. We will partake in a group activity first and then we will head out into the park. We may venture off the trail so please dress for the conditions.

NATURE CLUBS FOR KIDS



Learn, create, play games, and explore! Our popular nature clubs will introduce your child to many exciting nature topics. Naturalist Debra Reed will guide the children during hikes as they discover the beautiful field, forest, and pond habitats. Fun hands-on activities include science experiments, games, and craft projects. The children will observe the surprising changes in nature from week to week as we progress through the season. Through our explorations, children will also improve their attention to detail as we observe the colors, shapes, textures, and sounds of the natural world. Please be sure to dress your child for the outdoors so they will be able to enjoy these activities. We strongly recommend old clothes and sneakers/boots that can get dirty.

NIGHT HIKE

Friday, September 9, 8:30 PM to 9:30 PM, Teetertown Preserve, (40 Pleasant Grove Road, Port Murray, then proceed to parking lot #2), ages 8 through adult, \$3 per person, Debra Reed, Park Naturalist, class size 15. Night hiking can be glorious with starry skies, moonlit vistas, and insect serenades. Come explore the park during the night and see the beautiful twilight while surrounded by nature. Under the light of the moon, we will listen to fall insects, learn about the adaptations of nocturnal animals & learn about the phases of the moon.

RAIN BARREL/ RAIN GARDEN WORKSHOP

Thursday, September 15, 7:00 PM to 9:00 PM, Echo Hill, ages 13 through adult, \$60 per barrel (includes materials) or \$8 to attend the presentation and not create a rain barrel, guest instructor Lauren Theis, Education Director, Raritan Headwaters Association, class size 25. A rain barrel is attached to your home's gutter and collects rainwater that can be used for watering plants. This is a great way to prevent runoff that may collect pollution, and also to prevent erosion. Rain gardens also collect storm water by directing it straight into a garden that cleans the water by trapping pollutants in the stems of native plants while draining the clean rain water back into the groundwater. Lauren Theis of Raritan Headwaters Association will show us the importance of saving rainwater and teach us how to do it effectively. Those who are interested can create a rain barrel (\$60 option). To attend the presentation and receive literature but not create a rain barrel, the cost is \$8.

CUSHETUNK WALK: ANIMAL EVIDENCE

Friday, September 16, 9:00 AM to 11:30 AM, Cushetunk Nature Preserve, ages 12 through adult, \$6 per person, instructor Tom Sheppard, Chief Park Naturalist, class size 14 people.

Cushetunk is located on the northern slope of Round Valley and is the peak between the reservoir and Lebanon Boro. Let's walks the lower loop looking for signs of animal activity in the park. As we walk, other questions on our surroundings and discoveries are welcomed.

RAPTORS AT POINT MOUNTAIN

Saturday, September 17, 1:00 PM to 3:00 PM, Point Mountain (80 Point Mt. Rd., Washington), ages 8 through adult, \$3, instructor Laura Bush, Principal Park Naturalist, class size 14 people.

Fall is the time that raptors move south along the Appalachian Mountains in New Jersey and Pennsylvania. We will hope to identify Broad-winged

Hawks and other raptors from our vantage point on the rocks of the Point Mountain overlook. Expect a strenuous hike, uphill and back down about 500 feet of elevation over ½ mile. We will spend an hour on the summit, so expect down time and bring a chair or situpon if desired. If we don't see many raptors, we will enjoy the exercise and see what other birds and animals are about. Bring binoculars (also available to borrow).

ORIENTEERING

Sunday, September 18, 4:00 PM to 5:30 PM, Teetertown Preserve, (40 Pleasant Grove Road, Port Murray, then proceed to parking lot #2), ages 8 through adult, \$3 per person (pre-registration required), instructor Debra Reed, Park Naturalist, class size 10. Orienteering is a fun way to exercise your mind and your body at the same time. Learn how to use a map and a compass to navigate. This orienteering course is a mile long. This program will meet the orienteering requirement for a First-Class scout.

LIVE MONARCH EXPLORATION

Friday, October 7, 5:30 PM to 6:30 PM, Teetertown Preserve ((40 Pleasant Grove Road, Port Murray, then proceed to parking lot #2), ages 5 through adult, \$3 per person, instructor Debra Reed, Park Naturalist.

Monarch butterflies travel as many as 100 miles a day during their migration south. Learn about metamorphosis and see up close the different stages of monarch butterflies: the egg, caterpillar, chrysalis

FALL SCAVENGER HUNT

BIRDING COLD BROOK RESERVE

Friday, October 21, 9:00 AM to 11:00 AM, Cold Brook, adults, \$3, instructor Tom Sheppard, Chief Park Naturalist, class size 12 people

Autumn is the time for fall migration and Cold Brook is a good location to investigate for the fall sparrow movement. Join Tom for a bird walk as we look for sparrows, birds of prey, and other species moving about during this year's fall migration.

FALL FOLIAGE HIKE AT TEETERTOWN

We will look down into the valley and see colorful trees, and identify some up close. We will also enjoy goldenrod and other fall wildflowers in the meadows. Be prepared to hike up to 3 miles with some elevation change as we plan to visit the ravine. Don't forget your camera! Meet at the brown garage, 40 Pleasant Grove Road, Port Murray. A porta potty is available at this location.

