The Jets were a relatively inexperienced team in the 1980 season. Relying heavily on underclassmen and with the seniors providing the leadership, the Jets played courageously throughout a difficult schedule. The Jets 5-AAA district is one of the toughest in the state and is producing more and more state-ranked teams each year. In pre-season, the Jets repeated as camp champs at Columbia Military Academy for the third consecutive year. Injuries plagued the Jets throughout the season, but the team showed true dedication and heart against highly favored opponents.

Kingston 24 CCHS 12
The Jets opened their season with a tough loss to the powerful Kingston Yellow Jackets, a team destined for high state rankings. The Jets had outstanding performances by linebacker Brian Swearengen and running back Tommy Melton, who rushed for over 100 yards. The Jets played an excellent defensive game, but penalties hampered their offensive effort.


Tim Davis opened the Central game with an exciting 86 yard kickoff return and the excitement never ceased. The Jets overwhelmed the weak Pounder team and the Jet offensive unit put on a spectacular show. Jet touchdowns were scored by Davis, Greg McCoy, Chuck Usher, Brian Swearengen, and Tommy Melton, who once again rushed for over 100 yards. Butch Hale kicked a field goal to complete the Jets' best scoring night of the season. Quarterback Greg McCoy sustained an injury which was to shelve him for the next five games.

Soddy-Daisy $0 \ldots$ CCHS 12
The Jets defensive unit and Brian Swearengen, with two interceptions and 21 tackles, led the Jets to a victory over the rugged Soddy-Daisy Trojans. The Jets put together two time-consuming drives which resulted in touchdowns by David Crace and Tommy Melton, who ran his way to another 100 plus yard game. Tim Cokkinias and Dale Wilson had superior defensive games, and Tommy Gregory, offensive tackle, was cited for his outstanding blocking.


## McMinn County 26

CCHS 36
The Jets' second home game was a real crowd-pleaser. The McMinn County Cherokees scored a touchdown on the opening kickoff, but the Jets regrouped and roared back for three touchdowns before the Cherokees again crossed the goal line. Steve Robinson played an outstanding game with two pass receptions for touchdowns.

## East Ridge 27 CCHS 14

East Ridge hosted the Jets on the Pioneers' Homecoming, and sent the Jets spiraling to a defeat. Tommy Gregory and Johnny Warner led the Jet defense while Tommy Melton and Tim Davis scored the Jets' touchdowns and Johnny Warner caught a pass for a two-point conversion. With two minutes remaining in the game, defensive stand-out Brian Swearengen suffered a severe knee injury and was lost to the Jets for the remainder of the season.

Rhea County 34
CCHS 0
Homecoming 1980 ended on a dismal note with a $34-0$ loss to the powerful Rhea County Eagles. The largest crowd of the season was quietened by the tough line play of the Rhea Countians and the superior execution of the Eagle offense.

Sparta 35 CCHS 21
The rugged Sparta Warriors handed the Jets their third straight loss of the season. The Jets staged an exciting fourth quarter offensive surge, but it was too little too late. Elbert Farley and Tracy Keylon directed the Jet offense, while Tim Cokkinias and Cliff Van Dorn anchored the Jet defense.



Cleveland 13 ... CCHS 7
The Jets played one of their best games of the season against the Cleveland Blue Raiders, although they once again fell to defeat. A missed Cleveland field goal at the game's end sent the contest into overtime, but the Jets failed to score in their four attempts from the 10 -yard line, while Cleveland scored the winning touchdown on a sixyard run. Todd Beaty and David Crace led the Jets in a fine performance.

Bradley Central 35 ... CCHS 21
The Jets played their best game of the season against the district champion Bradley Bears. The Jets entered the game with perhaps no chance of beating the state's 4th ranked team. CCHS trailed $19-0$ at the end of the first quarter, but fought back brilliantly and scored three times, making the score 21-28 Bradley. First team all-state quarterback Chris White led the Bears to another touchdown, making the final score 35-14, in Bradley's favor but the mighty Bears had felt the pressure against our Jets.


Chattanooga Red Bank 13
CCHS 9
The Jets traveled to Red Bank to face the Lions in their season finale. The powerful Lions scored first, but the Jets answered with a Butch Hale field goal. The Lions scored again, but then Tommy Melton broke loose and scored the Jets only touchdown, making the score 13-9. Red Bank took the ball again and tried to run out the clock, but the Jet defense caused a fumble and got the ball back in Red Bank territory. The Jets couldn't punch it over. The game and the season ended on a note of frustration.

Wilson anchored the offensive and defensive lines throughout the Jet season. He was recruited by several colleges and chose to become a member of the Tennessee Tech Golden Eagles.


## A TRIBUTE

Both Cumberland County and Cumberland County High School lost a true friend when Elmer Holder was killed in a tragic accident in September.