CREEPY CRITTERS: BUG AND BAT HUNT

Sunday, October 30, 5:30 PM to 6:30 PM, Teetertown

Preserve (40 Pleasant Grove Road, Port Murray, then proceed to parking lot #2), ages 5 through adult, \$3 per person, instructor Debra Reed, Park Naturalist.

Have you ever looked up at the sky around the time of day when the sun is going down? Did you see some animals flying around, and diving in an unusual dance? Most likely you are seeing bats hunting for their dinner. Did you know that bats eat up to 8000 insects a night? Come explore the insects and watch as the bats dance

through the air to catch their meal.

Tuesday, November 1, 5:00 PM to 6:00 PM, Crystal Springs, ages 5 through adult, \$3, instructor: Laura Bush, Principal Park Naturalist, class size 20 people. Beavers are busy animals! They work with their sharp teeth, powerful tails, and big webbed feet to create wetlands. They live in family groups and build their own homes. Come explore their habitat, learn what they eat, how they raise their young, and much more. Bring binoculars for easier viewing (also available to borrow). Meet at Crystal Springs, Washington Township, Morris County Land Trust section, located off of Califon Road. When you enter Morris County, look for a small blue street sign on the left that reads "51-55," make a left into a development, and proceed to the end of the road to the cul-de-sac. The road becomes gravel and is the park entrance. A grass parking area is on the right about 500 feet down the driveway. No restrooms at this location.

ANIMAL EXPLORATION HIKE

CONSTELLATIONS & THEIR MYTHS



This slideshow will introduce you to fungi, and their interactions with plants, animals, and humans.

TREES OF HUNTERDON

Fall migration is upon us and that means migrating birds of prey. This program reviews the species that move through the county for the fall migration. Learn tips on how to identify the species, facts of interest for each species, places to go, and when species might be seen.

BIRDS OF HUNTERDON

These tiny strong butterflies travel south to Mexico for winter and then return north to North America for spring. Join us to learn more about Monarchs, and about techniques butterflies use to survive the cold snowy climate of New Jersey.

BATS OF HUNTERDON COUNTY

Wednesday, October 26, 7:00 PM to 8:00 PM, virtual program, ages 10 through adult, free, Tom Sheppard, This is a night to learn about the challenges faced by our flying mammals, and the benefits they provide to us. Along with debunking some myths about the species, we will cover their value to us and update you about the struggle with White-nose Syndrome. The individual species that exist within Hunterdon will be discussed in detail, as well as dealing with issues homeowners run into involving bats.

CHAOTIC ORIGIN OF THE SOLAR SYSTEM

NATURE OF HAWAII



There are over 3,000 plants that cannot be found anywhere else in the world, including ferns, trees, and flowers. The only native land mammal is the Hawaiian Hoary Bat. Hawaii is home to the only tropical rainforest in the United States. Hawaii has more endangered species per square mile than anywhere else in the world. Come learn about the geology and ecology of this tropical state!

CATCH-ALL BASKET FOR YOUR BATHROOM

Friday, September 9, 6:00 PM to 10:00 PM, virtual, adults, \$15, skill level: Beginner to advanced This basket measures 5" wide x 13" long x 3" tall. Designed to sit on your toilet tank. An over two, under two step-up pattern makes a nice design.



FLOWERPOT COVER BASKET

Tuesday, November 15, 6:00 PM to 9:30 PM, virtual Program, adults, \$12, skill level: Beginner This basket is meant to hold a small potted plant, so it contains a repurposed plastic container. It is woven with seagrass and has a folded rim. 5" tall x 6" round





Tools you supply: Scissors (able to cut basket material), a bucket of warm water (to soak reed in), tuck tool or small flathead screwdriver (about ¼" wide, thin head), 10 mini clamps or clothespins, and a dull darning needle that will take waxed linen. Optional: a spray bottle (filled with warm water) and a spoke weight.

Use round reed spokes woven with two sets of 3 rod wale chase, with one set being seagrass. We will cover how to make a wicker basket handle. Bring your lunch.



BROOM MAKING: MAKE A TURKEY WING BROOM

Monday, September 19, 10:00 AM to 2:30 PM, Echo Hill, adults, \$25 Made by you, this hand broom with its angled shape is excellent at getting those hard-to-reach places. It is often used as a fireplace broom or to sweep away pesky spider webs. Workshop includes weaving a rattan handle onto your broom. Finished broom is approximately 19 inches long.



HONEY POT BASKET

Thursday, October 27, 9:00 AM to 4:30 PM, Deer Path Park (rain location Echo Hill), adults, \$26, skill: Some basketmaking experience helpful.

After tapering their spokes, students will insert the spokes into a 4" wooden base. Tapered spokes help create this shapely basket. Sides woven using three rod wale using seagrass, #3 natural round reed, and 2 pieces of honey colored #2 round reed. Bring your lunch.

A third of the hike is a climb up a grassy hill and down the other side, one third includes crossing a small wash that might include walking through water or rock stepping and then walking in the woods, one third is strolling along the beautiful Lockatong Creek, and then we will turn around and walk back to the parking lot. Walking surface: a grassy hill, dirt trails in the woods along the creek. Please wear the appropriate footwear.

11/16 Teetertown Preserve

(20 Pleasant Grove Rd, Port Murry, Lebanon Twp) Stroll across a field to the woods to a dirt trail through the woods. Includes a few elevation changes. Meet at the camper parking lot (the third lot), 20 Pleasant Grove Road. Type of walking surface: grassy field to well worn dirt trail. Please wear the appropriate footwear.