Elmer attended Sweetwater High School in Sweetwater, Tennessee, and joined the Navy at the age of 17, serving part of his tour duty on Okinawa. After being discharged in April of 1946, he attended Hiwassee Junior College and graduated from Tennessee Tech University in 1952. At both schools he was a member of the baseball teams. He was an agronomy major and worked for the United States Department of Agriculture for thirty years.

Elmer began officiating basketball with TSSAA in 1949. Over the past 31 years he officiated in numerous district and regional tournaments and in eight state basketball tournaments. This is the largest number of state basketball tournaments to be officiated by anyone in TSSAA history. His first state tournament was the 1936 boys' tournament, and his last state tournament, the 1976 girls' state tournament. The following quotations by Mr. David James of the Polk County News in Benton, Tennessee, describe Elmer Holder better than anyone else could: "Elmer Holder was a unique man. He was willing to be helpful to both your officials as they broke into the profession and to young men and women as they sought to compete."
"He was respected by coaches, players, educators and by his fellow basketball referees."
"Elmer was selected, year after year, to work as an official in various basketball tournaments. Such was a tribute to his ability and standing. He was fair, knowledgeable, and he hustled, the latter being a high mark in the world of the sports official."
"Elmer Holder made an impact on many players, many coaches, many officials and many fans most of it positive in nature. He will be missed by his family and his many friends

On October 10, 1980 the football field at Cumberland County High School in Crossville, Tennessee, was dedicated and named Holder Field. Elmer's contributions to this high school are too numerous to mention. The naming of the field after him speaks for itself.

Elmer was married to Maxine Summitt in 1947. They had three sons, James Michael, Thomas Brian, and the late David Lee Holder. Elmer was a member of the First United Methodist Church in Crossville, Tennessee where he served on the Administrative Board and the Pastor Parish Committee.

## A Year To Remember

Dubbed the Cinderella team during tournament time, the 1981 Lady Jets surprised all but themselves by winning the District 5AAA championship. At the beginning of the season, opposing coaches pushed Crossville aside as a young and inexperienced team with a starting line of one senior and four juniors. As the season progressed and the victories piled up, people began to take notice of the team on the Plateau.
With a remarkable regular season record of $21-5$, the Lady Jets went into the District 5AAA tournament at McMinn County High School tied for second place with state-ranked Bradley County behind 6th place stateranked Cleveland. Seeded in the tournament to play Rhea County in the first round, the Lady Jets prepared to battle their nerves and the Lady Eagles. The Lady Jets quickly put the fans' worry to rest by jumping to a $22-2$ first quarter lead and ousting the Lady Eagles from tournament action with hot handed shooting and a swarming defense.
The team had little time to rest and celebrate before they faced arch-rival Bradley County Bearettes in the District semi-finals. Poise and accurate foul shooting led to the semi-final victory.
The $50-49$ victory against Bradley put the Lady Jets in the finals against number one seeded Cleveland Raiderettes. During the regular season, the Raiderettes had defeated CCHS by two points at Crossville and by one point at Cleveland. The game remained close until the second half when the Lady Jet defense held Cleveland scoreless for six and a half minutes. In honor of the championship win, a victory celebration was held at the CCHS gym later that night with local government officials and fans congratulating the teams. Members chosen for the District Tournament Team were Tonya Hinch, Rita Baldwin, Michelle Holloway, and Teresa Sherrill.
Winning the District Tournament qualified the Lady Jets for the Region Tournament at Bradley County High School Gymnasium. Scheduled to play Chattanooga Howard from District 6AAA, the CCHS team had little trouble in the first half, leading by 16 points going into the locker room. Superb foul shooting on the part of the Lady Jets proved to be the deciding factor as the team advanced to the Region 3AAA semi-finals against Bradley County.
Spirit raced throughout the school as a pep rally built excitement and anticipation. For the semi-final round a large number of fans from Crossville, many of whom had painted faces blue, greeted the girls as they ran onto the court to warm up. The game tipped off with the headed rivalry that was always present when the Bearettes and Lady Jets met. Unable to keep up with Bradley's seventy plus shooting percentage, the Lady Jets fell behind by sixteen at half-time. The team came back valiantly in the second half, but with too little, too late. The final score was 58 50 , Bradley, with the Lady Jets finishing their season 25-6. Members selected on the Region Tournament Team were Tonya Hinch and Teresa Sherrill.
The Lady Jets' season was one to remember. The last CCHS girls' team to be district champions was the 1963 Jetettes and the $25-6$ record is unmatched by few girls' teams throughout the school's history.

## Lady Jets

The Lady Jets and Coach John Saylors began the 1981 seaosn with determination. An unbeaten record at summer camp at Tennessee Tech gave the players high hopes. Winning twenty games and the district tournament were two goals the Lady Jets set before the season began.

Coach Saylors began his second year of coaching with a young starting team, one senior and four juniors. Using an offense that took advantage of their height and outside shooting and a tough man-to-man defense, the Lady Jets opened on the road against powerful Knoxville Farragut. The Jets would not be denied a trip to the Regionals and fought back with the heart that has become associated with this young team and defeated the Eagles by 1 point. The miraculous rally put them in the semi-final round against the awesome McMinn County Cherokees. The Cherokees, led by All-State Steve Smith, soundly defeated the Jets, but CCHS bounced back to defeat the Cleveland Raiders in the consolation game and took a well-deserved thrid place in the district tournament. Paul Mills was named to the All-District team.

In the opening round of the Region 3-AAA tournament, the Jets faced the Chattanooga City High Dynamos. The Jets led throughout the game, but the Dynamos found the shooting range late in the third quarter and rallied to win the high scoring contest, 82-78. This disappointing loss eliminated the Jets from play. Jimmy Griswold was named to the All-Region team.

The Jets concluded their season with a 17.14 record. Members of the young Jet squad have received many post-season honors. Paul Mills, a junior guard, was named to the 2nd team of the All Tri-State squad, with senior Joel Lay, and juniors Tom LaMasters and Jimmy Griswold receiving honorable mentions. LaMasters also received an honorable mention to the All East Tennessee team.

## BRAZIL

Carlos Luz came to America from Saó Paulo, Brazil, on January 21, is currently residing with the family of Terry Burdett, and will return to Brazil on July 24.

Carlos sees a few similarities between America and Brazil. For example, Carlos' favorite foods include hamburgers, french fries, and pizza. According to Carlos, these foods, which are very popular with U.S. teens, are also popular in Brazil. Recreation is also basically the same. Young people in Brazil go with their friends to movies, ice skating, amusement parks, and snackbars. The beach is also a popular favorite. Since the weather in Brazil is seldom cold, there is a lot of time to lounge on the sand while soaking up the warm Brazilian sun. Although Carlos likes to go to the beach, he admits that he loves the snow in America.

When Carlos compared schools, he did say that he likes the Brazilian school system better than our system at CCHS. Carlos attends Rio Branco which has an enrollment of about 4000 students. At Rio Branco, there are around sixty students to a classroom, and instead of the students changing classes, the teachers move to the students. Classes are from 7:30-12:50 with five classes each day. Students in Brazil also have twenty minutes each day for time to themselves.

When Carlos commented on the thing he liked most about America, he said everyone is very warm and friendly. "Wherever I go in the halls, someone says hello to me. I believe I have many friends here."

## GERMANY

Marlies Schaafberg came to America in August of 1980 from Verden, West-Germany. She is staying with the family of Sherry Stevenson, and will return to Germany at the end of July.

Marlies likes America very much. She pointed out many differences between Germany and America. One of the differences she mentioned is the people. "In Germany, if people don't know you, they are more reserved." She feels that Americans are much more outgoing, and she likes the mixture of races we have in America. She also mentioned that Americans are more dependent on cars for transportation. In Germany, the major types of transportation, such as buses and railroads, are used as well as walking and bicycles. According to Marlies, there is some difference between American and German teens. Young people in Germany meet at parties or discos, while in Crossville most teens meet at school and in town. Another important difference is that girls here dress up more. "In Germany, girls do not put so much emphasis on make-up and high heels if there is no special occasion." Marlies believes that teens both here and in Germany talk about the same areas of interest, and that the relationship of teens with their parents is the same in both countries.

There are several aspects of America that appeal to Marlies. "I like the weather. I just hate the snow though." She says that in Germany the temperature changes are not so sudden or extreme from one day to the next. The summers in America are warmer and the winters in Germany is much cooler. She also loves our music. "I'm addicted to the radio. I listen whenever I can."
Marlies would like to continue her college education in America after her graduation from CCHS. Evidently, Marlies has come into contact with some thing in America and that she likes well enough to make her want to stay.

## HOLLAND

Frans Ribbink came to America on August 8, 1980 from Dieren, Holland, is staying at the M.V. Stump residence, and will return to Holland sometime in July 1981.

He feels that the music of America and Holland is basically the same but that is does have differences. He feels we are behind in popular music. "We've groups that have been known in Holland for several years and they are just coming out here." He does not like our hot summer climate but feels that our winter is about the same as Holland's winter. Teenagers in both countries are similar. "I guess they're the same everywhere you go." Discos are more popular in Holland. "A disco is in every small place." He feels that most of the American activities are connected with school. He especially commented on our remarkable school spirit. "In Holland, we have no school spirit. I was surprised at the spirit here." Possibly the most amazing topic Frans discusses is Dutch television in comparison to American television. "Television is very different." In Holland there are only two stations, while in America there is a network on almost every station. Dutch television begins at 5:00 PM and lasts until either 12:00 or 1:00 A.M. There are no commercials except during the news. Also, the shows differ. In Holland, more documentary and educational programs are telecasted.

Frans likes the hospitable American people and can find nothing about America that he dislikes.
